At the close of the Rugger season for Seniors last term hockey was again started, but again came to a premature close. Last year it was the weather that curtailed its activities, this year the sudden need for pressing on with the Sports owing to the early end of term. A start, however, was definitely made, and some promising material discovered. Two matches were arranged with Magdalen College School, but only one took place. It was played on the M.C.S. ground, and the School won 2-0. M.C.S., who have had a much longer experience of hockey, fielded an 'A' side, and the School were represented by their best team. St. Edward's were much stronger and faster and had practically all the game-more than is suggested by the score-but inexperience and lack of practice prevented them from scoring more often; they received a useful lesson from their smaller, slower opponents in tactics, co-ordination and positional play. The standard of hockey will be soon raised with more practice and more matches. It is to be hoped that both these will be forthcoming next year.

Hockey this year was much more successful than in previous years, when various causes prevented it from getting a fair start. Throughout the weather was kind, and only on one day was it impossible to play. There was a general improvement in the standard of play, and the rudiments of skill and science were evident in all the players, at any rate in the first game. Altogether three matches were played, of which the first two-against Cuddesdon and Magdalen College School-were won, the scores being 5-1 and 1-0 respectively. In the last match, against a side of Oxford Occasionals, which included several players of prominence, the School was beaten 6-2, after scoring the first two goals. Many useful lessons were learnt by this last game, notably the essential importance of keeping one's place, cultivating stick-work, and-for the backs and halves-getting rid of the ball quickly; while in the finer points of the game the visitors gave a fine exposition of keeping the ball moving forward rather than sideways, exploiting the unexpected pass across the field, clean centreing, and quick and accurate shooting.

With regard to the performance of the School side, it can be said that, apart from a slight tendency to hit wildly and pass without looking where the ball was going, they showed a greater knowledge of the game than in previous years, and there is every indication of distinct promise in several players for the future.

In spite of not winning any matches, the First XI showed improvement on last year's form. This also applies to the other three games. Players are learning more about positional play and the vital necessity of keeping in one's own place. Previously the forwards had pursued Rugger tactics, following the ball everywhere. This season, happily, that was no longer in evidence, with the result that the game became much more open, and the ball was given room to breathe. Stickwork showed a decided advance, though there is plenty yet to be done in this department. And the forwards, though variable in this respect, showed signs of combination and orthodox passing.. The two severe defeats must not be taken too seriously. In both these matches the ground was very hard, and the ball travelled almost too fast for good hockey. The side therefore with the more polished stickwork, better anticipation, and greater experience started with a tremendous advantage. In the two drawn games, when the sides were more evenly matched, the XI acquitted themselves very well, although both opposing teams had had a longer season's hockey. The three central positions were filled best, by Veitch at centrehalf, Cranmer at centre-forward, and Vaughan in goal. The wing-halves and forwards worked hard and gave good support, but the backs were inclined to work as two individuals rather than as one pair.

Hockey was held up this year too much by rain for it to be said that there was a season at all. Four matches were played, but the ground allowed very little time for practice games. There did, however, seem to be a general improvement all round, more 'hockey-sense' being evident in all four games. The First XI was sounder than that of the previous season, and the Second XI a good deal better, and it was possible to include in the other two games players who had at least a smattering of knowledge of what to do and where to be.

The First XI showed up better on a hard, fast ground than on a slow one. The advantage of first-time shooting and clearing was well learnt—too well, indeed, for it was sometimes overdone. This, however, may be said to be a good fault and one much more easily remedied than slowness. It was most unfortunate that both our and their grounds were unfit for the match against Magdalen College School, for it is our only School fixture. We must hope, however, for better luck next year.

RESULTS.

THE SCHOOL v. CUDDESDON COLLEGE (Won, 9-3). As it was, the level scoring was the result of good individual play by Cranmer towards the end, when he scored two goals in quick succession, and of a good defence by the School backs. Leeper scored the first goal for the School.

THE SCHOOL v. P. A. LANDON'S XI (Lost, o-6).

A strong side of Occasionals gained an easy victory over the far less experienced School team; they scored their first goal almost immediately after the start. Dashwood, playing inside-left, was almost impossible to stop, and, with J. C. Masterman in the centre, gave the School backs very little chance. The School forwards were unable to get past their opponents' defence, with the exception of a few good individual efforts by Cranmer, who once or twice was unlucky not to score.

THE SCHOOL v. COWLEY BARRACKS (Won, 5-1). The School easily won this match against the Cowley Barracks, and if fewer chances from in front of the visitors' goal had been missed the margin would have been even greater. The Barracks did not attack very frequently, and when they did they were usually driven back by the stubborn defence of J. Butterworth. Lawson ma. scored one of the goals, after an excellent individual run, and A. G. Butterworth scored two with splendid shots. Cranmer, who on the whole seemed to have an off day, scored the other two goals.



As usual, hockey enjoyed its short three weeks' season in the middle of the Easter Term. It was unfortunate that the two Inter-School fixtures with Magdalen College School and Bradfield could not be fulfilled, particularly the latter, as it would have been the first match. Four games, however, did materialize, with Cuddesdon College, Keble College, P. A. Landon's XI, and a hastilyconvened side consisting mainly of O.S.E. and playing in the Christ Church colours. The table of results reads one win, one draw, and two losses. Hockey enjoyed its usual period in the middle of the term. This period was, however, somewhat curtailed owing to the weather. The state of the grounds did not permit the House Rugger Competition to be finished on time, and even when that was over the hockey pitches were too wet and greasy in the early stages. A much larger number were available for hockey this term, there being some eight or nine games all told. Match play brought the First XI on, and they were showing quite good form by the end of the season. Most of them were inexperienced players at the start, but they improved rapidly. There were faults, of course, in all positions, but these became less numerous as the season progressed. The goalkeeper did not always clear the ball in the safest direction, but too much down the centre of the field; the backs took too many risks with first-time hitting; the halves at times were painfully obvious in their passing intentions; and the forwards lacked that neatness of stick-work essential to goal-getting. Nevertheless, sure eyes, strong arms, and shins apparently of brass among the backs, and swift feet, quick passes, and the will to go for goal among the forwards, compensated largely for the former deficiencies. Unfortunately only two of the Inter-School matches could be played. Magdalen College School beat us on their merits by four goals to one, but, playing Bradfield for the first time, we won 2-o, and but for their goalkeeper our score would have been much heavier. 
ST. EDWARD'S v. BRADFIELD COLLEGE. Played on March 10th. Won. 2-0.

The First XI had a most encouraging season, only losing to Mr. P. A. Landon's XI in the final match. Mr. Landon brought up a strong side, which taught us the value of clean stick-work. The cleanness of Mr. Masterman's play, especially in the circle, the steadiness of Walford and Wylie in defence, were exemplary.

The School forward line was quick and often dangerous. The inter-passing between the forwards improved towards the end. Churcher at outside-left played some excellent games. 1939 HOCKEY SEASON.

HOCKEY REVIEW, 1940.

As has been the case so often in the past, we owe it to Mr. Neale and his staff that we played as much hockey as we did. Only once did he look as if he would never forgive us, when we insisted on playing a match although the rain obscured Wytham from view, sawdust stood, stark and yellow, in the goalmouths, and the players refused to move far from shelter before the game.

A superficial glance at the results of the First XI matches would suggest that, in spite of snow, hail, frost and rain, the season progressed along normal channels. Unfortunately, it was not possible to give the lower games enough practice, and even the First XI had to learn how to play the game in matches. Next year's teams may, therefore, suffer from lack of experience, positioning and stickwork.

The First XI had a good season, which might well have been even better but for the interference of illness in team-building. Some good hockey was played, and three schools were beaten by a satisfactory margin.

The defence was fair : the backs never gave up trying, but they were uncouth in method, never quite rid themselves of a disconcerting tendency to make first-time ' air shots,' and allowed themselves to be hurried; the halves did well by the side and, if never brilliant, were nearly always reliable and solid. Their positioning and all-round play definitely improved towards the end of the season.

The attack was limited by the fact that the forwards possessed only one method—straight up mid-field; that is to say that the inside forwards were good and the wings were not. It is hard to remember a goal's being scored from a centre from the wing. This meant that we scored individualistic rather than orthodox goals, and in the long run this will not be good for the School's hockey. We were fortunate in our captain, who proved himself to be an excellent dribbler and an accurate shot from inside-left, and also in our goalkeeper, who made many good saves and improved with every match.

The Colts had scarcely a chance to settle down. They did, however, play one match, and some of them had some valuable experience with the First XI.

FIRST XI.

The standard of the XI fell below that of recent years. This was not only due to the lack of experienced players, but also to the unfitness of the grounds, which prevented the team from getting useful practice during the early part of the season. The quality of the stick-work was not good, and this can only be rectified by the team practising in their spare time before the short season opens. The other most noticeable failure was slowness in passing, as well as misdirection of passes. Clean, quick hitting and good fielding will more than compensate for any lack of skill in the subtler sciences of stick-work, and they were not often achieved. However, the team went really hard, and frequently held their own.

Cooke was fortunate in finding two very useful backs and a competent and courageous goalkeeper. This was the best part of the side. The half-backs, although useful in defence, lacked sufficient speed to achieve a more attacking liaison with the forwards. The forwards improved considerably but rarely showed sufficient cohesion. The right wing was promising, but never had enough passes. The two inside forwards were forced to go back too much in defence, so that the line rarely looked really dangerous together. The centre-forward was skilful in stick-work, but was not a deadly shot within the circle.

In the school games, we were defeated by Radley 3-0 after one preliminary practice; Magdalen College School beat us by one goal, and we drew with the Nautical College, Pangbourne, 2-2.



It is not easy cheerfully to write an account of this season's hockey. The record of the XIs is given elsewhere. In fairness to the members

The 2nd XI became a little precocious after an unbeaten season. It would be invidious, if not impossible, to mention names to account for their success. It suffices to say that, to the great relief of the Selection Committee, they were defeated by the 1st XI in a 'friendly' challenge match at the end of the season.

The Colts XI, ably guided by Mr. Brims and Mr. Veitch, was unlucky to have matches scratched owing to illness elsewhere. Jones mus., Smith ma., Eagger, Gardiner ma. and Tripp improved noticeably in the short playing season, whilst Fuzzey and Mackendrick showed most welcome signs of skill in their stick-work and play generally.

Our brief period of hockey this year is memorable for several reasons. In the first place the weather, save for a couple of days' snow, was nearly perfect, secondly, and at long last, we have proved ourselves a better side than two of our opponents and, finally, in those games which we did lose, not once did the total of the goals scored against us reach the formidable total of eight so common last year.

The XI took a long time to settle down owing partly to changes caused either by illness or to give fair trials to as many likely players as possible. Our weakness must always be in finding forwards as the emphasis here is mainly on stick-work, speed and positional play which cannot easily be learnt in the few weeks we play. Shortt, Smith x, and Smith ma., were probably the best of the forwards with Moylan and Lock doing a tremendous lot of work, but rather too easily beaten for possession of the ball.

Sweeny captained the side from right-half and was most effective in stopping his man, if not always with the umpire's approval. Bampfield and Southby both have quite a sound knowledge of the game but lack speed. Paul and Jones mus. played well at back, when remembering the principle of defence in depth. Chester's keeping of goal was at times brilliant. The Second XI continue to confound the critics and to show how meaningless are the terms First Eleven and Second Eleven. Built upon a solid foundation of members of the Rugby XV, the match results tell of their successful encounters.

This year saw the Colts finish Rugby at the same time as the Seniors and this must go some way to explain why this XI, although winning only one match, was really a most promising side and everyone obviously enjoyed every moment of their game.

There are now six full games of hockey and no doubt the standard of play would have been further raised if it were not for the lack of coaches.

Finally a new and quite unofficial Inter-House Competition was played. This is a six-a-side knock-out and must remain unofficial while the Common Room can still muster the courage to enter a side. Mr. Bullivant long bore testimony to the earnestness of these games. Mac's. were the winners after a most exciting final.

One cross-country race, one rugger house match, one boxing match, one field day and one week's bad weather all necessarily but sadly intruded into our brief season. We started with seven members of last year's XI and so with great hopes for a better side, but events and results proved a little disappointing.

The XI stayed almost unchanged. Jones mus. played one afternoon against Keble College and then guite suddenly left to join the Army the following morning. Gardiner came in in his place and played well. Shortt captained the side from centre-forward; he shoots well when given the time but, as all the forwards must now realise, one never has enough time, and so very, very few worthwhile shots were made. Smith ma. and Lock were by far the most energetic and constructive hockey players in the forward line; they combined well and Smith ma. sent over many good centres. Our left-half and back seldom played a cover-drive in the direction of the right wing to give them all the chances they deserved, nor did the others make sufficient use of the 'through pass.'

Bampfield played quite soundly at centre-half, but is still too slow and much better fitted to be a back. An excellent understanding developed between the wing halves and their respective backs; Lucas at right-back played many good games although inclined to wind himself up excessively for immense blows which the umpires soon learned to anticipate and prevent. Chester in goal had another busy season; he made many brilliant saves and must long remember the first twenty minutes of the Stowe match, when at least two dozen shots reached him; every one he stopped, although not always within the rules of the game, and so seized the chance of winning a penalty bully.

The Second XI has again had a fairly successful season, including victory over an eleven raised by Mr. Armstrong in which several familiar figures could be recognised. K.J.V. is considered to have played well and H.D.W. not too well.

Perhaps the Colts' hockey provides the most encouraging news of all. Their play showed a sound appreciation and execution of many of the most important points of the game. The forwards realised that their job is to score goals, but still more determination and quickness in shooting is needed in the circle; the halves, that they must be both attackers and defenders; whilst the backs soon learnt that the quicker the ball is got away to our own forwards the better.

The Six-a-Side Competition was again played and is, perhaps, most memorable for the success of the Common Room six, aided most admirably by Mr. Tero, in reaching the final round. He responded most willingly to the encouragement of the remaining five and ran quite tirelessly throughout all three matches. Segar's were the winners, the full results being printed below.

Finally, we ought briefly to mention the tremendous amount of work Father Neale and his staff have put in in levelling part of Corfe II, used of course as the 1st hockey pitch, which had settled noticeably. This has now been seeded and we are hoping to develop it into a first-class pitch.

This fault was gradually disappearing when the weather stopped play. Behind all stood F. H. Wheeler, again in great form.

Our forwards, with the exception of J. P. Smith and Paine ma., the former always playing really well, lacked co-ordination and thrust. Hitting and hoping simply will not beat any reasonable defence. This was the method of our attack all too often, and we really never looked likely to get goals.

Second XI and Colts XI had so little play that it is not easy to write of their achievements. The former neither enjoyed victory nor suffered defeat, whilst the Colts went down narrowly in their matches.

There is every hope for a better standard of play to develop from the extra time for play which we now have, from the recognition accorded the game by the awarding of a Colour for hockey, and from the evident enthusiasm aroused in the Colts by those masters who devote so many of their afternoons to taking games. In goal Thompson has once again done everything which could be expected of The backs have shown a good sense of positional him. play and if their clearances have sometimes lacked power they have been reasonably safe. The half-back line has been sound in defence. In attack a little more concentration on distribution, particularly to the wings, would have paid handsome dividends.

The forwards, all capable players, have only looked really impressive against weaker defences. The inside forwards must learn that against a good defence the most damaging attacks come from the wings and that the initiation of these attacks is an essential part of their job. Special mention should be made of Anderson, whose skilful stick-work and speed off the mark have given him a personal tally of nineteen goals.

At the time of writing, the Public Schools' Hockey Festival has just ended. The day is warm, and after a few days of almost continuous hockey, with a few interruptions to give us time to talk about hockey, the bleak days of February are almost forgotten. If they must be recalled, let it be brief.

Before rugger ended we played two 'A' XI matches, one of which was lost, and the other drawn. During the hockey season proper only one out of the eight First XI matches was played. The season was extended for a week, and we were able to play one other match and an inter-House knockout competition.

The two matches played were against Stowe and Bromsgrove. The game against Stowe was surprisingly good, for although both sides were without practice, and hence disjointed, a respectable pace was maintained, and the School stick-work was good enough to make us regret the curtailment of the season. The match against Bromsgrove was an interesting struggle rather than a great game. Both sides seemed to lack cohesion, and we lost in the final minutes, when a draw seemed inevitable.

With two other games against scratch elevens we completed our preparation for the Festival. Somehow an eleven had emerged, not a bad one at that, and things went well. The weather improved, all the required players were available, the pitches were in perfect condition, and mercifully we remained free from those distressing casualties which can wreck a side all too easily.

On the first day we won 2—o against Cranbrook. The most encouraging aspect was the solidity of the defence, notably the last two lines, the backs tackling and clearing well throughout. The forwards started well, but better finishing would have made the win more convincing. The second match, against Worksop, was lost 1—2. This was in many ways a repetition of the Bromsgrove game, and we were a shade unlucky to lose in the closing minutes, having had most of the play in the second half. In the third game against Cranleigh, our forwards came into their own, with Balls in sparkling form, and halfway through the second half we had established a 4-1 lead. All members of the side playing, together with those watching, were then taught a lesson it is hoped they will never forget. We relaxed for a few minutes,

suddenly the score was 4-3, and the game was wide open again. However, there was no further score, and we gained a well deserved victory.

Surprisingly our game on the last morning was the best and the fastest of the four. Bryanston started at a pace which made our defence look virtually static, and were leading 3—o after a quarter of an hour. Just when a real thrashing seemed imminent, it suddenly dawned on us that we too could play at this pace, and for the rest of the game the honours were even. This was a particularly valuable experience since it is hoped that at least seven of the side playing in this game will be back next year. The two substitute forwards, Hewitt and Lecky-Thompson, deserve special mention for the way in which they rose to the occasion.

In all then, we have played six matches, winning three and losing three. This can be rated a satisfactory performance since we had only one Old Colour available, and it was difficult to see how some of the positions could be filled. The Captain, D. L. Hosie, gained his Colours last year by virtue of his speed and his tenacity. This year he has made himself one of the outstanding players of the side. His stick-work has improved rapidly, and he proved himself a good captain both on and off the field.

proved himself a good captain both on and off the field. In goal, J. R. H. Price, after a rather shaky beginning, suddenly got the hang of the thing, and became a reliable, and sometimes spectacular goalkeeper. The backs, H. J. E. Emson and L. D. B. Gardiner, became a very sound combination. Emson is a natural hockey player who strikes the ball very cleanly, while Gardiner im-proved with every game. That the side was able to settle down quickly was due largely to the fact that the centre-half position presented no difficulty. J. A. C. Hill had the required combination of speed, stick-work and temperament, and played admirably throughout. M. E. Oldaker, Kendal, and Love, have shared the wing-half positions, and have all played good games, but are a little slow in recovery. D. L. Hosie and J. R. Friend, the inside-forwards are both very much improved players, B. C. T. Faithfull and Balmer on the wings have filled competently positions which were new to them, and D. L. E. Balls is developing into a dangerous centre-forward. It was in the forward line, however, that our lack of experience and practice was most noticeable. Our most dangerous attacks were, all too often, individual raids rather than combined efforts, and the shooting left much to be desired.



This was so nearly such a good season. Early in February the team confirmed its promise by drawing with a strong college side. This was most encouraging. We were compensated for the slight disappointment of only winning one match by the continuous excitement involved in all of them. It was in the forward line that we were hardest hit by injuries and throughout the season good approach work was marred by poor finishing. The fault, strange to relate, was not reluctance to shoot but over excitement, head lifting and wild stickwork, which are equally ineffective.

For the first ten minutes, however, in this match the forwards completely mastered the Bradfield defence by swinging the ball about the field; only poor finishing prevented the School from being more than one goal up at the interval. Lecky-Thompson, following up fast on Quinsee's shot, scored the goal. Thereafter snow in the Bradfield faces merely enhanced our superiority and Mainwaring soon scored for the School. Too many chances were being wasted, however, and victory was in the balance when the Bradfield centre-forward scored a good goal. But the end came with the school attacking again.

This has been our most successful season for many years. Unfortunately only four of the school matches were played, two of these being won and the other two drawn. The basis of the superiority of this year's side over others of recent years lay in its speed, particularly in the forward line. It was obvious at the very start of the season that this would be a quick moving side; what was not predictable was the considerable improvement in the stickwork of many of the players. All credit must go to Meads, probably the most improved player of them all, for not letting the increased skill detract in any way from the natural clash which was our most important asset.

In goal Roads brought off many good saves during the season and was at his best when the shots were coming thick and fast, leaving him no time to worry. He is rather weak with his left foot and nearly all the goals against us passed him on that side. In Boyle and Dale we had an outstanding pair of backs. The combination of Boyle's polished stickwork with Dale's natural sense of position and speed of recovery made them a joy to watch. At the beginning of the year the half-back line looked like presenting the most difficult problem. In practice the combination of Downing ma., McLachlan and Hart proved reliable and effective. What is most encouraging is that all three will be back next year and that Hart has at least two more years in the School.

As seems inevitable with nearly every school side, we didn't score as many goals as we should have done.

Davies and Lillicrap made an extremely fast and lively right wing pair and Hill and Trotman worked well together on the left, but only Meads had the ability to get in his shot immediately without a long and ponderous backlift. In all however we had a well balanced side, which played attractive hockey throughout the season.

The season started with an 'A' XI match v. Abingdon, which we won by four goals to one, followed by our first match at full strength when we lost to Lincoln College by the odd goal. In both these games the standard had been better than expected, but we were by no means ready for our match with Bromsgrove. This was really the crucial match of the season. Bromsgrove had seven old colours left from a very successful side and until half-time had matters almost completely their own way. The fact that they were only one goal up at the interval was due partly to some excellent play by Roads and partly to their own erratic shooting. After half-time the game was completely transformed. We were now moving much more quickly than they were and gradually assumed control. The winning goal came with about seven minutes to go. The Occasionals had quite a strong side out and we

did well to keep the score down to 2 with about ten minutes to go. The fact that the final score was five was due to some very poor short corner defence. This was followed by a good win against the Hawks and it was obvious that we were settling down into a useful and confident team.

Then came Magdalen College School. After ten minutes the score was 2 all and there it stayed for the remaining sixty minutes of a nerve-racking game. If anything we had slightly the better of the play but the ingrained M.C.S. stickwork and calm quick clearances dealt capably with all our attacks. This was the first time a St. Edward's side had not lost to Magdalen. The fact that it takes one of our better sides to hold them to a draw is indicative of their superior technique and shows how much we still have to learn.

Two days later we beat Pangbourne by the only goal of the match. This time it was our turn to be frustrated by some splendid goalkeeping and erratic shooting. It was a good game but a little disappointing in that our play lacked cohesion and there was far too much wild hitting. The game against Bradfield was probably the best of the season. It was played at a fast pace on a firm pitch and although we were twice in the lead justice was done when Bradfield got the equaliser for a 3-3 draw.

Our match against Oxfordshire was ruined by a gradually increasing snowstorm which blew into our eyes into the second half. We finished the season with a goalless draw against the Martyrs. This was another splendid game with both goals continually in danger right up to the end. It was a fitting end to a most enjoyable season containing eight close matches, in which no school matches were lost.

Our strength lay in a well balanced Eleven with no obvious weaknesses. The varied fortune this season was due to inconsistent play by the forwards, for they lacked a real plan, too often giving the impression that they didn't know what to do with the ball. The season started well with two decisive wins against Abingdon and Lincoln, but unfortunately we lost to Bromsgrove through lack of determination. The situation was redeemed when playing Dean Close. This was one of our best games, for we played with real determination and so controlled the play. Against Stowe and Magdalen College, two very enjoyable games, we lost through lack of speed.

Davies vii in goal, brought off many good saves early in the season, but seemed to lose confidence gradually and so became hesitant. Trotman and Meyjes the backs, played very well throughout the season. Trotman was always in the right position and Meyjes, if not with the same polish also worked very hard. Our wing-halves, Hart and Maclachlan rarely gave the opposing wings time to start a movement, their stickwork proving to be very effective. Maclachlan was dangerous at the short corners and scored frequently from them. Lillicrap, by virtue of his speed was our most dangerous forward and scored the most goals, but sometimes is still too erratic Farrington and Thompson both have good stickwork, but their shooting, while reasonably quick, is too often wild and so they scored less goals than could have been expected. On the left wing Stanley lacked enough speed but displayed neat stickwork, whereas Drevfus on the right had the speed, but not the polish. This could have been a very successful season, but the unusually fast grounds in February and March made our lack of pace in defence all too apparent.

Our first fixture, with Dean Close, provided an interesting and exciting game. The result was always in the balance, and one felt that a score of 3-2 would have been more descriptive of the game. We were generally more pressing in attack than the opposition, although the Dean Close inside forward combination often threatened danger, particularly in the second half. The well placed cross passing of their Captain at inside left must be noted and praised. Our goals remitted from quick passing in the circle to the momentarily unmarked men, who, in this match at least were not too slow to take their passes, and their chances. The final result was 3-0, Lillicrap scoring two of the goals and Farrington the other

The following match against Radley was won 3-2. Looking at the result, it would appear that this game was much closer than was the case. Territorially we were on top throughout. Our positional play was indeed superior and Radley's defence gave our inside forwards the openings, by their tendency to come too far up-field. Lillicrap and Farrington, both realised this and consequently scored a goal each. Our third goal came when Maclachlan put in a hard shot from a short corner. But as so often happens when a side is winning comfortably, our defence relaxed, and before the final whistle went. Radley had broken through twice.

This match was perhaps the best of the season. We opened the scoring against the run of play, from a short corner scored by Maclachlan .But the advantage was soon lost as Stowe equalised and then took the lead themselves with a fine solo effort by their inside right, who was their Captain. Thus Stowe crossed over with a thoroughly deserved half-time lead. We drew level after twenty minutes of the second half with a lucky, but well placed goal scored by Broadhurst. But from the bully-off Stowe, in one of the best movements of the season, went through to score the final and winning goal. The result

was 2-3, and we lost mainly through lack of speed. The Martyrs this year fielded a fairly strong side, de-feating us by two goals to one. This was undoubtedly one of the fastest games of the season; the Martyrs having N. H. Dangerfield, the former England sprinter, as their centre forward. The School was one up after ten minutes when Maclachlan scored from a short corner. Soon, however, the Martyrs scored having had the monopoly of our circle. The second half saw the game slow up considerably as the dubious fitness of both sides became apparent, and the Martyrs scored their second goal. However, although Turl and Harris were a good pair of wings and Bailey worked tremendously hard all over the field, there was a lack of real aggression in the circle. But the ball usually reached our opponents' circles as the result of attempts to play constructive hockey. This may not always win matches but it certainly counts for something. One can almost invariably report that a hockey season has been enjoyable. This was no exception; and the Second XI combined to make up a First Game from

which one could draw certainly more than just a First XI of players upon whom one could rely to perform with credit at the higher level. In that respect particularly it has been an encouraging season.

Thinking of the season before it began, it seemed that it might well be a formative one, the Eleven likely to be young and inexperienced with only two Old Colours. This was however by no means the truth this Easter term. though much of value for next year has been learnt. The Eleven has been a good one, full of confidence in defence, and though lacking scoring thrust in attack, not lacking in ideas and constructive ability. The spirit of the team has been high, and much credit must go to Dreyfus who, though missing several matches early on through injury, instilled a sense of unity in the side.

If one has to make a choice, it is to the defence rather than the attack that one must give the laurels. In twelve matches only thirteen goals were scored against them, and six times no opposing forward eluded their grasp. They displayed excellently the cardinal virtues of a schoolboy defence-speed to the ball and quickness of covering; and to these they added another talent rarely found in school elevens, sense in distribution. (Seen most clearly in the exciting match against the Occasionals.) They were quick to learn from their mistakes, and usually their mistakes when they came, as come they are certain in hockey, were those of over-confidence

Graham in goal proved excellent, safe and sometimes brilliant, as against Dean Close, until the last few matches of the term when he began to lose confidence, following a spate of clearances to unmarked opposition forwards. The two backs were admirable foils, Stanley fast on to the ball and a demon coverer, was prone sometimes to over-rushed and hasty tackles; Sayer, early on a little slow on to his inside forward was always a sure stopper and certain tackler. Both learnt that the further up the field one plays (within obvious limitations) the easier it is to stifle opposition attacks before they begin. Both learnt that they could safely move upfield if the wing-halves and the other back covered fast and deep. Bray, returning after three years on the river, played undefatigably at centre-half, was most sure in his intercepting and caught the eye continually. His weakness was only in the final stages of attack; for, although passing intelligently up to the enemy circle, he scored less goals than a centre-half should. At wing-half the Eleven was well served by Bell who, though prone to give his wing too much room covered fast and supported his forwards most intelligently. He was the person who, with Enos at left-half, realised most the value of the open space both in defensive plan and attacking pass. Enos stopped the ball superlatively and cross-passed well-all, but for speed, what a left-half should be.

The forwards deserve some of the praise for our defensive record. Dreyfus, the quickest runner with the ball I saw this season soon relieved pressure by his dashes; both wings, especially Heyworth, realised that to come back in defence not only relieved hard pressed defenders, but also left themselves in an open space ready to link with inside forward in starting an attack; whilst the two inside forwards tackled back insistently, waiting in the open spaces near our circle for the pushed clearance.

In attack we scored only fifteen times in twelve matches and this was a grave weakness, for the hockey up to the goal was most competent. The left wing pair, Heyworth and Kane, linked well, often beating the opposing half by triangulation—next year with increased speed, defences should find them a handful. Heyworth's ball control improved and he centred sensibly, though relying too often on the pulled back centre, rather than running round the ball. Kane passed most intelligently, and soon learnt the value of change of speed and a well-timed cross pass. Wyatt, at inside-right, positioned himself well for the cross pass, though he was a little slow in using the ball once in

possession. He improved much in the late matches, for he became more effective in the circle. On the right wing several players were tried, and whilst Wilson (iv) played sensibly, the team finally settled on Hyslop's speed and dash, the match against Wellington being his best performance. Dreyfus, in the middle, caught all defences unawares. He tends to run left and therefore to obstruct, but he was beginning to defeat this at the end of the season, and scored some good goals.

In all the hockey had a sense of purpose, the importance of the ball hit across rather than down the field being fully appreciated. There was a sense of pattern about the play, the ball being passed rather than dribbled, always the better method against good defences; and it was noticeable that positionally the Eleven seemed more sure than many opponents. The only dangerous lack was in scoring power, and this can be remedied at all levels by practice and application. The ball must be pursued; the shot hit with a shortened back lift, and the scoring pass in the circle hit to an open space where a forward can run on to it.

The speed and harshness of school first eleven hockey is now such that only a thoroughly fit side can last the pace. This year we always lasted better than our opponents and were quicker on to the ball. All elevens must realise that speed in covering and sound training is necessary for good hockey.

It is well to remember that now hockey has become established in the schools there are few easy matches. Ten years ago it would have seemed impudent to take on such well known hockey schools as Wellington, Dean Close and M.C.S.; yet this year the School recorded its second win against Wellington in the two years since the fixture began, and drew with Dean Close to keep the scores even in the three years of the fixture. The matches lost were all by the odd goal, and the season can be considered a good performance by a team rather than eleven individuals.

With Dreyfus injured, all the forwards lacked any kind of spirit near the goal, although they played constructive hockey up to the circle. The defence had yet another good game, except for some goal-mouth scrambles during the last few minutes, which caused a certain amount of anxiety.

v. RADLEY, I-0

The School met Radley only three days after the match with Bromsgrove. This was by no means an exciting game, but following a good movement. Wyatt netted the ball midway through the first half. From then on the game deteriorated witch St. Edward's missing many goals. Graham yet again made some fine saves, but we certainly should have done better than to win only 1-0.

v. PANGBOURNE, 1-2

Two days later, we met Pangbourne, who had a good side, and gave us one of the hardest games of the season. A spirited attack by the Eleven in the first ten minutes uncovered a shaky defence, and it was by constant pressure on this fault that we were able to play the game on equal terms. Pangbourne scored first from a short corner. Our forward line, in breaking through their defence, enabled Estcourt to score our only goal. The second Pangbourne goal was the result of a mêlée in the circle. Throughout the game Pangbourne showed that they were by no means invincible, and it was by sensible passing and open play that we were able to do better than expected.

v. STOWE, 1-2

The defence, after conceding a goal in the second minute, were given no chance to settle, for the ball was being continually hit down the field at them, and with an uneven ground and chasing forwards, confusion often followed. The School equalised when Dreyfus flicked the ball in, but Stowe were soon in the lead again. In the second half, the forwards tried to play constructively, but never settled down to play as they had shown they could, and the play remained scrappy with no further goals.

v. BRADFIELD, 2-0

Following two narrow defeats, Bradfield supplied us with the much needed boost to morale. The first goal came in the first half after a good movement when Wyatt pushed it through for Dreyfus to first time it past the goalkeeper. Bradfield kept up pressure, but our defence kept them out without much trouble. The second goal, also from a good movement, came when Wyatt pushed the ball to Dreyfus who, doing a scissors with Kane near the circle, reverse-passed it for the latter to smack it home ten minutes before time.

v. O.U. OCCASIONALS, 1-2

The Occasionals brought down a very formidable side with five Blues, on the assumption that good players breed good hockey-how right this was to prove! The Eleven played extremely well as a team, moving into the open spaces well, and this produced a very exciting and fast first half. The Occasionals were first to score, but by half-time we had equalised when Wyatt flicked it past the goalkeeper. The second half developed into a hard tussle between our backs and their forwards, in the course of which they scored again. This was a valuable match, in so much that we gained plenty of experience.

The Martyrs, as usual, produced a strong side. How-ever, the School soon took the lead following a goal from Kane, but this was soon equalised by a lucky break from the Martyrs' circle and a good run down the left wing. With the score at I—I at half-time the Martyrs scored again, but we fought back, and Dreyfus was able to equalise well from a long corner. Some of the Martyrs were now rapidly tiring, and we pressed them until the end, but were unable to score again. The match as a whole was disappointing after such a good game against the Occasionals, but was certainly not without flashes of firstclass hockey on both sides.

v. M.C.S., 1-2

M.C.S. was our hardest school fixture. We had lost 2-1 to Pangbourne, where as M.C.S. had beaten then 7-0! With nine Old Colours left in their team, they were a stronger side on paper. During the first half, they scored two quick goals, but just before half-time Wyatt scored, following a good square pass. In the second half, the defence covered and passed sensibly, and it was due to this that we managed to keep them out and generally play better than expected.

For only the second year, the School met Wellington, and it was to prove as exciting as last year. The forwards worked well, and started the game with a vigorous attack to give us a 2-o lead within three minutes-Dreyfus and Wyatt having scored the goals. R.H.M. ARKELL HOCKEY COACH 1961-1973

The season started with high hopes with six Old Colours and others with proven ability, but for various reasons success was limited. Team planning was difficult with so many of the top game involved in early-term rugger; the weaknesses in the defence, earlier feared when it was known that Stanley would not be returning, were only too real in practice; and last year's forwards, though playing constructive hockey and shooting often, rarely found the net, until confidence had almost been destroyed. It is difficult to analyse such a season, but it is well to note that the XI forced its way back to form in the latter part and ended most creditably so that one felt only a small change of fortune could have brought success earlier. What was true of the 1st XI was true of the other School teams, and whereas before 1st March eleven games were lost and only three won out of sixteen played, after that date four games only were lost and thirteen won out of the twenty-three played, a remarkable reversal of events. The will to win and the ruthlessness that goes with it was perhaps a key factor. In the 1st XI there was always a wish to win, confidence in ability and full-out effort, but only after a while did the wish turn to will and ruthlessness replace effort.

The defence this year was unlikely to be as good as last year's and it often looked likely to crack under pressure. Until Butterworth gained in confidence at the end of the season the team lacked the timing, speed and tackling power it had last year at full-back. Four full-backs were tried, all with faults that tended to lead to goals against. In the end Butterworth became forceful, fast in tackling and thoughtful in clearance and his game against Wellington was of a high class. Wethey was to replace Hudson, who although the strongest tackler in the side lacked speed and hitting power, two essentials in a school back. Wethey brought speed and strong tackling in the circle which served well in time of crisis, and he reached the forwards strongly. The circle is no place to mince matters! His main fault was in the timing of the tackle in mid-field where he was often impetuous. Behind these two full-backs Graham performed well, but judging him by his high standards of last year when he kept goal for the Great Britain Schoolboys' XI, he was not himself until the Bradfield game, after which he kept impeccably, and well deserved his second schoolboy trial this April. The half-back line was a strong one. Bell initially played at centre-half and did all that was needed in attack and defence. Later in the season he moved to wing-half where it was felt openings could be made more easily. Tactically it was decided to attack wide down the wings allowing at times the wing-halves to strike through to the circle it-

self. Enos was a main feature of this plan for he was this season a class left-half with good stickwork, a strong cross pass, and splendid covering. The results improved after this change in the emphasis of attack, though at times both winghalves dribbled too much, and thus allowed promising moves to be stifled. MacWhannell moved to centre-half and performed better and better in that position. Always tireless, his distribution improved, and his positional sense was better than when he had earlier been at wing-half. The covering and tackling of these three had much to do with the return to success of the XI.

The forwards promised much playing with pattern and skill. Plenty of openings were made and shots taken, but the opposing goal often bore a charmed life. The confident and open play deteriorated as chances were not taken, and in midseason the crisis came with a good side disintegrating. Positional changes were made, determination not to give way to disaster replaced confidence. and three goals were scored against Pangbourne though the hockey was less pretty to watch. Greater emphasis was placed on the through ball, though earlier the square pass followed by the through pass had carved out many unaccepted openings. It was a recovery of spirit and nerve rather than of skill, but results improved and once more the hockey became constructive and easy to watch.

The forwards, each of whom never held fast to one position, by the end of the season looked a most capable line. Heyworth is a left-wing of the highest class with good stick work and positional sense. He later moved to inside-left and centreforward and with his energy and sure stopping added much needed punch and goal-scoring ability. Kane, who earlier partnered him constructively at inside-left, later moved to inside-right where he seemed to make himself more room to move, and was one of the few to use change of pace to create a gap. Wyatt, starting at inside-right and moving to centre-forward, was a worker but lacked fire and speed in the circle. Late in the season he moved to the right wing where he revelled in the room, burst inside at speed or beat his half on the outside. He did much to revitalise the forward line by his forceful wing play. Easter came into the XI for the Occasionals game and showed good stickwork and a well-timed pass. He is a player who makes time for himself but he must not overdo the push. Townley performed capably on the left wing, running well and harrying the defence. White, from the Colts, played one game before injury, and scored in the first minute showing what a centreforward who really goes for the ball can do.

Of the matches during term three were won, three drawn and five lost. Against Lincoln College

they were always the better side. So to the first school game against Bromsgrove in which the ball was moved most constructively, but although we had more possession the final through pass was rarely made and a wall of defenders was met at the circle. Defensive errors made the score 4-1 against; an unfair reflection of the play. There had only been three days team practice before this match, and with the knowledge gained, tactical changes were made, and against Dean Close the forwards looked more dangerous. The cross pass was used intelligently with the through ball, but, lacking change of speed and drive into the circle. the forwards failed to score the goals that they had prepared, and the team was beaten by two well-taken opposition goals. So to Radley where the opposition was outplayed except in the vital department of goal-scoring. Goals were missed, good shots went wide, the post was hit, but Radley scored first in the second half. A tremendous burst of pressure followed and two minutes from the end Balfour scored with a good cross-shot. The relief could be felt, and whilst it was being sayoured the opposing centre-forward squeezed past two negligent backs and pushed the ball past the offbalanced Graham-eighty per cent of the game and another loss.

Pangbourne was in fact to begin the 'New Deal' though this was not apparent till a week later except that three goals were scored, more than in the previous three games together. Positional changes were made, the through ball used heavily, and the result was a more forceful, less constructive type of hockey. Having led 2-1 the team found itself one down with twenty minutes to go -weak clearances being the cause. Continuous and spirited pressure resulted, the woodwork was hit twice, Wyatt twice converted but found himself with the wrong-shaped ball and no two points, but at last Heyworth equalised. We deserved to win, we drew, but had scored three goals, one very good one from Kane moving fast at the extreme right of the circle. The match against Magdalen College School is best forgotten, though The Times recorded it for posterity. We did not play worse during the season, not the best way of beating a workmanlike M.C.S. XI. Pride damaged deservedly, blistering comment delivered, the team came back to restore themselves as hockey players, and after a deserved success at Bradfield looked and felt new men. Once again changes were made. Wyatt moved to the wing and had a field day. Bell moved to wing-half, and tactically we looked more dangerous. Four goals were scored and everyone looked happier. Injury necessitated changes against the Occasionals, who, without Blues but with elever

Snow and ice made a mockery of the 1963 hockey season but when the grounds at last were released from the winter a great deal of hockey was crammed in during the last few weeks. While the snow still lay a foot or more thick the XI kept its enthusiasm and fitness remarkably well despite each optimistic prediction of thaw remaining unfulfilled. Heyworth here was an admirable captain throughout a difficult term. Circuit training and indoor hockey in Big School and the Range filled the first weeks, and then the hard area round the squash courts was cleared laboriously. Six-a-side hockey was possible on this area but fresh falls of snow made it a hard-won battle. When at last the snows cleared, the grounds stayed rock-like for a long time, but life and limb were hazarded on Lower II and some idea of positional play gained as well as the enjoyment of escaping postage-stamp sized areas. In fact by the time the grounds were fit on the Upper Fields the whole School was more or less ready for matches and Leagues though other schools had found it impossible to do more than organise two XIs.

Looking back it is obvious that the XI had too much to do, for hockey had extended into the athletics period and action in one form of sport or the other was almost continuous. Still it was excellent that all boys played, one season completely lost plays havoc with technique and tactical knowledge, and so in 1964 the game will not have to be learnt afresh.

At the beginning it seemed that the forwards had cast off their goal-shyness of former years. They moved the ball hard, fast and far and scored four goals against Keble and five against Bradfield. But after this spring-madness, a more staid approach developed and only four goals were scored in the next five matches. Heyworth drove himself closer and closer to the ground and was the one forward to show originality of pass. The two wings, Townley and Wilson, were fast and direct and could not be faulted-centres from right and left were numerous. Easter was too deliberate in his passing, though in flashes his stickwork promised better results. Balfour played with dash, and White, though awkward near goal, was an able reserve.

The defence was at times very good as when it contained an Occasionals forward line including three Blues. The basis of its soundness was at full back where Butterworth tackled firmly, hit well and improved in his covering; and Kane, moved from the forward line, proved a back of high class in the timing of tackle and interception. Hudson here proved a most able reserve-in most years a certainty for a place. Bell did not play as well in the early matches as his experience promised, but he became immensely capable in the last games and in all the matches on the Dutch Tour. Emslie was tenacious but was drawn out of position too easily though he improved much in Holland, and Talbot at right half was very powerful and a fine hitter of the cross pass. Brooke despite two matches when he lost all touch survived the crisis, and it was very pleasing to see that in Holland he hardly put a foot wrong.

Of the matches little need be said. A strong if very unfit Keble side were demolished 4-0, and Bradfield outplayed, the score being close at 5-3 only because Roope in the visitors' goal played brilliantly, and defensive errors allowed Bradfield to score three times. M.C.S. were held territorially but we rarely looked like scoring, and their four shots produced four goals. The strong Occasionals XI were held by very good defensive work and Stowe beaten 1-0 in a scrappy game. The last two matches were disappointing, the Pangbourne forwards proving the advantage of running into the open spaces and hitting hard in the circle scored five times to our once, and Wellington beat a tired-looking side 3–1 in a pleasantly open game. HOLLAND 1963

The School's first tour abroad proved an immense success, though I'm afraid other festivals may suffer in comparison. The thanks of all are due to B.M.H.C. for arranging everything so brilliantly and being such kind hosts.

The tournament, played at Bloemendaal, near Amsterdam, consisted of two groups of six sides. Three of these were Netherlands Combination XIs and so were not eligible for the final proving too strong for the other club and school sides. After a tiring crossing and a hectic evening and first morning with our hosts, the XI found itself facing a Northern Province junior side. This game, lost 2-1, proved invaluable, introducing the School to the brilliance of continental stickwork, and teach-

ing them the retreat and timed tackle. Throughout the Festival our defence proved better than any of the Dutch junior sides in tactics, and the forwards learnt from the skill of their Dutch counterparts. Despite a marked inferiority in stopping, hitting and dribbling, the School XI proved capable of holding all sides through teamwork, firm tackling, and the quick pass from defence to attack. In the Festival itself we lost to two of the combined sides having ourselves started by winning the first two games. Our place in the Final was gained in a play-off with Bloemendaal 'A' XI. This was perhaps the most exciting part of the Festival for each player in both sides had to hit a stationary ball placed on the edge of the circle at the defending goalkeeper. This resulted in a 2-2 draw, and so with a crowd of some 200, the forward lines did the same-and Brooke kept brilliantly to give us a 2-1 margin.

The Final we should have won, having the better of the game despite losing an early goal. Wild shooting was the trouble but we equalised with five minutes to go. So on to extra time when we did everything but score, but allowed H.H.Y.C., from the Hague, to score from their only chance, to win 2-1 after a hard and exacting game.

Already in mid-February the School has plaved more hockey than it did in the whole season, and though early on the loss of la_ year's practice was noticeable, especially among those under sixteen and in the league sides, improvement has been rapid. It is always dangerous to make interim reports but a mere statment of fact shows that at least until 23rd February the School had a singularly successful season.

More junior hockey is being played than ever before, and the Colts, though disappointing in losing their first match to Dean Close showed marked promise in beating Wellington 4-2 two days later. The senior teams have had a very good run and the Second XI shows in its play and results-20 goals against 6 in winning three times and drawing twice in five matches-that if injuries or loss of form occur in the First XI there will be ample reserve strength.

The First XI, as I write, is unbeaten. A number of preparatory 'A' XI fixtures were played and positional experiments did much to find the right combination for the later games. Emslie moved to full-back and has tackled finely, while the half line of Talbot, most forceful at right-half, Campbell and Miller, has proved the mainspring of the team's success. Brooke made a number of cool saves and only five goals were conceded in seven matches. Townley and Easter, the two remaining colours in the forward line, have played well together and Easter has passed most constructively; whilst Haig has worked well and passed intelligently and Brunning and Tonkinson have run forcefully and shown an improving sense of position.

KEBLE COLLEGE were defeated in a game where the defence first showed its firmness and determination, and BROMSGROVE were beaten by a single goal in a match in which the forwards played with pattern and skill. A somewhat fortunate victory over DEAN CLOSE was followed by the overwhelming of WELLINGTON when the forwards at last allied ruthlessness in the circle to thoughtful approach work. There are still a number of tough matches to

follow but, whatever the results, the team has started well; a success gained by tireless covering and belligerent half-back support preparing the way for a forward line that has understood the importance of passing to an open space more than most previous School attacks.

HOCKEY 1964

The March issue of The Chronicle told briefly the 1 that Brooke was not called on once and the forstory of the season up till 23rd February, the story of four victories ending with that over Wellington by 6 goals to 2. That victory was the prelude to ten days of fine play by the XI. Hockey is not the best of spectator games but during this period the team was playing well enough to encourage more than usual to watch and find the effort worth while

At RADLEY there was a nil-all draw, though a three goal margin was deserved even if the defence did have some moments of uncertainty. This failure to score was the one unhappy element in the team's make-up though throughout the season the defence ensured that the team would not suffer heavily for it. What was important about the Radley match was that a capable side was now playing like a very good one. Four days later PANGBOURNE were entertained and beaten twonil. This time the defence so dominated the game

wards indulged in some quick and incisive passing, only to cast aside chance after chance as forward after forward lifted the head or shot fiercely wide. Every miss was forgiven if not forgotten when the XI defeated M.C.S. by two goals to nil, the first victory over this school since the war. For the seventh time in ten matches no goals were scored against the School, sure proof of the cool positioning of Brooke in goal, the firm tackling and sound covering of the two backs and the continued stranglehold that a fine half-back line held over opposing forwards. The School forwards again played with skill and this time took their share of chances shown the way by a brilliant first goal engineered by a change of direction by Easter and a through pass to the open space that Townley, on the left wing, was already running towards. The ball rattled against the backboards almost before one realised a goal was possible.

Just as the Spurs have come to realise the fickleness of the spectator surfeited with victory, so against BRADFIELD did the XI know that failure would not be appreciated. They played like jades, were outrun by a useful side, yet still showed signs of their old skill. A goal in the first minute was answered only in the last, but an unbeaten record was intact, though this record itself may well have been the cause of an over-confident and somewhat inept display. Still it takes a side of character to survive when playing badly. This was the forerunner of a sad anticlimax because two of the last three games were cancelled and the OCCA-SIONALS game was lost. The Occasionals brought up eight blues and showed the School how skilful a game hockey at the highest level can be. Their hitting and stopping were excellent, their change of pace and movement into the open space exemplary. Yet the School ought to have scored twice and lost 0-4.

The season with six wins and two draws in school matches and only one loss against clubs was an unqualified success especially as other teams carried on the good work, the Second XI and Juniors being unbeaten and only six games out of forty-three played by the School being lost. The XI earned that success by an understanding of their own limitations and by strength of tackle and purpose. Yet it was not just a powerful defence, letting in only four goals in nine matches before the Occasionals' game that brought victory, the forwards played better as a line until the last two games than any five for some years. If they could have scored the goals their play deserved they would have been a fine team, but lack of timing and balance at the crucial moment meant near misses not goals. Talbot, the captain, was a firm tackler and a fine positional player and striker of

the ball. He thoroughly deserved his place in the English Schoolboys' Trials. Townley, owing much to Easter's service, was a good left-wing by any standards, fast and direct, with a skill in centring all left wings would envy. He too gained an English Schoolboys' Trial. Of the others, Emslie, the best of a good defence became a full-back above the average, rarely missing a tackle, always strong in the circle; and Easter with clever stick-work was the one forward able to prise open defences by a pass unexpected in direction or timing. Brooke made few mistakes; Abbott, though prone to obstruct under pressure improved with every game and showed great determination; Campbell proved a strong centre-half, whilst Miller at lefthalf, though a slow runner, made up for it by sound sense of position, clean hitting and good timing of interception and tackle. The right wing pair, Haig and Brunning, worked well together, the former passing well and positioning himself most ably in defence, the latter centring sensibly; and Tonkinson, though failing near goal too often for a centre-forward, played constructively-next year he should make a very useful inside forward.



HOCKEY

The account has of necessity to be written at the end of the season: more is the pity this year as the XI ended on a bad note against Stowe, showing all those weaknesses one had feared before the term started, and which during the season they had done so much to overcome. With Tonkinson alone left of the highly successful 1964 side, a completely new team had to be modelled; and including as it did three of last year's 3rd XI and four Colts it must be considered successful in that it won six out of ten matches against generally stronger opposition than last year. They were a

willing side, keen and active in practice. Their control was above average but sometimes they lacked tactical appreciation and urgency, taking far too long to understand that in hockey the ball should be hit firmly rather than pushed for most direct passes, especially those capable of being cut off by an opponent.

The Eleven's success was founded on as successful and dangerous a forward line as I can remember. (Though the scoring touch deserted them for the last three matches, up to that point they had averaged over four goals a game.) Tonkinson and Radcliffe were two strong inside forwards. The captain, a powerful striker of short corners and a scorer of nine goals during the season, was the best user of the cross-pass and combined well with his centre-forward. Radcliffe, perhaps the most dangerous near goal scoring twelve times, had excellent control and fed his other forwards better and quicker as the season progressed. The remaining three forwards had many virtues: Whitehead though at times playing too deep shot quickly and followed up fast, harrying opposing defences busily; Barker on the right wing was quick and often had the beating of his half, though until the end of the season he wasted too many good opportunities by thoughtless centering; and Ironside struck his centres from the left beautifully though sometimes lacking the confidence to go on his own.

The defence let through 21 goals in ten matches, but did much that was good. They were too inconsistent to be impregnable, playing efficiently for most of the game but allowing a crop of glaring errors to occur at times. When opponents took advantage of these mistakes as they did in the first ten minutes of the M.C.S. and Stowe games then the team was in trouble. Hutchinson, at centre-half, had an unfortunate season: just as he was again dominating in mid-field after recovery from illness he was injured in a practice game and missed another fortnight's play. He was sometimes slow in defensive covering when he had missed the cross-pass and was prone to dribble too much, but against Radley and the Martyrs especially he showed strong form. Bennett was perhaps the most consistent of the defence, showing excellent timing of tackle and thoughtful distribution. At right-half Garne usually had control of his winger and supported his forwards intelligently though sometimes under-hitting; whilst on the other flank Pitt-Brown, though inconsistent, did much of valueimproving especially in his covering and quick distribution. Trench had moments of excellence but too often rushed his tackle and was too keen on playing the ball on the reverse side. Holford in gaol did little wrong, reacting quickly to the snap or fast shot though finding more difficulty with the slow ball.

The Eleven started well, winning the first four matches, scoring 17 goals to 5 against. The results surpassed expectations: the forwards were proving ruthless in the circle and the defence though dangerously stretched at times always saved themselves by the efficient covering at wing-half and Bennett's strong tackling. JESUS COLLEGE, a strong side by college standards, were beaten by two secondhalf goals after much last ditch defensive work and poor shooting had saved the School's goal in the first. At BROMSGROVE a goal came after much pressure but slack defensive work allowed the opposition to gain the lead after half an hour. From that point on the defence mastered their opposing forwards and Tonkinson scored three out of four goals that were added by the forwards. Though snapping up goals with welcome speed, the XI showed one of its early weaknesses: overclose passing between insides and resultant neglect of the wings. The whole XI played efficiently in beating DEAN CLOSE 3-1 after a hard-fought game in which the defence looked most compact; but against WELLINGTON though we led by the same score at half-time many frightening gaps had appeared in defence. In the second half the forwards gained complete mastery and scored four more times

So to the disappointment of the first loss, RAD-LEY winning 3-2 after an exciting and closefought game. The defence again showed marked improvement, but despite having the better of the tense second half, only one goal was scored to lessen the rather fortuitous 3-I lead Radley has established on the stroke of half-time. At PANG-BOURNE the forwards again played with verve though they were weakened by the withdrawal of Tonkinson to replace the injured Hutchinson. The defence, though capable of sound work, still was stretched to the limit and in the next game against a strong M.C.S. side was broken in the first ten minutes. Against a technically more skilful combination, the XI fought back strongly and were only 2-1 down at the beginning of the second half when Whitehead went off injured; though by the end they had to give way 4-2. The two club games were open and fast: a strong OCCA-SIONALS XI won 2-0 though the School forwards missed many good opportunities; and in perhaps the best game of the season, the MARTYRS, captained by John Davis, who this season played for the Midlands, were beaten 2-1 in a game in which the defence were at their most orderly. Three days later the STOWE match came as a sad anti-climax: only Tonkinson and Radcliffe could feel satisfied with their performance. It was annoying that a side that had done more than expected of it during the season, and played some fast, intelligent and skilful hockey

should end on that note. It is better in this account to remember the fire of the Dean Close game, the excellent efforts against Radley and the free-scoring of the Wellington, Bromsgrove and Pangbourne matches, and the spectacle of fast open hockey during the Martyrs encounter.

School hockey continues to flourish: of thirty-nine matches played by school teams, twenty-two were won and only eight lost; the Senior Leagues were of a higher standard than for some years and very even; and the Juniors all played a reasonable amount. The 1st XI had a thoroughly good season unlike the 'Cobblers'. which would have been even better but for a falling-away of their goal-scoring power in the last three matches. Of the schools only Wellington beat them (and the School were far from their best in this game); whilst Stowe, Bradfield, Pangbourne, Dean Close, Bromsgrove and Abingdon (played by an 'A' XI) were defeated. and a drawn game played with M.C.S. These

results were gained despite the loss of severa of the leading players during the season, and it was particularly unfortunate that mumps claimed Kirkpatrick for the first three school games and Bennett missed the last six because of a broken wrist.

It seemed at the beginning of the season that the 1st XI's defence would be strong, but early on it was less sure than one had hoped. The Wellington defeat made it clear what was wrong and from this moment on the team became far more demanding of themselves in their covering and movement onto the ball. It is particularly true of hockey that an enormous amount of work is done by those not in possession of the ball, and most of the valuable movement is that made in covering or moving with an open space. It is a pity that teams below the top game take so long to realise this and also that hockey should be as demanding physically in its way as rugger.

Hutchinson, the Captain, at centre-half, was a tremendous worker, and he it was who showed the way in defensive determination and in maintenance of pressure in attack. Bennett, until he was injured, was playing very well and becoming more venturesome (he was moving through at inside left when he fell and broke his wrist): it is sound policy for full-backs to play well up the field for they are then nearer to the inside forwards they mark and can stifle attacks early; but if this is done they must cover each other and work with their winghalves. Williams was extremely fast, a good tackler and coverer, and a sure stopper of the ball; whilst Wheeler, who deputised for Bennett, though rather slow, was reliable and willing to learn. The team was well served at wing-half: Garne usually had the measure of his winger and positioned himself well in attack and defence; and Scott-Harden was always fast onto the loose ball, and though he occasionally strayed dangerously from his wing was quick in recovery.

The forwards promised much and played forceful hockey throughout the term though they never scored the goals their play deserved. Radcliffe, the most experienced, controlled the line well, making good use of his wing where Rivett showed pace and skill, and opening up the game with hard-hit and accurate cross-passes. He has the ability also to split defences by putting the through-ball into the open spaces and Rivett began to see these openings more and more often as the term progressed. Kirkpatrick was a great worker and fed Kyle at centre-forward quickly and accurately though never seeming to strike up quite

the same rapport with Barker on the wing. He tended to hold on too long for the through pass to the wing to be effective, but in attack he was quick to push the ball through to Kyle with the centre-half wrong-footed after a crosspass from Radcliffe. Barker, like Rivett, was fast. and this year he centred thoughtfully and was willing to cut in and have a shot. Kyle, often off-balance early on, improved immensely and was a useful spearhead and willing harrier of defences.

The warm-up matches were promising, for KEBLE, the University 'Cuppers' winners, were held to a draw in a shortened game on a frozen pitch; and LINCOLN were defeated heavily. The BROMSGROVE match was therefore approached with confidence. They were a useful side though in heavy conditions they showed the demerits of close and square passing-a useful lesson for us to learn early in the season. Throughout the term the wings were given plenty of scope and the three insides never crowded one another. DEAN CLOSE were also defeated though out of many opportunities only one goal was scored. WELLINGTON were a successful side this season, but the team played much below form, the covering being woefully slack: it was disappointing to lose but much more pace and determination was shown after this rather weak performance. After a period of rain and no hockey PANGBOURNE were beaten in a close and exciting encounter, and BRADFIELD overwhelmed. Here the cohesion between defence and attack, and the change of direction in passing produced 20 minutes of excellent hocked though the superiority did not produce the goals it deserved till later in the match. The M.C.S. match should have been won easily with many unaccepted chances in the first half and sustained pressure generally. Their defence was quick and self-contained, and in the last five minutes the Eleven was lucky not to concede a goal in several hair-greying goal-mouth scrambles. In a somewhat scrappy game on an uneven pitch STOWE were defeated to bring the School matches to a satisfactory end. The two club games produced some of the best hockey of the term though both were lost. It was against the OCCASIONALS with five Blues and six Occasionals that the defence first proved its worth under sustained pressure, whilst the attack gave their seniors many anxious moments. The MARTYRS should have been beaten but were cool under pressure and took advantage of one mistake to win the game.

Now we sit back for a brief respite until over the Easter weekend the Eleven makes its first acquaintance with Continental hockey and social appetite. Who knows, a garbled account of the happenings may reach the Chronicle.



HOCKEY FIRST XI

The prospects for this season were not great. The forward line was almost ready-made, with three old colours and a judicious close season signing, but it was difficult to see where a really adequate defence would be found. In fact, if one judges by results, this year's eleven was as good as any we have had. The forwards scored an adequate number of goals, not quite as many as we had hoped, and as the season passed the defence progressed visibly from shakiness to reliability. In the last five matches only two goals were conceded.

The strength of the eleven is still not easy to pin down. In attack the thrust down both wings enabled us to go round, rather than try to get through, the defences, but the real virtue of the side was the complete absence of a weak link and the resulting mutual confidence which developed. It was also good to see a school side in which every member really knew how to run. and run fast, when not in possession of the ball. The forwards all moved into the open spaces without having to be told and the defence soon learnt the need to hurry back when beaten.

We started with two 'A' eleven fixtures, both against Keble College, and emerged with honours even. The season proper started with a match against Jesus College, but as the captain was away for the day he insists that it was really another 'A' eleven match. We lost by the only



goal to a really good college side, and gave the first signs that the season might not be too bad after all.

The first school match was against Bromsgrove, and a very remarkable game. The forwards played superbly. Verschuur showed just how useful he was going to be by waltzing past his wing half every time he got the ball, and hammering across a stream of beautiful centres. The inside forwards, Kyle, Kirkpatrick and Agerholm, produced combined movements at great speed. and we spent most of the second half in the Bromsgrove twenty-five. We drew one all. This was followed by our only defeat in a school match. Dean Close did not allow us to play as we had at Bromsgrove, and a hard fast game was lost in the last quarter of an hour, when for the first and last time, our defence was split open. A 1-0 lead became a 3-1 loss, and the season seemed to be going exactly as expected.

The turning point came three days later at Wellington. Kyle scored two really well taken goals, the second one the result of the best combined movement of the season, and a fine through pass from Kirkpatrick. The defence, with the wing halves Stephens and Thackeray in fine form, and Wheeler seemingly indefatigable, remained calm under pressure and a good win was obtained. When it was discovered that Wellington had not lost to a school since our visit two years earlier, morale rose perceptibly, and we went ill-shod and over-confident, to a muddy game at Pangbourne. One down in two minutes did not change the casual approach of some of the side, while the inability of some of the others to stand up, or turn fast, could well have cost us the game which we should have won more easily.

By the time we played Bradfield the defensive problems were largely solved, and we were never in any real danger of losing. With an over-fed Verschuur somewhat out of touch, Rivett fortunately had a field day on the left, but the forwards as a whole were a little disappointing, seeming to lack some of the cohesion which had been seen in previous games. It is once again pleasant to record a good win against M.C.S. As is so often the case, their hockey looked more cultured than ours, but we won deservedly because we kept up a pace that in the closing stages they could not equal. The team played very well, but it should be recorded that this was Allum's match. If he had not produced two dazzling saves in the first five minutes it is doubtful whether we would have got into the game. It would have been nice to finish the season with a really resounding win, but we had

to be content with a single goal against Stowe. One wondered whether a goal would ever come but, fittingly perhaps, Verschuur's stickwork provided that touch of real class which was needed, and Kyle, as ever, was there to score.

In conclusion mention should be made of the two most improved players of the year, Purdon and Baldwin, the full backs. Purdon hits a ball as well as any schoolboy one can remember, and Baldwin, discovered in a league game by a student teacher, developed into the outstanding member of the defence. In addition to the school matches we drew with the Occasionals and beat the Martyrs, to complete a most enjoyable and successful season.

Despite two cancellations the eleven has enjoyed a successful season. This was nearly a very good Colts XI indeed whose results fully reflect their ability. It was disappointing to have the matches against Wellington, Radley and Bloxham cancelled by the weather.

The strength of the side lay in the forward line who moved together well and were always dangerous in attack. On the right wing, Day showed pace and good control and could invariably beat his man on either side; he was often dangerous in the circle and scored two important goals. On the other wing, Ward H. C. applied himself assiduously to the task of doing the more difficult things. He could usually beat his man for pace on the outside but he must try to learn to get his feet round the ball to hit his cross-pass firmly. The three inside forwards. Badger, Crawshaw and Mischler, showed great promise and scored some goals of the highest class. Badger worked hard in an unobtrusive way and his first goal against Dean Close was a gem of opportunism. Crawshaw chased everything tirelessly and made up for any lack of ability with ceaseless effort. Mischler, both as captain and inside left, stamped his class on every game. He showed the ability to take a defence to pieces on his own and created many openings. These three inside forwards averaged just under three goals a match between them.

The halves always provided sound support to the forwards and Davies P.M., though crude at times, was most effective in attack. He soon learnt to run through the forwards and scored some exciting goals. Broadbent, at left half, was neat and compact, and his positional play could rarely be faulted. At right half, Davis E. M. J. K. improved with every game and covered tirelessly. The backs, Little and Rathbone, performed soundly but their lack of pace was exposed whenever they were under real pressure. Scott A. M., in goal, never let the side down, but he should try to be more aggressive and come out to meet the through pass.

The opening encounter at Abingdon resulted in an easy victory. This was followed by a visit to Dean Close where the rain necessitated our playing on the all-weather pitch, and once we had become accustomed to the pace we slowly got on top to record a good win. Pangbourne combined very well together though they were perhaps a little lucky to draw level late in the second half. Our visit to Bradfield was marred by an injury to Crawshaw who left the field after ten minutes. This upset the balance of the side and a goalless draw was a fair reflection of the

HOCKEY

FIRST XI

This year has been one of new systems: athletics has moved for a trial year to the Summer Term; house matches have been played, the first time for many years; and talk of sweepers and link-men has abounded. The weather has been magnificent; only four matches have been cancelled; there have been two rounds of Senior Leagues, one of Junior; and the pitches have been fast—everything right for hockey.

The season has therefore been an interesting one and the Eleven has played well enough to make hockey as near a spectator-sport as it can ever be, though only occasionally have they scored the goals their work and technical ability have merited. Perhaps it has been a certain lack of experience (only three old colours, all defenders, remained) that has led to anxiety and over-eagerness near goal; perhaps the new attacking formation itself with only four forwards put an undue strain on the strikers close to the goal-keeper's pads—though it must be admitted the chances have been made if not taken. Most has been the need of the players to think, to adapt to situations, to be flexible-for the system is based on close support and maintenance of pressure. Once players realised that this did not mean short passing only, but also meant quick hitting, and use of the through ball as well to the defender overlapping as in Soccer as to the wingers and centres, then a fascinating pattern of play emerged. Defensively the sweeper back gave much security (Jack improved with every game) though the new inside halves playing further upfield in attack and defence than the old backs led to occasional weakness in covering. In turn they stifled opposing inside forwards earlier, and the skilful Baldwin revelled in the attacking role. A thoughtful attacking mentality developed, and the hard work and clever stickwork needed for the close-supportand-possession play was much in evidence in this year's team.

With a new system to organise it was lucky that Rugger lasted only two weeks and the early matches instead of being much changed 'A' XIs were bona-fide 1st XIs with a win and a draw against strong College opposition. BROMSGROVE with 9 of last year's team were well-organised and fast; although the School were lucky to draw, the defensive advantages of the new order were obvious. WELLINGTON should have been beaten more heavily: not only were chances missed but defensive covering was slack. This vulnerability to the through ball almost proved disastrous against a RADLEY eleven who were outplayed in the first half and who threatened to annihilate their opponents in the second. The team panicked, lacked thought and were saved by Holmes in goal (who never let them down) and luck. After a poor game and a win over PANGBOURNE the Eleven reached maturity and began to play consistently entertaining and forceful hockey. The defence mixed skill in stickwork and sound technique in hitting and stopping with firmness and determination: they were hard and uncompromising yet with finesse (none more so than Stephens and Drake at wing-half). The attack. prompted by Thackeray in strong form throughout the season, played better and better, with strong running on the wings and the sharp speed and stickwork of Boyd linked to the work of Moss and after his injury, to the thoughtful dribbling and passing of Mischler. Everyone excelled themselves in the OCCA-SIONALS match (they had 9 of this year's Blues' side and the School's resident international). The Eleven covered tirelessly, tackled quickly and broke away effectively and fast in attack to score first: they only surrendered to a lucky goal in the last few minutes. M.C.S. came to watch, saw and were impressed, and a week later were conquered 3-0 in as good a display of intelligent forceful hockey as I've seen from a School XI: Boyd's last goal was one to remember for a long time. But in between these two fine games was the one and only defeat by a school, BRADFIELD, where the XI had all of the game. Holmes touched the ball once-to pick it out of the net-and the forwards, off-colour, missed many chances against a defence quick in the tackle and clearance. Early in the season before they had adapted themselves to the 'System' the School had been outplayed by Bromsgrove, now the MARTYRS did the same and in a fine display of control deservedly won 2-1-it might have been more.

The season was to recover from these three mid-term losses, two of them from very strong club sides. In the last two games STOWE were outplayed by 3—0 and were lucky to escape a drubbing; and finally DEAN CLOSE were defeated in a stern game. Here the defence showed its forceful qualities and toughness, whilst the Eleven as a whole showed for long periods in each half some skilful and attacking hockey against a very useful side.

Looking back over the season I can remember much of excellence in technique and style, some purple patches of attacking hockey, a number of brilliant goals (the one to put us into the lead at Dean Close was typical, with attacking half-back play, an easy dribble and reverse pass by Boyd for Mischler to push home) and an even greater number of misses. Above all the hockey was inventive and looked fun. For the statistically-minded, against schools 5 matches were won, 2 drawn and 1 lost (a game we could have won handsomely): a record to maintain those of last season and previous seasons when only 6 school matches have been lost and 28 won in 5 years and 39 games.







It was most encouraging to see the way people were prepared to practice at the basic skills and it was particularly gratifying to hear one of the City of Oxford players comment on the quality of the basic skills. He developed an excellent cross-pass to the inside right The forward line was quite skilful and its approach play was sound. Thursfield on the right wing played most of his matches at centre-forward. Often he created room for himself only to fail to use it. On the right wing he found the extra space an asset, but did not always centre hard enough. Buck, at inside-right, produced some good performances, but was reluctant to move the ball to his wing early enough Wilson started the season at full-back, where he played quite successfully, but for the last three matches he reverted to centre-forward; here he gave more aggression and thrust to the forward line. Edwards, a Colt last year, gained useful experience this season and should be a real asset in the next two seasons. A skilful player, he must learn to move a good deal during the season and his timing of the ball more quickly and to realize that he has no need to panic. He combined well with his left wing, Hammond. As a side we used our left side in attack much more effectively than the right. While this is unusual in schoolboy hockey it gave our attacks a lack of balance. The old adage of 'attack down the right and finish on the left' was not too obvious our play. However, it was good to see the left being used. Hammond developed well over the season and learnt to centre the ball well on the run

In the first two matches, against Abingdon and Pangbourne, we created no fewer than forty chances and had no goals to show for them. If goals had come in these matches the results for the season would have looked a good deal better and would undoubtedly have given the confidence to the side necessary to play consistently. Against the City of Oxford the 1st XI produced one of its best performances. With hard work and courage they gained a deserved draw. The losses against Radley and Bradfield were disappointing, especially as good chances were squandered in both games. The Occasionals produced a strong side and with John McBryde at centre-half the side was given a magnificent example of the basic skills of hockey being used at their simplest. Against M.C.S. we played really well and were unlucky to lose by a goal in the closing stages of the game; again there were chances missed On an excellent pitch in pouring rain we recorded our only win of the season against Wellington. A well-contested match we were a little lucky to win. Only in the final match against Dean Close did the side do themselves less than justice. Dean Close deserved their win and the only excuse for us was that it was our first outing on our own pitches for nearly two weeks.

So a disappointing season from results and weather, but one in which much useful experience was gained. With four of the side returning next season this should be invaluable.

Again I would like to put on record our appreciation of the groundsmen and his staff for all the work they put in on our behalf. Whether it is supplying the or rolling pitches their efficiency and efforts are a vital contribution to our enjoyment of the game. Very many thanks.

First XI

This season was approached with mild confidence. Four old colours and several of last year's second eleven suggested that we could do so. However, in the end, this was a most disappointing season. At their best the side was capable of playing incisive and attractive hockey but at their worst they could produce a lack-lustre performance. Once results started to go against them there was a certain lack of conviction that they could ever win again. One of the important differences between hockey and other sports is that it is often very difficult to translate dominance into goals. This weakness pervades all levels of hockey. To a certain extent the more one strives in the game to score goals, the more difficult it is to do so. So often when we were a goal or so down the side tried desperately hard to do something about this, but all too often the result was to stop playing hockey. In hockey one depends so much on the player who can keep his composure when the pressure is on and who keeps trying to play hockey. Anyway what of the side? In goal Todd played

consistently well and brought off some exceptional saves. To blame himself for every goal scored against us was far too harsh a judgement on himself! At full-back, Scragg and Higgins played well individually but on occasions lacked composure. Scragg started the season at right-half, where he played several good games, but was moved to full-back to give the defence more pace. This he did and his covering at times was magnificent. His hitting was quite good but he failed to use the pass to the right-wing. Higgins at the start of the season looked uncertain in his game. On occasions he used the reverse stick when he could easily have moved his feet round the ball. However, his game steadied and he was generally sound in the tackle even if he was a little slow on the turn.

The half-back line was good in attack but at times relied on the full-backs to cope with the oncoming forwards. Hinton was an excellent performer when going forward and his distribution improved as the went on. He lacked confidence in himself but with this season behind him ought to be a real force next year. Mackaness, the captain, was sound at centre-half. He led the team well both on and off the field and demanded high standards from his side As a captain his main weakness has been to allow his dispiritedness to affect his game. His performances in the early part of the season were dominant and the fact that he was the main goal scorer was indicative of this. At left-half Mason was playing out of position. More used to centre-half and the freedom of that position, he found it difficult to discipline to the defensive nature of his new himself He had one or two disastrous games. However, when he was attacking he looked a real force. He is a hardworking, hard-running player who needs to learn to look around him more.

The forwards in the opening games looked pro-mising but found it difficult to finish off their approach work. If there is a fundamental criticism of the side, it was that they failed to attack down the wings. The pass out of defence was directed towards the centre-forward. However, the shortest way to goal is down the wings and the sides who attack down them invariably stretch the defence. It was most disappoining that Edwards, the secretary, was only able to play in the latter stages of the season. His acceptance of his disappointment was an example to all and his efficiency and interest in the side as secretary was excellent. On the wings we had Aubrey on the right and, in the end, Gill on the left. Aubrey's speed was not utilised nearly enough. When he did get clear of his half he created havoc with the opposition. This happened too infrequently and often he marred his opportunities by failing to hit the ball cleanly enough. At inside-right Catling played some excellent games. His skill was obvious but at times he held onto the ball too long. He failed to get his right-wing away consistently. Hancock, the centreforward, was a strong player and his confidence to take the opposition on was effective. However, too often he was forced to do so from too far out with the result he very rarely finished off the incisive run. The fact that he did not do so was not entirely his fault In mid-field he failed to get support he needed. He often looked for a player to give the ball to but there was no one close to him. His main weakness has been that on occasions he allowed his head to drop. At inside-left Buck again produced some good performances, notably against Stowe when he scored a hat-trick. Generally he was constructive with his

assing and linked well with others around him. gill started the season at inside-left and was the most constructive of all the forwards. What he lacked in speed he made up for in skill. At inside-left he played well, but at times faded from the game. When moved to the wing he produced some telling centres but lacked the pace to round his half. So much for the team. We started the term some

So much for the team, we started the term some-what hesitantly with a draw against the Oxford Bulls. Against not a very strong Chletenham side we played some good team hockey but failed to put our supre-macy to good advantage. We deservedly won against Abingdon. Then we had a week's bad weather and the match against Pangbourne was cancelled. We travelled to play Radley reasonably confident that we would do well against our old rivals. During the first twenty minutes we created two good scoring chances which we failed to put away. Within ten minutes of half-time we were three goals down, the first goal of which we allowed to unsettle us. The other two goals were from shorts, both of which should have been saved on the goal-line. We scored before half-time. The second half deteriorated, both sides content to allow the game to become physical. We scored ten minutes from the end and pressed hard We scored ten minutes from the end and pressed nard for the equaliser which we failed to achieve. Against Bradfield we were deservedly beaten. They were quicker to the ball and moved it well. The match against the Occasionals was a good performance in that we created scoring chances, but we let them score three times very much against the run of play. M.C.S. and Wellington were hard games. In the first game we allowed them too much room in open play and they skilfully took advantage. However, we scored two good goals in open play. Wellington were unbeaten when they came to play us. In the first half we played some constructive hockey and ought to have been at least a goal up. However, they were then 4-2 up because they performed their set pieces more efficiently than us. In the end we lost 5–3. The Martyrs was a disappointing per-formance and we failed to translate first half domination into goals. Against Stowe we played better. Both defences gave a lot away and the score ought to have been much higher with the chances created at both ends. In the end we just deserved to win; we scored three goals in as many minutes which took the heart out of the opposition. Dean Close was a strange game, and they were the better side. How-ever, the score suggests a heavy defeat but certainly they did not dominate to that extent.

All in all it was a mixed season. Certainly we ought to have done better. There are talented hockey players here and once they believe in their abilities I am convinced that they will produce consistent results.

THE OXFORD HOCKEY FESTIVAL



team and as soon as individuals become selfish and go it alone, then the cohesion and team work of the side is all too easily lost. This has been in no way true of this side. In mid-field they have moved the ball efficiently and quickly and attacked down the wings. As a result they have created many chances. even against the best opposition and have been an attractive and entertaining side to watch. Certainly many more people have watched this term and one person who watched the final match was heard to say, 'If I had known that it was so enjoyable, I would have come to watch more matches.' The measure of the entertainment has been the fact that 40 goals have been scored. The style of the side has not been rigid and it has been encouraging to see the inventiveness of all players. A willingness to try new moves and to pass the ball first time put extra pressure on the opposition. Even if it did not always succeed frustration was not allowed to creep in.

The side was a well-balanced one. All players worked at the basic skills of hitting and stopping and learnt the art of moving the ball on quickly and accurately. The six-a-sides played on the tennis courts certainly helped in this greatly. The side was mobile, fast and competitive, but at no time did they question the umpire's decisions; thus they enabled themselves to get on with the task of playing good hockey.

The side has been excellently skippered by G. E. T. Mason both on and off the field. On the field he led by example and unlike some captains he was hardly heard by the spectators. But this did not mean he was not offering encouragement, advice or rebuke. As a player he was tireless and his distribution to both wings in particular was first rate. He supported his forwards well and was always available to the pass in mid-field. The only sadness was that he failed to get on the score sheet. In goal N. J. R. Haddock was a tower of strength. He gave confidence to the rest of the defence, especially in the early part of the season. He made several outstanding saves and saved two penalty strokes out of the three given against us. He also was most positive in his clearances out of the circle. On one occasion he gave away a short when he kicked the ball over the twenty-five yard line full toss on to the stick of the opposition's left-wing! At full-back we were well served by C. Hinton and J. D. Reid. They became a formidable pair and understood each other's play almost intuitively. Hinton, a reluctant convert to the position, timed his tackle well and distributed the ball efficiently. He was also most mobile often covering behind the defence effectively. Reid, at left-back, improved greatly over the season. He hit the ball cleanly from the sixteen-yard and was often able to find the centreforward on the half-way line. As short corner taker he became a force to be reckoned with. He scored ten goals in all, nine in the last four games.

The half-back line was a fine attacking one. They supported the forwards whole-heartedly, if somewhat ambitiously. M. S. Scragg moved back to right-half after last season. He distributed the ball well and timed the overlap on the right with precision. As secretary he was most conscientious and organised the ball boys particularly well. At left-half C. A. M. Reid improved enormously. In the early part of the season he tended to overcommit but as the season went on he timed his interception well. He learnt too to play the cross ball to the inside-right, a most telling pass.

The forwards were well-balanced and, as I have said before, most inventive. They learnt the art of passing

the ball quickly, often first time. This caused untold problems to opposition defences, throwing them offbalance at crucial moments. On the right wing, R. Hancock performed impressively. Last season he was centre-forward, but the right-wing looked more his position. He enjoyed the extra room, and was well served by the side. He ran powerfully and centred well. At inside-right H. Blackett played well and fed his wing. Usually he could be found by the defence and he distributed the ball accurately. Next season he should be a force to be reckoned with. J. Edwards, formerly an inside, moved to centreforward. Here he caused tremendous problems to the opposing teams. He was tireless in his running and was prepared to take the opposition on with skilful stickwork. The measure of his influence was the fact that he was top scorer with eleven goals. The left wing partnership of S. Gill and A. Munsey contrasted with the rest of the forwards. Although not so quick they were skilful and shrewd in their passing. S. Gill improved over last season and could always be found in good positions. A. Munsey started the season rather sluggishly but with each match he gained in authority and was an excellent taker of half-chances. N. Karim was a worthy substitute and played in four games. P. Thom played in the first two games, but was unfortunate to break his arm in training.

The season began with a fixture against the Oxford Bulls whom we beat easily 5-0, Edwards scoring four goals. The first school match was against Pangbourne and, although we won easily in the end, there were shaky moments in defence. The match against Radley was a wonderful game of hockey. The first half performance must rank as the best hockey played during the season. The irony of it was that having had all the pressure we were a goal down after fifteen minutes. However, we did not allow this to unsettle us and scored three times in a ten minute spell at the end of the half. The second half was less spectacular and there were no further goals. Against Cheltenham we produced a more complete performance. After an even first fifteen minutes we took control of the game and deservedly won 5-0, Hancock's goal being a fine solo effort. Hockey

It has been encouraging to see that the game is being enjoyed and is flourishing throughout the The only sadness has been that the early school part of the season was marred by bad weather and flu. However, March proved to be a reasonable month and hockey functioned throughout the school. The Senior House matches competition was won by Field who defeated Cowell's 4-0. They were a strong side with four members of the first eleven and several of a strong second eleven. In the Junior final Apsley met Field. It was a fine game of hockey and Field were narrow winners, scoring a penalty.

1st XI

With three members of last year's unbeaten side and several members of the seconds this season promised to be reasonable. In the event the side was unbeaten by other schools for the second year running. Again it was encouraging to see that the hockey played was attractive. The side was not as balanced as last year's but the boys always promised to score lots of goals. They averaged almost four goals per game which is high by any standards. When we attacked down the wings, the opposition was always put under pressure, but there were occasions when we did not play to this strength. The defence was sound and increased in confidence as the term went by. With the weather so bad in the early part of the term team selection was very difficult and a settled side was only found in the final four matches of the season. There were disappointments for players in the second XI aspiring for first eleven places and Weller had every reason to feel hard done by; he was dropped after playing in a side that had defeated Radley 5-1. From this it can be deduced that there was hard competition for places and in the end the weather and illness made selection very difficult indeed. The side was well captained by Blackett who set very high standards for himself and the rest of the team. His feel for the game improved as the term advanced and he did not allow his side to let up when on top. An example of this was in the Dean Close game when he urged the side to greater efforts; eventually they were to win 9-2 after being 5-1 up at half-time. As a player his game improved enormously and his vision of pass increased. He used his wing well and made good use of the cross pass. He under-used the through ball but had the confidence to take on the opposition when the occasion demanded.

In goal Asbridge proved an able successor to Nick Haddock and with next year in the side he ought to become a class performer. He gave his defence a great sense of security; he positioned himself well, had quick reactions and was extremely mobile and courageous. In the end the backs were Clifford and Jones, both converted from the half-back line, Clifford played consistently through the season and learnt to time his tackle efficiently. Jones was mobile and hit the ball very hard which was most helpful in relieving pressure. His sixteen yard hits invariably found our men. Both backs improved their distribution and played well together.

The half-back line was sound and as they gained in confidence supported their forwards well. Lewis won the vote for right-half and played a sound orthodox game. He was dropped in mid-season only to regain his place immediately through illness. From then on his game improved; he marked his wing well and timed his interception successfully. He linked effectively with his wing and inside. Reid eventually found his way to centre-half. Although not a natural in this position, he adapted to it well. His distribution improved as the season progressed although at times he broadcasted his pass and committed himself to the tackle with little chance of success. At left-half Church proved a redoubtable performer. He marked his wing well and increased in skill enormously although there were occasions when his competitive instincts allowed him to give away unnecessary short corners.

We were fortunate to have a strong forward line. On the right wing Lawless was a tower of strength. He had pace and skill and, when he learns the art of hitting, will be an even better player. His main weakness has been that he loses concentration and fades from the game. He scored one or two vital goals and linked well with the rest of the forward line. Mallalieu, a complete outsider at the start of term, filled the centre-forward position and with nine goals in six matches deserved his selection. He often caught the opposition out by his long reach and his awkwardness of style. At inside-left Munsey constantly caused problems through his close dribbling and astute passing. If there was a weakness in his play it was a tendency to overdribble, but for all that he had a fine season. He scored sixteen goals, which must be

a record, from both set pieces and open play. In two seasons he did not fail to convert a penalty stroke. On the left-wing Isard was playing out of position. He adapted to it quite well and with more experience will be a force to be reckoned with. Both his hitting and concentration let him down but he did score three important goals. Ewart played centre-forward for the early matches and with his speed caused problems to the opposition but often his control let him down at the crucial moment. Weller played soundly in his two games, but was prone to overcommitting himself in the tackle.

In the first game we defeated Pangbourne 4-1 scoring three goals late on. We played quite well but the defence looked vulnerable to the quick break. Against Abingdon we had a good first half, but we failed to take control as we ought to have done. We won 3-1, but not without giving the opposition hope of success. The game against Bradfield was played on the hard pitch at Pangbourne. It was frozen and this made control difficult for both sides. We allowed this to bother us and although we had enough chances to win in the end we were fortunate to draw. The next match was against R.D.A.'s eleven, a side raised by P.G.B. and R.D.A. It was a strong side with a number of internationals and county players. The eleven defended strongly and the score at half-time was nil-all. In the twenty minutes after half-time R.D.A.'s eleven played some excellent attacking hockey and scored six goals. But the School were not to be outdone and Munsey, with an impudent scoop, and Mallalieu scored. The match with the Occasionals was a fine example of open hockey; both sides were committed to attack and the School were unlucky to lose 5-4. These two games set us up for our encounter with Radley. In this game we played extremely well and in the end overcame their defensive system powerfully. Against M.C.S. we allowed them to gain a 3-1 lead against the run of play but with great character came back to draw. The performance against Wellington was magnificent; we took control of the game from the start and played some fine attacking hockey using the right wing forcefully. We created many chances and in the end won well. The Martyrs were individually a strong side, but failed to press home their early control. Eventually the eleven won well. The match against Stowe was a poor game-neither side adapting to the conditions which were tricky. The final match against Dean Close produced our biggest win; late in both halves we took our chances well. Munsey scored the only hat-trick of the season. So we finished the season strongly which had started a little uncertainly.

Hockey

To try and review this season without mentioning the weather is an impossibility. Snow and frost have eaten into our fixtures and only the first eleven have been able to play more than half their fixtures. In all, throughout the school, only thirty-three matches were played of the seventy-seven scheduled. Although this does not indicate a total disaster, it was most disappointing for all players. To spend the previous day in preparation for a match only for it to be cancelled was an all too frequent occurrence.

The game continues to be enjoyed at all levels: senior house leagues enthusiastically organised by J.J.McP. were keenly contested when they took place. This year for the first time for several years the fifth eleven was easily filled. Sadly none of their three matches were played. At the junior level too, the story is the same. The junior house competition proved to be a great success with much good hockey being exhibited in all the games; this can only augur well for St. Edward's hockey. It is encouraging to see groups of boys practising on the pitches even in the foulest of conditions. This enthusiasm is impressive for practice is the essence of improving an individual's skills. So let us hope that next year will bring us kinder weather and that this keenness can be built upon

1st XI

With five old colours and another player with first team experience there was an optimistic mood at the start of the season. Further to this there was a lot or competition to gain a place in the top two sides. Certainly there were a lot of players of second eleven standard, but the tougher standard of first eleven hockey proved too big a hurdle for some. Selection then was very difficult. It was further exacerbated by the poor weather. In the event the side was never really settled and in the eight matches no fewer than nineteen players were used. In the early part of the season it was difficult to find the necessary time to practise the basic skills; what time there was was used in game practice for the next match. If there was one weakness that pervaded the team, it was poor hitting. This did improve in the later stages of the season, but it did prove to be our downfall in several of the matches. At the start of the season it looked as though we were going to find it difficult to score goals; this proved to be so and only in our three victories did we take our chances. The forwards often created chances, but failed to exert the pressure that goals scored inevitably bring

Even if our results overall may appear disappointing, much good hockey has been played. The atmosphere in the side has been a pleasant one; there has been a willingness to learn and as a result much progress has been made. In goal, Asbridge played with commendable consistency and brought off many fine saves. His speed of reaction and recovery mark him out as a fine prospect. It was most disappointing for him that he was unable to play for the South (West Division) U-19 side which was to have been a trial to see whether he was worthy of an England trial. At full-back Clifford and Walter formed a useful partnership. Neither were really hard hitters of the ball which was exposed when they were put under

pressure. Clifford took time to get into his stride; he timed his tackle well and his distribution was sound. Walter improved greatly over the season and his competitiveness was never in doubt. His distribution to the forwards became much more controlled and accurate and he learnt not to commit himself in the tackle in impossible situations. The half-back line was never settled. Schuster-Bruce started the season at centre-half, but lost form. However, after two games in the seconds he recovered his steadiness and began to assert himself effectively in the middle culminating in a fine performance against Upping ham. Brown played three games at centre-half Although not very quick over the ground, he made up for this by sound positional play. He was moved to left-half which he did not find to his liking. However, he deputised most ably for Clifford in the final match against Uppingham. At right-half, Lewis played sensibly and often most imaginatively. His support of his forwards was excellent and often created the extra pressure needed in attack. If there is one criticism of his play it was his "soft" passing on occasions. Greenish started the season at left-back and then moved to left-half. He was beginning to assert himself in this position when he unfortunately dislocated a thumb. Initially he tended to wait for the right wing or inside to come to him, but he improved in his positional play and developed a fine cross pass to the inside-right

The forwards played well on occasions, but often failed to translate pressure into goals. Lawless started on the right wing, which is probably his best position, but because he was not given enough of the ball was moved to inside-right. Here he developed as a player and asserted pressure on all defences with his close control. Sometimes he was prone to take on the opposition from too far out with the result he had too many men to beat. His passing improved and he developed a good understanding with the other forwards. As a captain he led by example on the field and came to read the game pretty shrewdly. His goal against Uppingham rounded off a fine season for him. In the end Burrows was selected for the right wing position. He gained good experience this year and showed some quite good close control. He must learn to beat his man from further out. He tended to take the ball too close to his half. At centre-forward, Ewart started the season with a hat-trick against Cheltenham, but failed to score again till the final match. In the first half of the season he tended to hang on to the ball for too long and to move to the left-hand corner flag. As a result he often nullified the value of his pace. However, in mid-season he started to give the ball in midfield to telling effect and with more luck would have scored more goals. He celebrated the news that he had gained a Welsh Trial with a fine individual goal against Uppingham. Smith, at inside-left, was the most improved player of the side. In the early part of the season he tended to lose control of the ball, but suddenly in mid-season he learnt the art of using his reverse stick and as a result created the time needed to pass the ball. Isard started the season at left-wing and played some reasonable games before he lost form. His stick work improved but all too often his hitting let him down when he had created space for himself. In the end,

Heeley moved to left-wing. He is a stylish and skilful player, but mars his performance by hanging on to the ball for too long and failing to give the early ball. On the left-wing he showed deft touches and produced some telling centres. On occasions he took time to get involved in the game.

We started the season with a five-nil victory against Cheltenham. This flattered us: when the score was 2-0 the opposition failed to convert two penalty strokes. However, Ewart scored a fine hat-trick including a goal within seconds of the start. Asbridge in goal brought off several fine saves. Against Radley we produced a lack-lustre performance. In the first ten minutes we had several chances which we failed to utilise. In this game our hitting was very poor and gave Radley the opportunity to put us under great pressure. Lawless was recovering from 'flu and his experience was certainly missed. In the next match against Bradfield we again failed to take our chances. In the first half we played most penetratingly but in the end we allowed Bradfield to take charge and they deservedly beat us 1-0. The match against Marlborough was played despite the snow. The pitch was soft but free from snow by the start of the game. This was the first time the fixture has been played and it produced an excellent game of hockey. We started strongly and produced some fine hockey on the right only to let them score from their first short corner. Marlborough then put us under considerable pressure. Just before half-time we scored a fine equaliser. In the second half both goals were under pressure and both goalkeepers brought off some fine saves. One of Asbridge's was in the "Shilton" class. In the end Marlborough scored again and survived some near misses to win. The Occasionals were an experienced side and beat us easily 4-1. Against M.C.S. we recovered our winning ways. In this game we took control of the midfield and Smith had a fine game scoring two goals-even if he did miss a number of

chances in the second half. The match against Wellington was played in spite of the snow and rain. The gamë revealed our inability to put away chances. Welington were deservedly ahead 2—0 at half-time. At the start of the second half we put them under intense pressure and could have scored several goals. In the end this evaporated and Wellington scored a further goal. We saved our best performance till the last match when we beat Uppingham 4—0. As a side we played some excellent hockey and the measure of our control of the game was the fact that Asbridge did not have any real shot to save. If our short corner drill had been better we might have had more but this was to let us down as it had done on other occasions.

So this has been a season of mixed fortunes. But overall it has been a happy season in which there have been some high moments when we could see what might have been if everything had slotted into place at the first attempt.

Hockey

Normally the hockey report opens with a complaint about inclement weather and water-logged pitches. but this year there can be no complaints except that March might have been warmer! Almost all the school matches were played this year and boys throughout the school were able to enjoy an almost unbroken term's hockey. This of course is vital if a boy is going to learn the

rudiments of the game. When the weather is bad the initial flush of enthusiasm is very often quickly eroded. The majority of boys who join the school have never played the game and so it is vital that they should have a period of learning the game, as it is a game which puts a high premium on individual skill.

There is every evidence that the game is being enjoyed throughout the school. Although the junior sides were not outstanding, it is clear that there are At the senior end of the school the top three sides were most successful. The first lost only two games. and the seconds and thirds are to be congratulated on unbeaten seasons. With twenty boys of those three sides returning next year, the future looks promising.

1st XI

With only one old colour of last season this was quite clearly to be a year of building in which we expected to be under pressure. The competition for places was keen, and as can be seen from the results of the top two sides there was not much between them. In the end the side was most successful which meant that there were few changes during the season. Some members of the second eleven were therefore disappointed, but they should take heart not only because they enjoyed an unbeaten season, but also because success can be achieved after they leave school. Two previous members of the school, one from the seconds and one from the thirds, have been playing this year for Buckinghamshire U. 21's.

In the trial games many players were content to pass the ball diagonally, usually to the left, and there was little constructive hockey played. But eventually people learnt to pass the ball square and through. Although there was the pressure of matches, more time was spent on basic skills than in any of the previous three seasons. It is important for players to realise that these skills need practising and that they do not survive unless they do so. It was encouraging to see all members of the first game working at their skills and then to see them trying them out in matches. For instance it is vital to use the reverse stick and many learnt the value of this during the season, either in getting out of trouble or in beating a man on his reverse stick side.

Now to the team itself. It has been a pleasant one to be associated with. There has been a good atmosphere throughout the season, and the success of the side clearly helped in increasing individual's confidence.

In goal, Offen played consistently and with increasing authority. It is always good to hear a goal keeper talk to his defence and this he did constructively. His positional play was sound and his speed of reaction improved enormously. If he gave confidence to his backs, they too reciprocated. Aston and Stevenson provided a solid pairing of contrasting styles. Aston was the find of the season. Last season he was in the 4th XI (take heart 4th XI!) and not really considered before term began. He proved to be immensely strong in the tackle and quick in his covering. His hitting was good but sometimes he found it difficult to decide what to do when he came through with the ball. Stevenson J. made the left back position his own after a disastrous game against Radley where he had spent much of the game falling over. But with true grit he worked at his game. His tackling was excellent especially in the circle and, although not quick, he became much more mobile.

The half-back line was well-balanced. Elliott, at right half, showed immense skill and when he supported

his forward line in attack posed lots of problems with his deft dribbling. Defensively he was less sure, sometimes giving the opposition too much room. With a little more strength and pace next year he should become a fine attacking right half. Schuster Bruce, the captain, was tireless at centre-half. He supported his forwards well and made good use of his wings. Sometimes he held on to the ball too long, but generally he used the ball well. As a captain he was excellent. He led the side by example and encouraged his team sensibly. At left half, Samuel had an excellent season. His positional play was marvellous. Although not particularly fast, he was never hurried and no winger was able to get the better of him. He is perhaps a little defensive at the moment, but next season we should see him coming forward more.

The forward line took time to settle. In the end Ayrton gained the right wing position. Once he gained confidence he played well and in the final three matches was prepared to take on his half and beat him on the outside. At inside right, Young played in fits and starts. At times he faded from games and at other times he was very sharp. His basic skills improved and by the end of the season he was moving the ball to his wing quite successfully. Lamb had a fine season at centre forward. He was tireless in his running and was constantly probing opposition defences. Perhaps we relied in his running roo much. He scored eleven goals, a number of those from wellstruck short corners. With the experience of this year behind him and with his determination he has a rosy future. Griffin was inside-left for all but two of the matches. He played well on occasions, but at times he tended to hang on to the ball too long or to pass loosely. On the left wing Burrows showed increasing confidence. He worked at his control and eventually learnt the importance of keeping the ball on the right. He scored three important goals against Radley, Bradfield and Dean Close.

We started the season with a good win against an experienced Pangbourne side. In the first half we sustained a good deal of pressure, but managed to get on level terms at half-time. In the second we dominated and scored two good goals in open play, both scored by Lamb. In our second match against Abingdon we played quite well and looked effective when we attacked down the right wing. Too many passes were misdirected, but in the end we deserved to win two nil.

In the match against Cheltenham our finishing let us down and we tended to attack down the middle. We played some good team hockey, but allowed them to win with a late goal. Against Radley we started quite well and scored an early goal in open play. In the second half Munsey, Gill and Edwards exerted enormous pressure, but were only able to score once. The Martyrs' short corner drill fortunately was lacking.



1st XI

Expectations were high at the start of this season. With seven old colours in residence and several members of last year's second team it looked as though the first ought to be a strong side. The side took a little time to settle, but in the end had a good season winning seven out of the nine school games. At their best they played constructive and imaginative hockey, but there were times when they became preoccupied with passing the ball to the left. The old adage of "attack down the right and finish on the left" is still the most valuable tactic and when we did so we looked a good side. The reliance on the long ball down the middle too was another weakness. Too many sides with their systems fail to remember the importance of width in attack and certainly we failed in this respect on occasions

The side was reasonably balanced. The defence was sound, only conceding seven goals in the school matches and having five clean sheets. In attack we went in fits and starts, but could play controlled attacking hockey. There were times when the side failed to translate dominance into goals.

In goal Offen took time to settle and find the form of last season. Goalkeeping is so much a matter of not too certain early on. But he showed determination and ended the season well. The two full backs settled into a sound combination. Arkell grew in confidence, was firm in the tackle and constructive in his use of the ball. His striking of the short corners was formidable, scoring six goals, Stevenson played consistently and his tackling in and around the circle was exceptionally well-timed and firm. He was not always accurate in his passing. Against Bradfield he surprised everybody and himself; having tackled someone well in his own half he found himself with just sweeper to beat Unfortunately fatigue set in and he lost the ball!

The half-back line was well-balanced. Elliott at right half showed deft touches in attack. His welltimed dribbles into the circle caused problems to all defences and against the Martyrs he scored a memorable goal. At times he allowed his left wing too much room. Hayward took a little time to find his feet at centre half. But when he did he supported his forwards well and defended solidly. Samuel, the Captain, started the season a little uncertainly but in the end found his form. His positional sense was excellent and his distribution was good. As a captain he led by example and encouraged his players sensitively and firmly

In the end Smith secured the right wing position At times he was tentative in his approach; when he took his half on he showed skill and produced good centres. With this experience he ought to mature into a powerful player next season. Young, at inside right, had a good season and at times showed marvellous skill. Sometimes he faded out of the game but the side always threatened when he was in action. His goal against Bradfield was memorable At centre forward Lamb had a "Jeckyll and Hyde" season. When he did what was wanted of him he played well, but on occasions he forgot that there were others around him. In the final matches of the season he played nearer his 1980 form. Against

Stowe he set up the two goals by passing at the right time. Blanchard started the season at left wing, but with injury he was moved to inside. Here he showed some deft touches, but on occasions disappeared from the game. His distribution was not his strong suit and he was happier taking on the opposition Ayrton moved to left wing for the second half of the season and looked much happier in that position. His judgement as to when to centre was uncertain. but his tortuous dribbles always posed problems.

In the first match we allowed ourselves to be beaten by failing to adapt to the conditions and by selfishness, and in the end Pangbourne deserved their win. Against Abingdon we produced a much more constructive performance and won well. Against Cheltenham we took time to settle and we did not control the midfield as we should have done.

The first half against Radley was excellent. We produced some fine attacking hockey and created some clear chances, but our shooting was not on target. We paid dearly for this and Radley scored an opportunist goal to win the match. Our second half performance was very poor; we failed to move the ball right at all. The match against Bradfield was an exciting contest, with both sides producing some fine attacking hockey. Young's goal was clinical in its execution as was the swiftness of the passing that led to the chance. Against Wellington we produced a more balanced performance and after an uncertain start we won well.

The jubilee game attracted a large crowd and they were not disappointed. In the first half the eleven dealt effectively with the skills of P. J. Wilson, J. Webb and I. Sobey and deservedly were leading at half time. In the second half the invitation side applied more pressure and in the end won quite comfortably. It was a fitting celebration and the standard of hockey was very high.

Against M.C.S. we did not build our attacks too tidily, but we won with plenty to spare. The Martyrs match was played at Radley on their hard pitch and we were fortunate to win two-nil with goals in the first and last minutes. The skills of H. Blackett and C. Mackaness put us under enormous pressure, but fortunately the Martyrs' shooting was found wanting.

In the final two games we beat both Stowe and Dean Close two-nil on their hard pitches-oh, for a hard pitch! In both games we took time to settle and our second half performances saw us through.



Like the curate's egg this season has been good in parts. The results have been adequate with only two losses. However, taking a close look at the season it is fair to say that we could have achieved better results than we did. In some games we played really well and in others we played in fits and starts.

With five old colours, one player of first eleven experience and players from last year's successful second eleven, the omens were favourable. There was therefore plenty of competition for places. Obviously some players would have been disappointed at not being selected. Hockey is a game that requires consistency and self-discipline and these at times were lacking in the side. On occasions too they allowed umpiring decisions to upset them; this inevitably upset the rhythm of their play and the control of their game. To be a successful hockey player you need to learn to accept the umpire's decisions and to get on with the game.

The side was a reasonably balanced one and at its best played entertaining hockey. When they used the wings they were most penetrating and they at times successfully outmanoeuvred man-to-man marking systems with imaginative changes of positions. There was no lack of goalscoring ability and with more care with the final pass and shooting we would have scored more goals. In defence we were generally sound, but occasionally failed to clear the ball efficiently, letting the opposition punish our mistakes or indecision.

Hoddinott won the selection for goalkeeper and developed during the season enormously. A willing learner, he improved in positional sense and reactions greatly, though sometimes he became over-exuberant in his methods and panicked. Arkell played full-back, deployed as a sweeper. This he did successfully and his hitting out of defence was an asset. Sometimes he allowed his concentration to slip but all in all he had a sound season. Reid played with great commitment even if on some occasions early in the season he gave away unnecessary hits through over-powerful tackling. By the end of the season his timing of the tackle was much more secure and he began to distribute the ball more surely.

The half-back line had an inconsistent season. Each player had his off-day. Sloper, at right-half, started the season in fine style and supported his forwards really well. But in the final matches he tended to overcommit both in his tackling and in his support. Hayward, the captain, had a steady season. His support of the forwards was good and he distributed the ball well, although sometimes his hitting let him down. He captained the side by example and worked hard to motivate the side when it lost its way. At left-half Livingstone had a reasonable season and should have gained good experience for next year. His reverse stick tackling was strong and with more confidence he will be a most reliable player. His hitting on occasions was uncertain.

The forwards were an enigmatic group. Smith on the right wing was most penetrative, but when he was closely marked, he sometimes did not work as hard as he might for the ball. With Soper at inside-right they caused problems for the opposition, but sometimes the final pass let them down. Soper has great skill but needs to become more circumspect in his style. He improved over the season and will undoubtedly be a force to be reckoned with next year.

At centre-forward, Lamb had an inconsistent season. At best he was most penetrative and scored goals, but he allowed his temperament to get the better of him in midseason and only in the final four matches did he play near his best. At inside-left Blanchard had a mixed season: he scored four goals against both Abingdon and M.C.S. and was the top scorer with fourteen goals, but he faded out of some games completely. He is very much a touch player and when on form is a fast incisive forward. Jee developed through the season into a sound left wing although there were occasions when he wandered too far from his wing. With more control and more consistent hitting he ought to develop into a most useful player.



The Lord's Match

In the first two matches against Pangbourne and Abingdon we were allowed to attack down our right wing freely and this we did well to win easily. Against Cheltenham we were not allowed to do so and as a result we struggled to get the attack moving on a wide front. Against Radley we played well in the first half and deservedly led 2—1 at the interval. In the second half we were less constructive and Radley were worthy of their lead. In the final ten minutes we earned a draw when Smith scored a good goal.

We again had a fine first half against Bradfield only to let things slip in the second; Bradfield very nearly snatched a draw after we had gained a 4—1 lead. Against Bloemendaal, lefensive errors allowed our visitors to win; although we had more of the game we failed to translate chances into goals.

The match against Dulwich at Lord's was a hrilling encounter. The game was played at 'renetic pace and both sides had good chances to win. In the end a draw was a fair result. It needed someone to slow the game more in order to control the attacks. The Dragon hard bitch was the venue for our annual encounter with the Occasionals. We ought to have won, but missed chances and a penalty flick hitting he post ensured a 0—0 draw after we had blayed really well.

We had a resounding victory against M.C.S. when we played some fine hockey in the first half, whereas we failed to settle down to build our attacks against Stowe. In the end we deserved our victory against them. Dean Close provided a remarkable score line. Ten goals in a game always means a spectacle and the spectators were not disappointed. We have only ourselves to blame for our defeat, for one ought not to lose a 4-2 lead with twelve minutes to go. To give Dean Close credit they showed great character, for many sides would have given up with that score line. In this game we again played well in patches but we allowed ourselves to be disturbed by one or two umpiring decisions, and in the second half our passing out of defence was poor.

The final two games were drawn. The game with the Martyrs was the best of recent years. In this match we again failed to translate chances in the first half into goals. Against Wellington we started most lethargically, and weak clearances allowed them to take the lead. We ended the first half well, scoring two goals just before half-time. But in the second half we did not build our attacks as we should, allowing Wellington to get back into the game.

THE VARSITY MATCH AT LORD'S

By tradition, the Varsity Match is preceded by a schools' game, and this year the honour went to St. Edward's and Dulwich College.

The game reflected ideal conditions with goal-mouth incidents at both ends, and St. Edward's were in debt to Hoddinott who performed with inspiration and a lot of skill in keeping his goal intact. So it was with great relief to our supporters that Lamb capped all his previous endeavours by scoring the equaliser just before half-time.

St. Edward's turned round to play down the infamous Lord's slope, and were no doubt hoping that this would aid their progress towards the Dulwich goal. In fact, the pattern of play was similar to the first half-end-to-end stuff. Hoddinott continued to be outstanding in goal, Lamb did everything but score, and with Livingstone becoming more and more of an influence the pressure was unrelenting. To be fair, the score could have ended at five-all, as Dulwich put together some fine attacks which created numerous chances. In the end a 1-1draw was a fair result, and both sides can be justly proud of producing a game which reflected the very best of schoolboy hockey—excitement, endeavour and no little skill.

It was then over to the pitch laid out in front of the Long Room for the clash of Light and Dark Blue. Hockey

Of course success is vital in any game, for through success comes confidence to develop and use one's skills as a player. But it is important too to teach boys that winning at all costs will detract from the achievement. Winning with skill, team spirit and honest sportsmanship are the elements we should be looking for. I personally would like to thank all my colleagues for the hard work and enthusiasm put into the coaching and running of hockey. Also the groundstaff under the leadership of Mr. Jacques are to be thanked and congratulated for all the unstinting work they do on the pitches to ensure our enjoyment of the game.

Finally, in my opening comments I would like to put on record my own gratitude to Peter Badger, who has very much been my righthand over the last nine seasons, for all the hard work he has put into the coaching, and to wish him well in the seasons ahead.



lst XI

This has certainly not been a vintage year for the first XI, and from the point of view of results it could be deemed a disastrous year. However, I would like to put on record my own regard for all the boys in the top game for the way in which they have taken defeat. Where many teams would have given up and become disgruntled with their lack of success, they kept smiling and trying.

So why were the results as they were? It is easy to find excuses and simply say the side was not very talented. This is partly true, but it could also be argued that there were too many changes. There certainly were many changes, yet only half the side were obvious selections and the remainder could have, and did, come from any number of players. In hockey it is not always possible to get it right first time. Certainly promising performances in practice games were often followed by individuals freezing in the matches, and the three weeks missed in mid-season did not help in finding a settled side.

Now to the team. In goal Horton held off all the challenges to unseat him: though not possessing the quickest reactions or the greatest agility, he improved enormously and in the final games produced some impressive saves. At full-back we eventually settled on Carpenter and Mitchell. The former should be an encouragement to all. Before this season he had never played in a school side and was only "fished" from rowing fairly recently; he worked hard at his game, and if not always the most accurate of passers, he tackled with determination and with improved timing. Mitchell too played with increased confidence. His tackling was generally sound and his positional sense improved, but at times he tried to hit the ball far too hard with the result that he topped it. He must learn to keep cool under pressure.

The half-back line was a competent unit. At right-half Fry played with commitment, but he is not quick and did not always mark his wing very tightly. However, he has the skill to become a good player. Bishop at centre-half was tireless. As a captain he was a fine example, always encouraging his team, while his own game did not suffer and his distribution improved. At left-half Livingstone had a successful season. No right-wing was given room and he showed great skill on the ball. His hitting this season was much better and he used the cross pass to good effect.

Jee moved to the right wing in the end, and showed much more control on the ball this season, being most penetrative when he used his reverse stick. At inside-right Telfer was an enigmatic performer. On the ball he was most skilful and by the end of the season made some most penetrating runs, but he did not always finish them off, for his passing and hitting were erratic. Soper at centre-forward was skilful but on occasions tried to do too much. He ought to have scored more goals than he did, but all too often he hit too high or wide because he was more interested, it seemed, in depositing the goalkeeper in the back of the net as well.

Haslam and N. Samuel eventually won the left side forward positions and combined successfully though neither was particularly quick. Haslam at times faded from games, and needs to become more positive and direct in his passing. Samuel, when he has learnt to use his reverse stick more fully, will cause more problems.

As for the matches, we ought not to have lost to Pangbourne where a defensive error allowed them a simple goal in a game which neither side really deserved to win. Against Abingdon we allowed a 2—1 lead and control of the game to slip. Radley deservedly won this year's encounter. They were quicker to the ball and scored three exceptional goals. However, the goal of the match was Jee's first time shot from a firm centre by Soper.

The next two matches were cancelled due to the frost. In the matches against R. D. A.'s XI and the Occasionals we produced some good moments but the strength of the opposition and our lack of experience allowed them to win. However, playing against experienced players ought to be valuable and Peter Baker's four goals should have inspired the forwards to shoot more — a problem throughout the season.

Against M.C.S. we were generosity itself. Three goals down in 10 minutes we drew the rest of the game. That was credit in itself, but with more tightness in defence we might have caused them more problems. The second half revealed M.C.S.'s vulnerability at the back as well. The Wellington match was disappointing because we lost our way and having recovered to 2—1 ought to have been encouraged. A series of mistakes led to Wellington taking control of the final quarter.

We saved our best performances till last. We deserved a draw against Cheltenham after a fine second half performance, only to be robbed in the closing moments. Against Dean Close we had most of the game, but failed to convert our possession into goals. Against the Martyrs we nearly lost a 3—0 advantage in the closing moments of the game, but we deservedly won. Against the Germans, we produced a fine performance and if chances had been taken in the first half we should have won comfortably. As it was they equalised three minutes from the end. We could not put that down to bad luck.

I hope this gives a faithful reflection of the season. I have enjoyed the company of the team and, although disappointed by the results, I feel much good experience has been gained by all.

As can be seen from the results, this has not been a vintage season. However, with a little more luck and greater discipline in defence, one or two games that were drawn might have been won. It was a great fillip for the team to beat the O.U. Occasionals (3-2) captained by Guy Hayward (O.S.E.) — a hard-fought game with the correct result.

In the latter part of the season the drawn games against Dean Close and M.C.S. could have been won but the lack of a natural goal scorer was again very evident. Against Cheltenham, who had yet to be beaten, we showed some early lapses in defence but then began to play with some determination and in the second half we were very much in control, especially in the midfield. A. Cane probably had his best "half" of the season, but we again suffered from the lack of a goal scorer.

The Festival was very good fun, and competitive. The victory over a slightly arrogant Calday Grange was very satisfying. For once the inside-forward trio of N. Samuel, T. Burley and N. Adam put the defence under a lot of pressure and goals resulted. Against Bedford some complacency crept in and after being 2-1 at half-time we rather lost our way and eventually lost 2-4 to a rather ordinary side.

In conclusion the season, despite its lack of success, showed the emergence of many good points. Richard Hall (captain) improved as a player, particularly in the timing of the tackle. The halfbacks of James Fry, Alastair Cane and Malcolm Duthie often played well as a unit with Cane and Duthie on occasions being outstanding. Alan Burke, after struggling to gain a place, began to play with confidence and became reasonably dependable although his lack of pace is limiting. Of the forwards Tim Burley worked like a Trojan, Nick Samuel

produced the odd good moment as did Nick Goldson, but Nigel Adam probably became the most improved player of the season, having finally found his correct position of inside-right. Unfortunately the right wing was a problem position. Jim Curley attempted but never really made any impact, and Paul Holloway tried but again lacked the experience to adapt to a new position. I hope that there is potential yet to be realised but he has to want to play and improve.

All in all, though a disappointing season, the players always worked hard and gave their best, and seemed to enjoy the matches, if not the training! P.G.B.





Young and O. Watson performed well, but too inconsistently on the wings. J. Sale looked dangerous at centre-forward but lacked any finish. Webster, Robinson and Goldson all played insideforward at one time or another, and occasionally combined well with the other forwards. Like Sale, they all lacked the ability to score goals. Whereas we managed to concede some soft goals we were unable to punish our opponents' defensive errors.

Our first two games against Bloxham and Abingdon were both cancelled but we did manage to play Keble College instead. We drew 2–2 after Watson first, and then Sale, scored goals. Radley was our first school match and in going down 0–2 we played some of our best hockey against a strong side. Pangbourne, Stowe, O.U.O.H.C. and M.C.S. were all cancelled during the freeze, but we did play Bradfield on their all-weather pitch. Just prior to the game, G. Young called off with a leg injury as did Livingstone, who had some sort of ailment. We played appallingly and lost 0—4 against a side who were no better than us.

After half term, we played Cheltenham, Wellington and the Martyrs in quick succession. In each game we played some good hockey in the first half, but failed badly in the second period. Watson scored from a good piece of open play against Cheltenham, as did Goldson against the Old Boys. These three games in particular highlighted our inability to play consistently well and to score goals. Despite these defeats we approached the final fixture against Dean Close with some confidence. It was therefore especially disappointing that we played our worst hockey of the season in going down 0—4 to a side that was worse than us.

It was a curious season in that the two sides which we could have beaten both beat us easily, and in being defeated narrowly in the other fixtures we played some reasonably promising hockey. I will always have bitter-sweet memories of the side. On the one hand they were a cheerful, pleasant group, but on the other they were just too casual and lacked fibre; winning simply didn't matter enough to them.

A large number of the schools on our circuit have or are getting such surfaces and we are undoubtedly the losers in more ways than one. I sincerely hope in the near future that funds can be raised to build a "plastic" pitch so that hockey can continue to flourish at St. Edward's.

1st XI

The results do not look very encouraging but in school matches the balance is 4 wins and 5 losses which truly reflects the season. In short we beat the poorer sides and we lost to the better ones. The very wet conditions hampered a great deal of preparation and the team did not really take shape until after half-term.

The lack of preparation was partly to blame in our losing to Bloxham but the opposition were a competent side who deserved to win on the day, playing in quite appalling wet and cold conditions at Bisham Abbey.

At Bradfield we again had to play on an artificial surface but showed resilience and determination to beat them 2-1 having been a goal down. Andrew Dobson (left half) had a particularly good game. In these early days another player who was to feature significantly was the goalkeeper Neil Tustian who has improved so much during the season. He had a magnificent game against P.G.B.'s XI.

The pitch at Abingdon was not conducive to high quality hockey but both teams managed to produce some good moves with chances being created at both ends. Our stronger midfield took control and we emerged the winners with a scrambled goal (2-1).

In the derby against Radley a very poor game of hockey took place with neither side mastering any control. A goal-less draw epitomised the level of skill on display. Again it was the goalkeeper in saving a penalty stroke who prevented a loss, as we certainly did not look like scoring.

Pangbourne, impressive at producing so many teams, were not as strong as Radley but we still had to work hard to beat them. If the right had been used, more victory would have been far easier. Graeme Wright scored a good goal that sealed the match

Wellington College have become a formidable force in all major sports in recent years and their hockey side was no exception. They scored 8 goals in all, one or two of which were the result of

The last games of the season were against the Martyrs and Trent College. The Martyrs brought a very strong team and played some delightful hockey mostly engineered by C. Lawless, G. Hayward and S. Smith. It was good to see the Old Boys play such good hockey in the right atmosphere.

Trent College were returning from a short tour and this was probably the one game which we ought to have won. Robert Hawkins and Ian Davidson combined well on the right flank but it was never finished off. Some lax defence and one goal was enough to seal our fate.

It was a sad moment when the captain Nigel Seddon had to leave the field (v. MCS) with his recurrent shoulder injury. He played solidly but lacked the passing skills to become a really good midfield player. Matthew Wethey matured as a hockey player and moving him to the sweeper position was critical for the team and his improvement. Cas Sandeberg was a tireless marker and again if injury had not intervened he would have made a great impact on the course of the games. Sham Ghalib began well. He has some skill but has not yet mastered when and when not to use it. In due course he will become a force in the XI. Andrew Dobson was hardworking and had some good games but his tendency to over-dribble created a few problems for his fellow defenders.

Among the forwards Ian Davidson showed flashes of brilliance. Graeme Wright proved a far more forceful centre forward than inside forward and began to score a few goals. In conclusion it was an enjoyable season in which the results went mostly according to the form book. I am convinced that if SES are to compete on this very strong circuit an artificial surface is essentialnot just for the First XI but for anybody in the School at whatever level who wants to play hockey and enjoy it.



The 1991 season will be remembered for the appalling weather and the First XI's poor results. That is a shame considering the success of the other sides throughout the school. Eleven out of fourteen sides have had a fifty percent record or better.

The advent of a plastic pitch next season will help to ease the weather problem, but more fundamental issues will need to be faced if we are to become more consistently successful.

As a rowing school it is inevitable that many of the bigger boys will opt to row in the Easter Term and we must therefore emphasise our skills rather than physical presence from the word go. We have started to do this with this year's skills and I hope with continued support from our outside coaches we can build on this next year.

Improved skills and professional coaching in the early years will pay dividends only if we can persuade the good ball-players to maintain their interest into the Sixth Form. At present too many fall by the wayside either to do other things or simply to loaf about. It is essential we address the reasons for this now. The pull of minor sports -7-a-side Rugby, Squash and Football, to name but three - should not be ignored. Boys are torn, particularly if they feel they will be more successful doing the other sports, and we must organise the day to try to remove the dilemma. Slothfulness is more difficult to challenge but higher expectations of the 'grey sixth' in terms of participation would be a step in the right direction.

I am, of course, immensely grateful to all my colleagues for the time and effort that has gone into producing the creditable results listed below. My comments above are merely my thoughts on what is needed to strengthen the situation and make us a more dominant force. The Astroturf' should act as a catalyst to school hockey and we must be ready to supply all the other ingredients needed to make progress. C.F. Baggs



Delafield, another promising Colt, looked useful on the right wing, as did Arber on the left. The competition for places should be immense next year and I hope that more players will be available for the occasional Winter term practice and for pre-season training. It would be a shame to have to wait until half-term next year before we start playing competitive hockey.

Final memories of an enjoyable season will be the win over Bradfield when 20 purple minutes and some resolute defence brought an extraordinary result against a very good side. The second half against Radley proved we could complete against good sides, while the wins against Abingdon, Cranleigh and Gresham's all showed the importance of working the ball right and attacking at pace. A. Phillips' final goal of the season was a coach's delight and a wonderful way for the captain to end his hockey at St Edward's.

Lastly, my thanks need to be recorded to C.F.B. for all his excellent administration and support and to 'Chap' for his help with the coaching.







This has been a season of disappointing results and unfinished work. Much of the season is reflected by two performances, those against Magdalen and Bradfield. In both of these matches strong winning positions were surrendered. Had they resulted in wins for the team, we would have had far more confidence in the fixtures thereafter and I would be reflecting on a reasonable results record and a good season. However, this is not the case and our failings in these matches accurately reflect our main failings: an inability to perform under pressure as a team and a lack of confidence in the ability of our team-mates. The result of this has been that, while under no pressure the team functioned well, when pressure was on any patterns of play or game plans were forgotten and we were reduced to eleven individuals.

However, it would be ludicrous to ignore the elements of development and play which have made up most of the season. It must be remembered that the three victories were achieved from excellent performances and that in the first halves of the matches against M.C.S. and Bradfield we completely dominated our opponents. This was also the case against Bedford where we were unable to convert territorial and possession superiority into goals. There has only been one occasion where we were outclassed and that was in the second half at Cheltenham. The losses against Dean Close, Stowe and Marlborough came from poor phases of play rather than disastrous performances for the whole match.

It has been pleasing to see patterns of play transferred from practices into matches. As a direct result we have been able to move the ball down the touch-lines and around defences. However, when pressure has been on us we have resorted to trying to force play through opponents rather than around them. This invariably created more pressure which, all too often, we were unable to withstand. This lack of confidence in our patterns of play was often further compounded by our tendency to put ourselves and teammates under pressure. Too often players were satisfied by putting a pass roughly in the area of a team-mate, rather than onto his stick. Players were rarely prepared to put the extra leg-work in off the ball to get themselves that vital yard of space. The lesson this team is learning is that unless you do these basic tasks you are reliant upon your own first touch and the pass to you being perfect.

There is not one player who has represented the XI this year who did not at some stage produce a great piece of play. No-one however, with the possible exception of Peter Neal, consistently produced good performances just by doing simple things well. At times we passed simply and superbly, ran off the ball, marked tightly as a unit and defended and attacked as a team, but too often we only did parts of the job for parts of the matches. As a result we reflect on a season of missed opportunities and unfulfilled promise.

Despite the relatively disappointing results I would like to thank all the players for their efforts. I have enjoyed coaching this group enormously. While it is frustrating that they have not achieved more victories I have taken great pleasure from their good performances.

My thanks as ever to CFB for his huge admin task done so efficiently, to RDA for his support and for nurturing the 2nd XI so well, to Zac Jones for giving all the SES teams such excellent coaching and individual care, and to all the parents for their support.

We have strong foundations to build on in the years ahead, with many promising players coming up through the School. Competition is likely to be intense, so the players who are mentally tough and keen to listen and learn are likely to be the ones to be selected. 



Boys' Hockey

1st XI Boys

It has been a fantastic season for the 1st XI who remained unbeaten in school fixtures and were the first ever winners of the Charlie Barker Trophy. But with the players setting themselves high standards there was a tinge of disappointment at not reaching the Divisional Round of the National Competition.

Marlborough (away): 1-1

The first fixture of any season is always a potentially difficult encounter, especially with arctic temperatures preventing any pre-season training before term started. Marlborough, on the other hand, had just returned from a successful tour and on home turf were always going to be confident of a positive result. Teddies started slowly and were 1-0 down within five minutes after a superbly crafted Marlborough attack. Teddies then had all the pressure for the rest of the first half but could not convert chances into goals, with a number of balls sliding past the back post, begging for any touch from a forward. The travelling side finally converted an opportunity early in the second half when Player of the Season and Top Goal Scorer George Creed pounced on a deflection after a well worked passing move on the right hand side. Teddies had the majority of chances for the rest of the fixture but failed to take the lead and the match finished one apiece, probably a fair result given the time it took for Teddies to start putting together fluid passages of play.

Abingdon (home): 5-1

The Abingdon game was an example of how well Teddies could perform. Perhaps the score line did not reflect accurately the possession that Abingdon enjoyed but the home side gave their opposition a lesson in how to convert possession into chances and chances into goals. Teddies went into half time just 2-1 up, conceding a penalty stroke and scoring two well crafted goals. The first goal was a fine passing move that saw St Edward's break forty metres down the left wing before squaring up and neutralising the Abingdon defence, slapping a penetrative ball towards the back post for Charlie Blanchard to finish. Matt Manners scored the other first half goal, a similarly clinical strike. In the second half, Teddies punished Abingdon's reckless endeavour to gain parity, scoring two smoothly worked goals on the counter attack after absorbing much opposition pressure. Most Improved Player Jonny Tetsell pounced on a deflection and Manners slid in his second after the keeper had been committed to challenging the first wave of on rushing attackers. Blanchard claimed his second mid way through the second period, Teddies executing a slick penalty corner move and Blanchard drag flicking sweetly into the bottom corner. The win over local rivals was made all the

more impressive by the fact that Teddies played 15 minutes of hockey with just 10 players and 5 minutes with 9

Bradfield (home): 2-2

This encounter produced an exciting 'end to end' style of hockey as both sides attempted a fast moving and expansive style of play. Teddies started the strongest, with Creed scoring a superb reverse stick strike from the top of the 'D'. Blanchard then provided the home side's second after a well worked attacking move forced a penalty corner. Unfortunately, as Teddies raised their attacking game in the second half, they also lost some composure in defence. With an unfortunate stumble from the first play of the second half Bradfield gained one goal and the momentum to drive for an equaliser. Although Teddies had the better of the chances in the remainder of the match clinical finishing was missing and the team had to be content with a draw.

MCS (home): 9-0

In this encounter against local rivals MCS the home side dominated every aspect. Coles was superb in goal making some instinctive and stunning reaction saves, though in truth he was rarely called upon to stamp his presence on the game. The back three transferred and distributed with confidence whilst the midfield penetrated the 'D' and found space for the forwards with relative ease. The forward combination of Creed and Tetsell stole the show however, with Creed clinically finishing five and Tetsell poaching two, whilst doing tireless work to retain possession deep in the Magdalen half. Shipperley also contributed one goal, after a slick and speedy counter attack brought about an equally impressive penalty corner move. Teddies' ability to counter attack was the most attractive feature of their play against Magdalen as they absorbed pressure when it was imposed on them and then broke with pace, stretching the pitch to its full

Radley (home): 4-3

Perhaps the most meaningful of the local derbies, the encounter with Radley was always going to be a hotly contested affair. Teddies took their form from the Magdalen fixture straight into this contest. Teddies played their most attractive and threatening hockey of the season thus far as they scored three goals in thirty minutes, conceded no real opportunities and dictated the pace and nature of the game. Creed slotted calmly home for the first after Teddies broke quickly and isolated each defender and finally the goal keeper, leaving Creed with an empty net . The second was a perfectly timed and executed short corner that saw Shipperley drive the ball into the

back of the net. As the half closed Creed scored his most stunning goal of all: receiving the ball from a long, penetrative slap at the top of the D he weaved his way through three lunging tackles before slidin the ball beneath the diving keeper. The second half brought fifteen minutes of equally impressive hockey as Creed grabbed his third and Teddies held out comfortably against all Radley attacks. However in the final twenty minutes, as Teddies tired and the game grew scrappy, chances were created at both ends. Radley upped their level to score three in quick succession leaving Teddies to defend desperately for seven minutes to ensure the win, despite waves of Radley attacks.

Wellington (home): 3-0

With a bonus point win needed to secure a place at the top of the Charlie Barker league table, Teddies needed a dominant performance over a traditionally strong Wellington side. The athleticism and pace of the visiting side slightly overawed Teddies for the first 20 minutes but once the home side found their rhythm, the pace and confidence in attack allowed Tetsell to finish an impressive passing move to leave Teddies one goal up at the half way stage. Wellington. desperate to equalise, attacked with flair and determination early in the second half and Teddie did tremendously not to concede, after absorbing 15 minutes of continuous pressure. The fitness and ability of the 1st team shone through in the last ten minutes of play, with Teddies creating a series of chances, to ensure a 3-0 score line by the close . Tetsell snatched a second and a slick and potent corner move saw Blanchard fire a drag flic into the side netting from the top of the D. This result ensured that Teddies could not be caught at the top of the table and would be crowned the inaugural Charlie Barker Champions.

Dean close (away): 2-2

The final school match of the season was always going to be a competitive and physical affair, with Teddies just one match away from an unbeaten season. The home side started the contest formidably and it was clear that two particularly skilful individuals in the heart of their midfield would be at the centre of all the attacks on the Teddies goal. The first half was a scrappy period, with both sides struggling to gain a hold on the game. Teddies had the best open field chance of the half, with an attacking move down the right resulting in a missed opportunity just feet from the goal mouth. The first half ended 1-1 with both sides finishing chances from penalty corner rebounds. Teddies were the dominant side at the start of the second period. The 1st XI created a number of chances before Blanchard an Tetsell combined to see the ball cannon into the backboard from close range. Unfortunately, Teddies were unable to hold on to their lead, with a series of decisions going against them in the closing minutes, Dean Close won a succession of short corners which provided them with the equaliser. A draw was probably a fair result, given the ability of the opposition's individuals. In a high quality game, Teddies had Emma Cadoux-Hudson to thank for some superb saves but still found themselves a goal down. However, they were soon level when Bubble Baddeley scored following a good passing move. The girls began the second half well and took a deserved lead when a fantastic pass from Stevenson allowed Maxine Mackintosh to score. The win was ultimately sealed when the seasons Most Improved Player Poffley calmly executed a slick penalty corner move. A disappointing 3-2 loss at home to Marlborough followed. In a really positive start to the second half, some good interplay down right side between Withers Green and Stevenson resulted in Mainds scoring her second of the game. Hard hit by injuries the 1st XI played with huge spirit to lose 4-3 at Canford. At the County Tournament Teddies were determined to retain their title. They began well with a resounding 4-1 win over a Bartholomew side that contained some very fast, skilful forwards. Top Goalscorer Lilly Davies scored early on, only for Bartholomew to level a minute later. From then on Teddies took control as Berkin, Davies and Freya Swan all scored to secure the win. Teddies then beat Henley College 5-0 with five different players getting on the score sheet. Davies Stevenson Berkin, Slemeck and Withers Green. Next the side played Oxford High in a key game. With Bubble Baddeley and Withers Green dominating the midfield, Teddies raced into a 2-0 lead. Fittingly it was the same two players who scored the goals. Though Oxford High fought hard and scored to make it 2-1, Teddies remained calm for a relatively comfortable win. In their final group game Teddies played a strong Bloxham side and in a pretty physical encounter dominated both possession and territory to win 2-0. Bloxham defended stubbornly and Teddies struggled to find a way through and as the frustration grew the 1st XI lost a little discipline as the game became a little fraught. First, Bloxham were reduced to ten following a vellow card, then with just a couple of minutes remaining Swan proved the hero. It had been a hugely impressive tournament with the side scoring nineteen goals and conceding just three in its six matches.

A good 4-0 win against Godolphin and Latymer followed with goals from Slemeck, Helen Baddeley, Stevenson and Withers Green. This was followed by a hard fought 2-0 win over Beaconsfield High. A fantastic passing move involving Bubble Baddeley and Davies left Swan with an easy finish for the first and it was Swan who turned provider for

It has not been a vintage year for boys' hockey results and Bradfield at home proved to be a disappointing start to the season. In a tight game against Abingdon, the 1st team produced their best hockey of the term, so far but again failed to make the best of their opportunities and were beaten 1-0.

In the rearranged county tournament Teddies played some fantastic hockey but were unfortunate to come away with a solitary point to show for their efforts. The side missed a number of guilt edged chances in losing 2-0 to Bloxham before being edged out 1-0 by MCS. Though Radley dominated the next encounter, they found Fairburst in inspired form and it took a controversial penalty stroke on half time to see him finally beaten. Teddies battled hard in the second period and it was only a goal line clearance from a Jamie effort that prevented a draw. With all the sides tiring, the final game was a scrappy affair against Abingdon. Although Teddies took the lead in the first half courtesy of a Willis strike Abingdon levelled things in the second period and the game ended in a draw.

Following their promising performances in the county tournament, the 1st XI travelled to Eton with high hopes but returned disappointed as their frustrating season continued. They began brightly and created some good opportunities in the first quarter of the game.
