PRESIDENT HUGHES

If there is a single individual who most represents the University of San Diego to the community, it is President Author E. Hughes. As UDS's chief administrator, he is charged with the direction of the institution - its academic programs, its role in the educational community, and its role in the San Diego-Southern California community which it serves. As such, he is in constant touch with every segment of the USD family as well as with corporate and civic leaders, constantly shaping the course of the university. Because of his focal position, he is also the university's major fund raiser, attracting the support which enables the strengthening of academic programs, student aid funds and campus development. A dedicated educator, he believes that "a democracy works best with an enlightened population." His leadership abilities and thoughtful, warm personality have led to many civic appointments, among them his membership on the President's Commission on White House Fellowships and chairmanship of Energy 2000. Through these and other posts, President Hughes has brought your University into national attention.



BISHOP LEO T. MAHER

Bishop Maher serves USD as its Chairman of the Board of Trustees. His association with the university goes back to the merger of the College for Women and the College for Men, a move in which he was the driving force. His generosity is marked by the donation of the St. Francis Seminary to USD. He has instituted many social services in the local Catholic community, and has achieved the formation of many new parishes throughout Southern California. Bishop Maher is often visible on campus taking an afternoon stroll.



THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES



The thirty-five men and women who constitute the Board of Trustees represent virtually every walk of life; they are scientists, business women, religious, homemakers, academicians, physicians. It is in their hands that the ultimate stewardship of the University rests. Under the law, they are the "owners" of the University, and it is the Board as a whole which formulates the major policies and thrust of the institution. They are led by an elected chairman, Bishop Leo T. Maher, D.D.

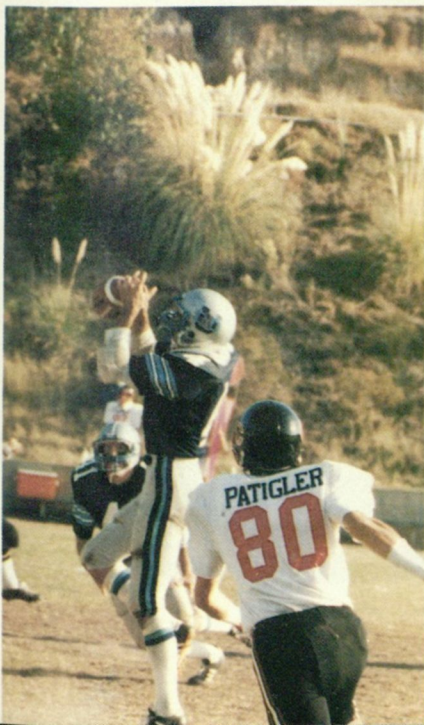
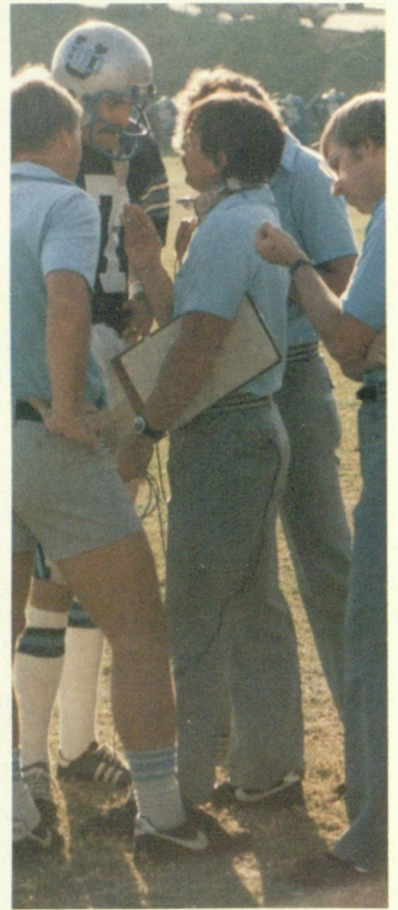


HOMECOMING

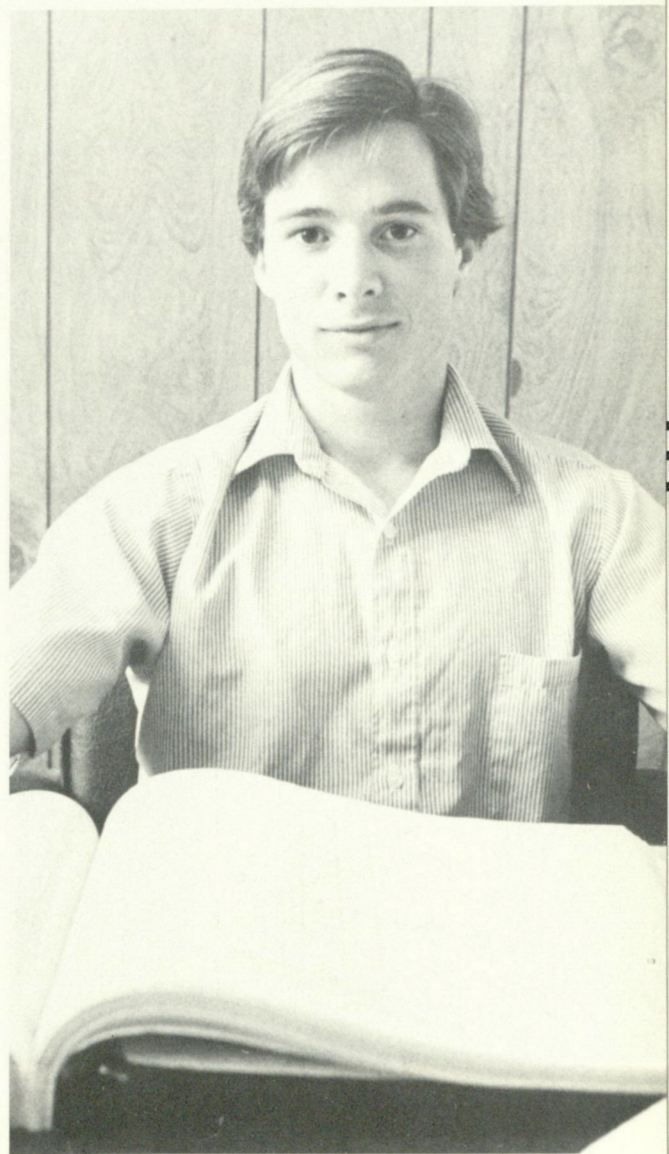


SECRETARY OF FINANCE

SENIOR SENATORS

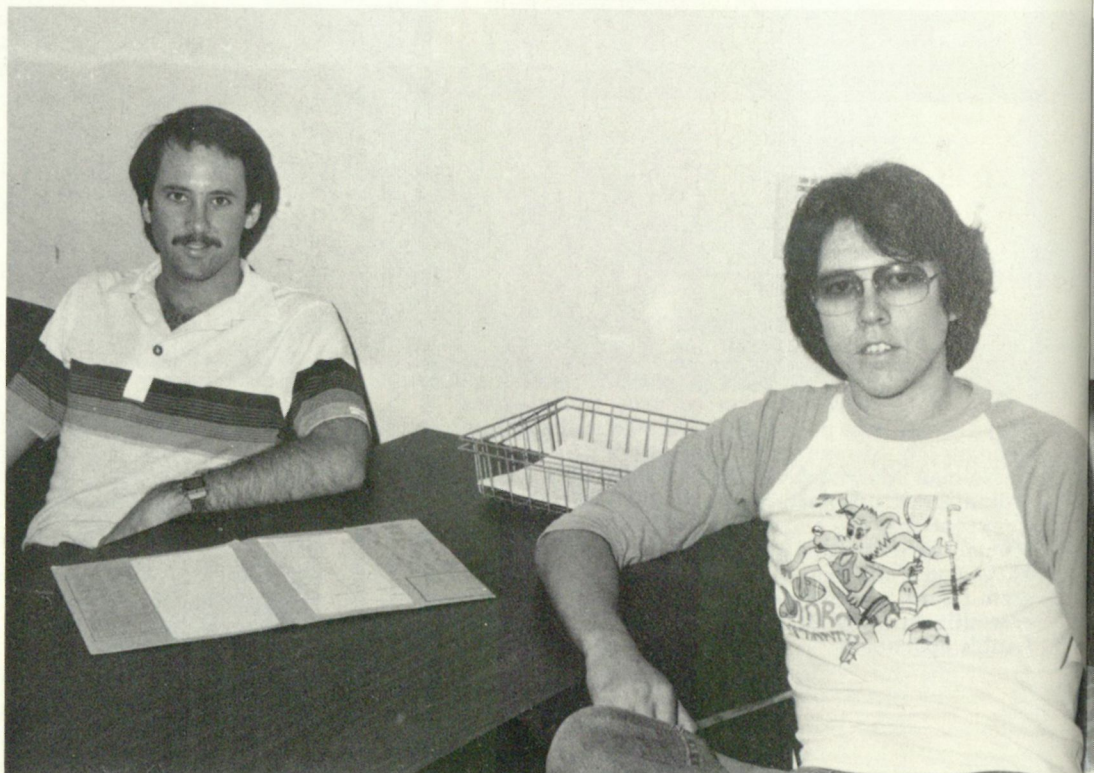

TRAFFIC COURT

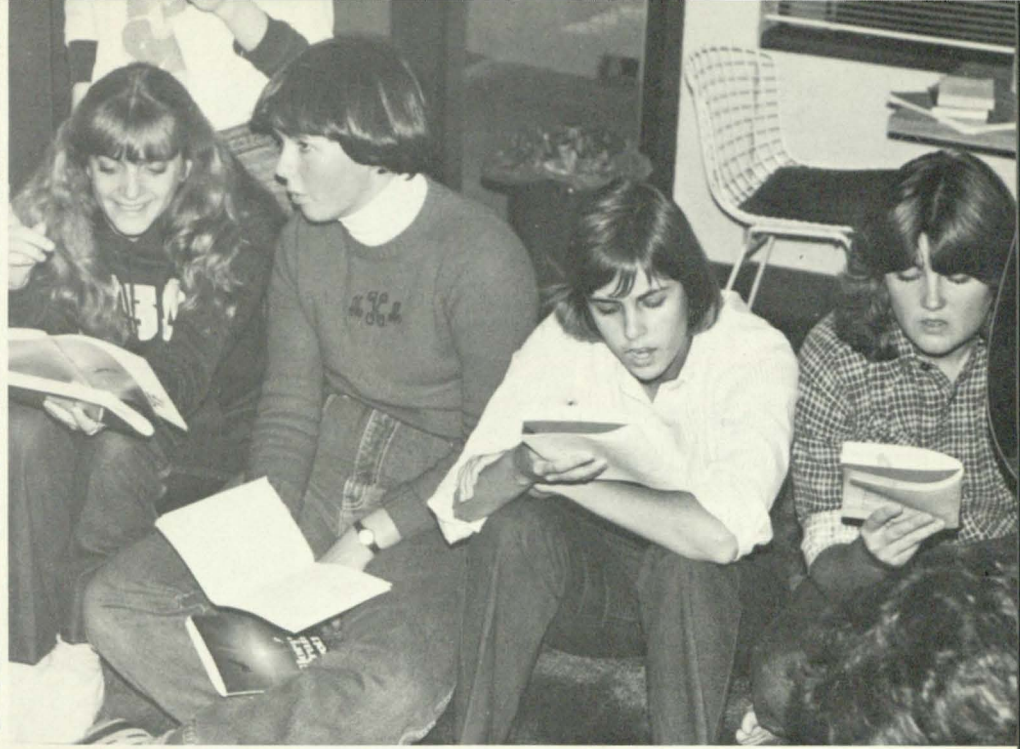

achieved academic and/or professional excellence in the field of accounting. These members have been initiated according to the official ritual of the Fraternity.

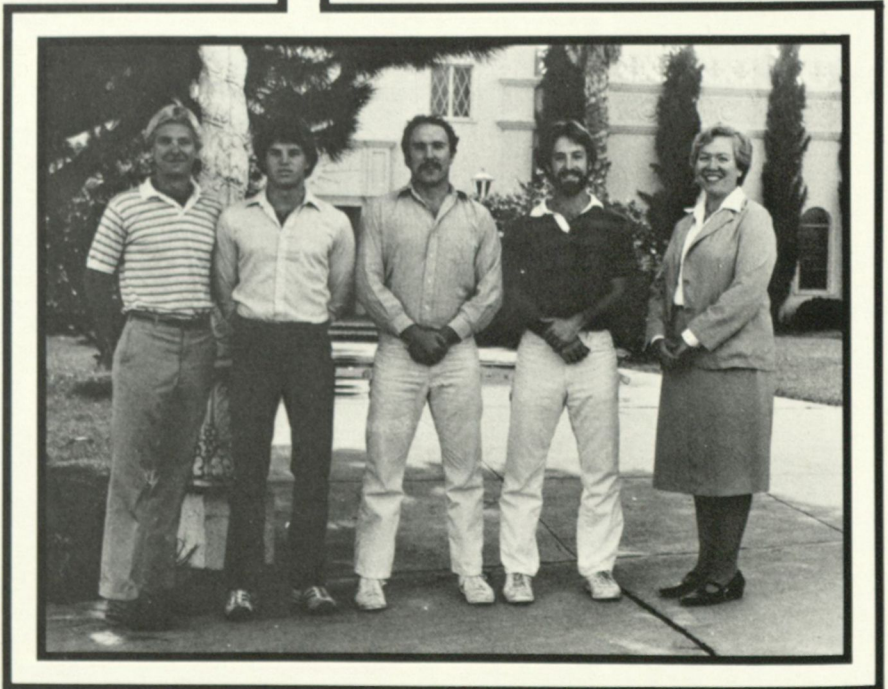

M.U.N. is an organization designed to make International Relations and Political Science majors aware of the inner working of the U.N., and to teach them debate, research and diplomatic skills.

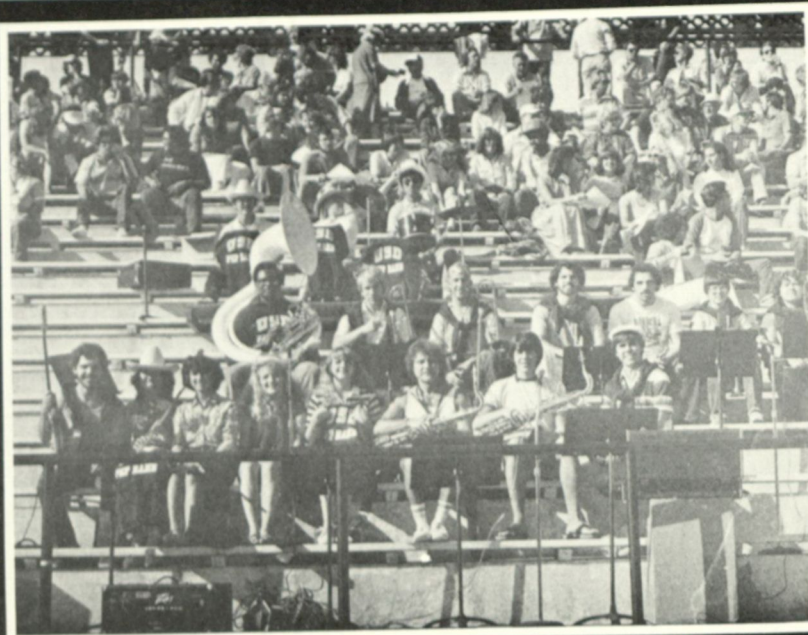

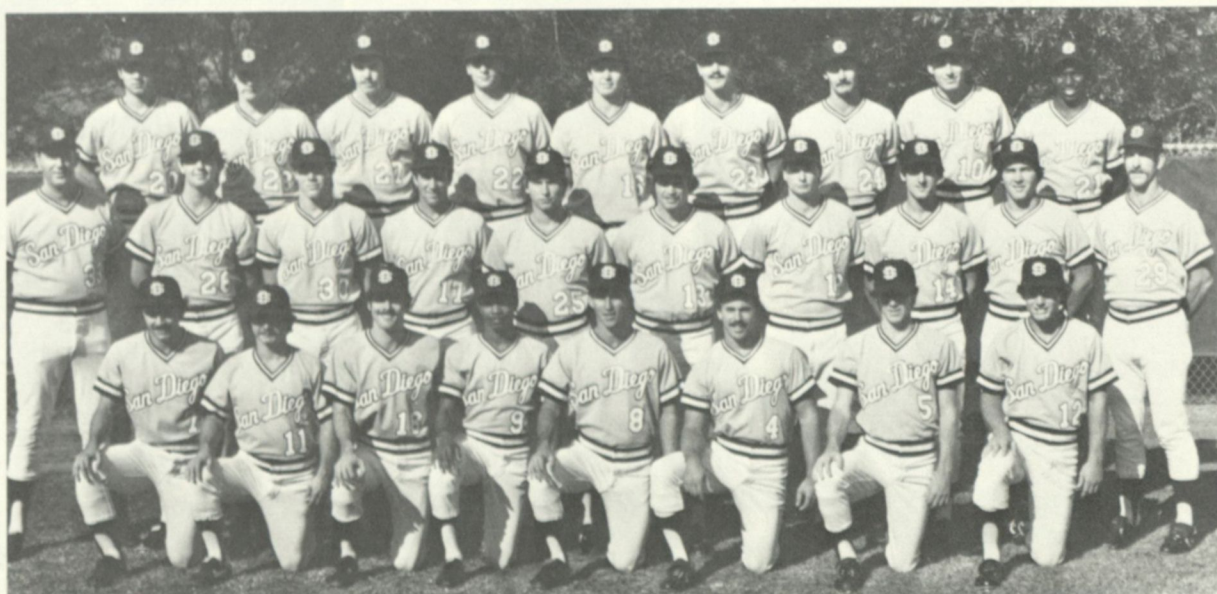
BASEBALL

Last season saw the Torero baseball team finish the season at 30-25-1, with one of their best records in Southern California Baseball Association competition, 15-21-1. A good nucleus of that '81 team returned this year for coach John Cunningham, including fifteen letterman, four starters, and two starting pitchers. Returning starters were second baseman Bruce Tomlinson, first baseman Andy Asaro, rightfielder John Mullen, and centerfielder Doug Paul. Pitchers Tom Tereschuk and Al Brehm also returned to the starting rotation. Catching this year were returner Paul Lofgren and junior college transfers Steve Sciacca and Luke Maiberger. Completing the infield were freshmen Paul Van Stone at shortstop, and Laci Nagypal at third base. Infielders Andre Jacas and Martin Harris were moved to the outfield to take advantage of their speed, where they joined returning centerfielder Mark Chapman. Last year the team finished 6-24, however, the Lady Toreras return 9 players who have been through the program and welcome 4 newcomers. Playing as an Independent this year, the Toreras face a tough schedule that includes contests with 22 Division 1 teams out of 32 contests. The Toreras have 16 home games and 16 road contests. USD's schedule includes such noted West Coast powers as Pepperdine, Nevada-Las Vegas, Arizona State, and cross town rival San Diego State.

USD is led by 6-2 senior center Sara Jane, an All Conference player last year. Also returning are 5-8 junior guard Barbara Minear, the teams' defensive standout and 5-9 sophomore forward Annette Everett. Rounding out the returnees are 5-7 sophomore guard Lori Morris, 6-5 junior center Martha Nelson who missed part of last season from an ankle injury, 5-7 sophomore guard Laura Thomas and 5-4 junior guard Kiela Harper. Transfers joining the Toreras are 6-3 senior forward Debbie Weinreis, a strong rebounder and scorer from the University of New Mexico and 5-10 sophomore guard Lisa McNamee from San Diego State University. New recruits include 5-7 freshman guard Link Bauman (Huntington Beach) and 5-10 freshman forward Mary Stanbra (Garden Grove). Coach Marpe looks forward to her team improving throughout the season, and puts strong emphasis on aggressive defense. She feels that, "With nine experienced players returning who have been through our program, along with our added height and quickness, I look for our team to be very competitive."

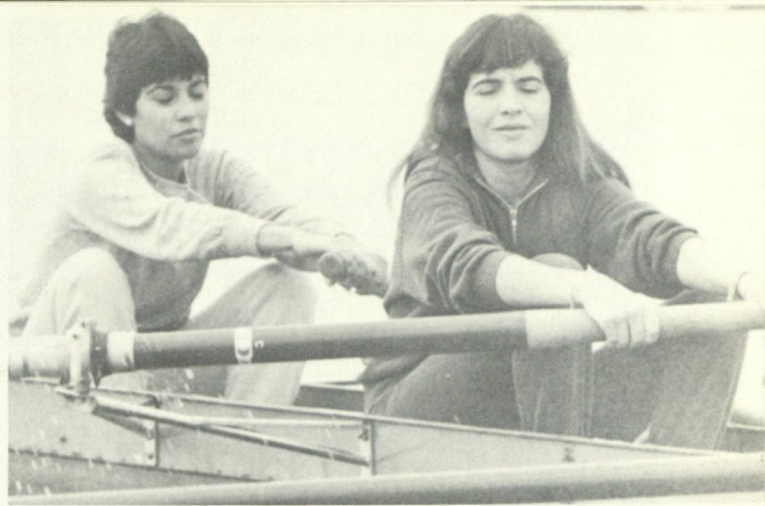
WOMEN'S CREW

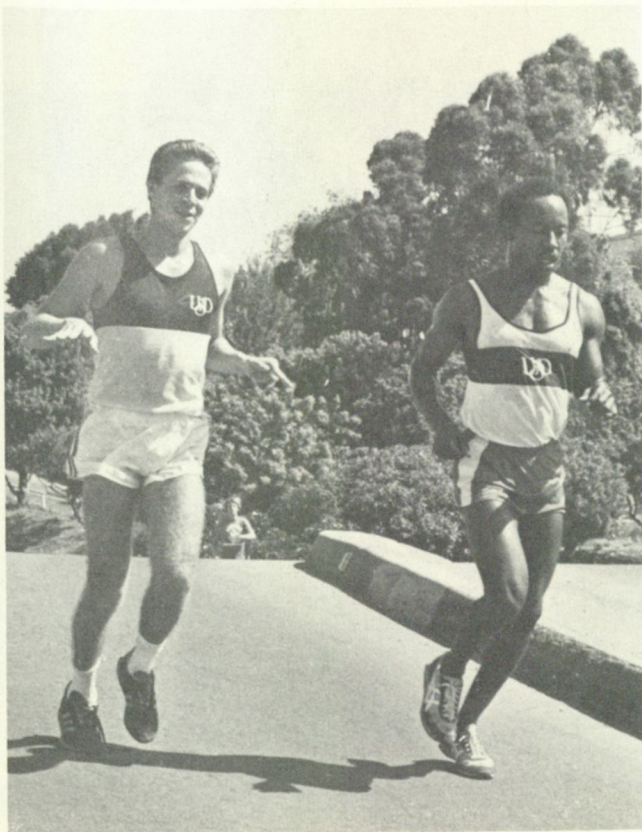
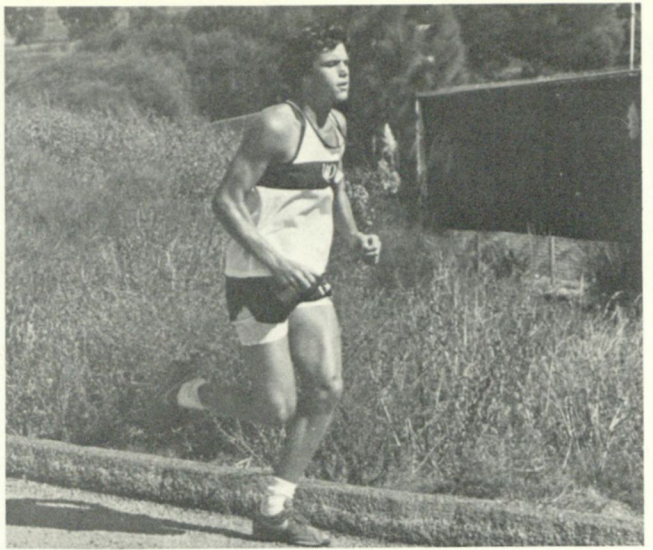
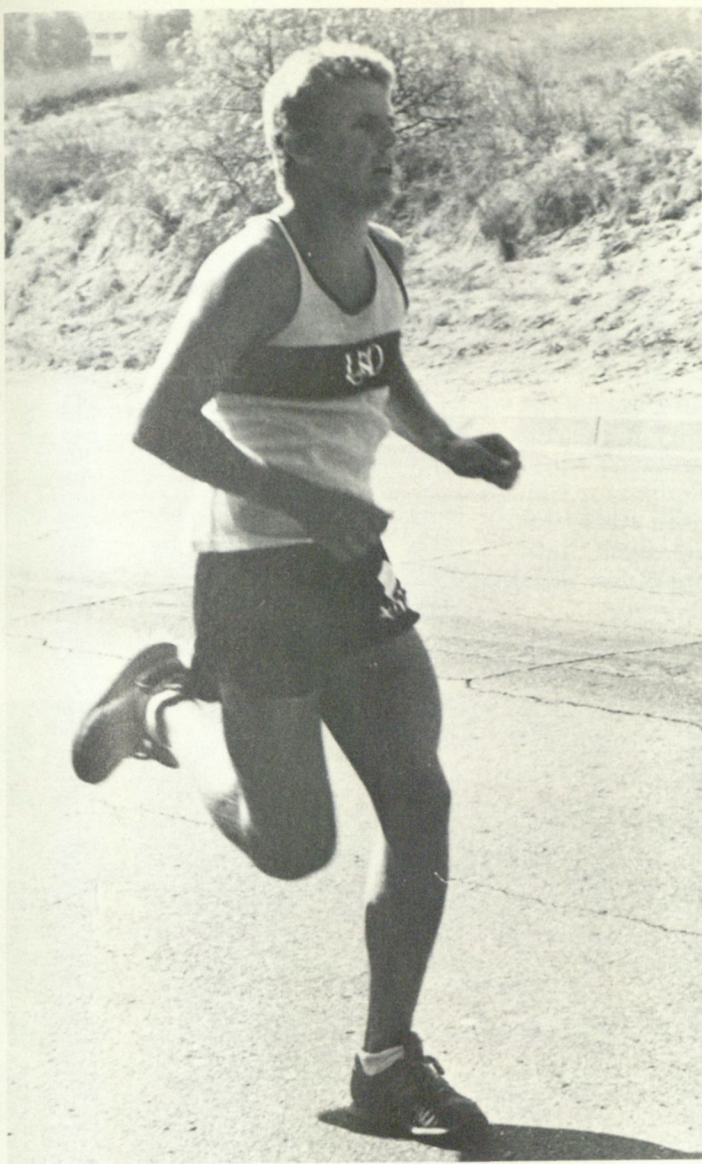
MEN CROSS COUNTRY

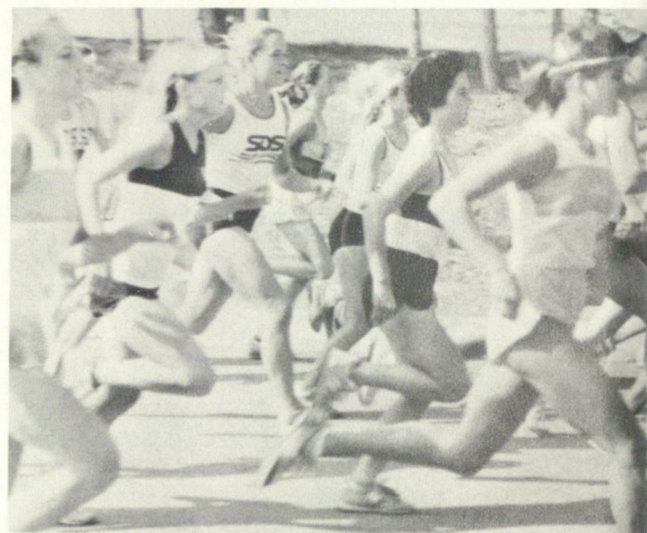
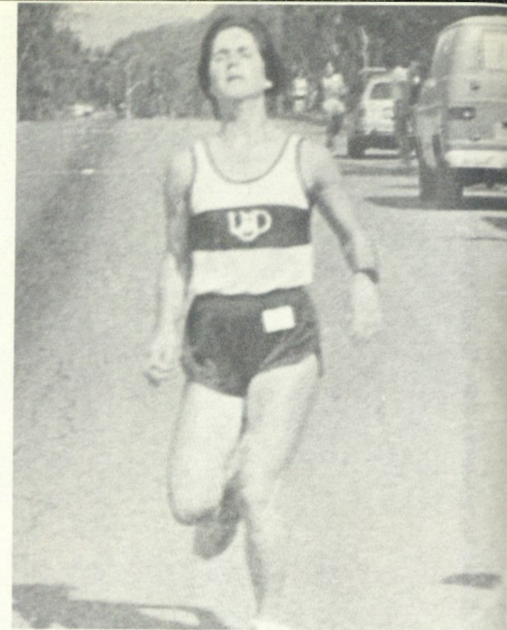

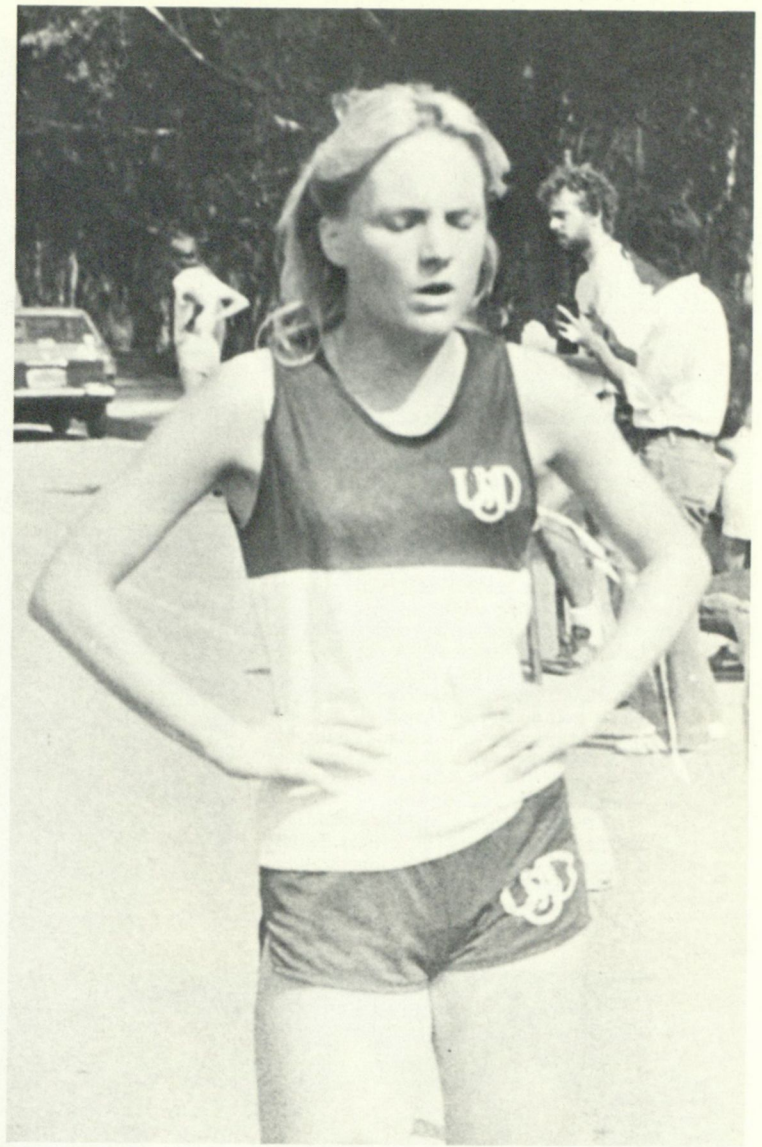
WOMENS CROSS COUNTRY

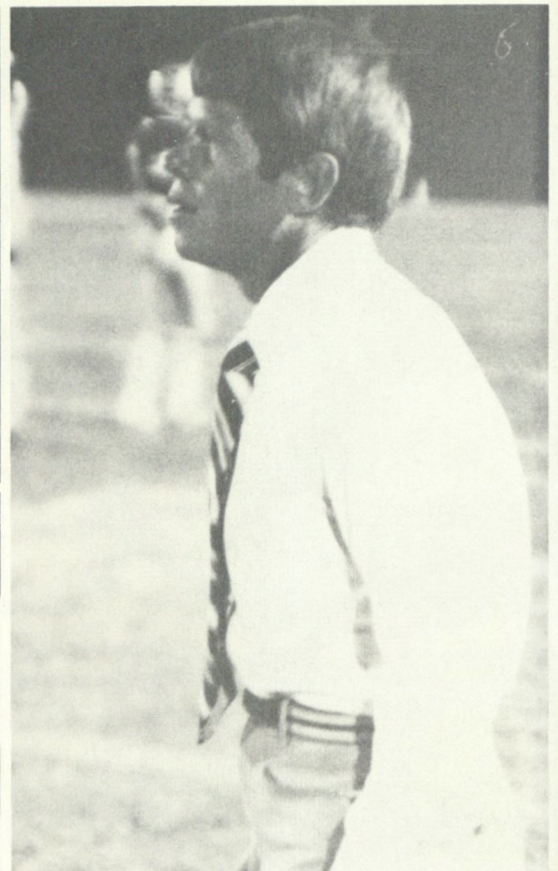

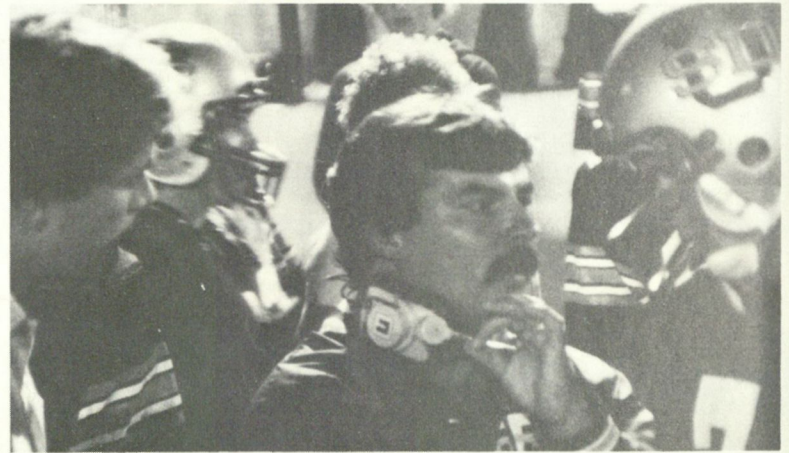
Records dropped like rain in 1981, as the University of San Diego's football team gained national recognition in posting a 9-1-0 record, the finest in school history. Fourteen records in all were broken, and the team saw themselves ranked as high as seventh in the weekly national polls. Senior running back Joe Henry broke the all-time pass reception record. Quarterbacks Steve Loomis and Eric Sweet shared the honor of breaking the single game completions record with twenty-one apiece. The line was anchored by tight-end Mike Ledbetter and tackle Kiha Terrel. Mike Rish was the top receiver as the offensive passing game surpassed 3,000 yards.

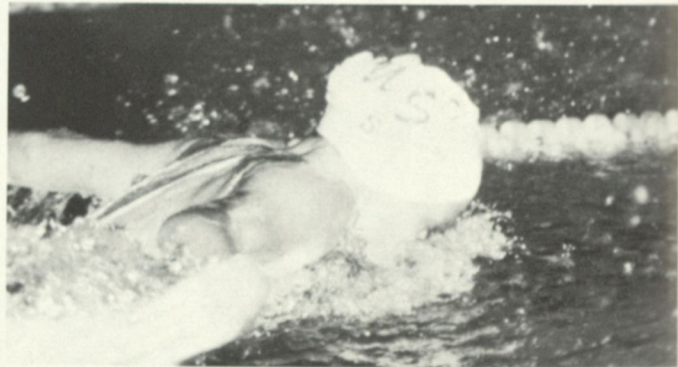
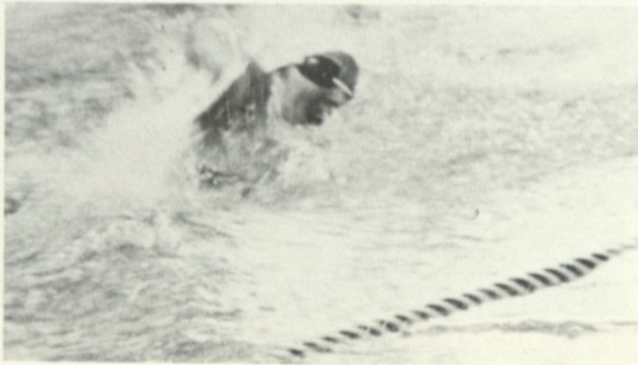


SWIMMING

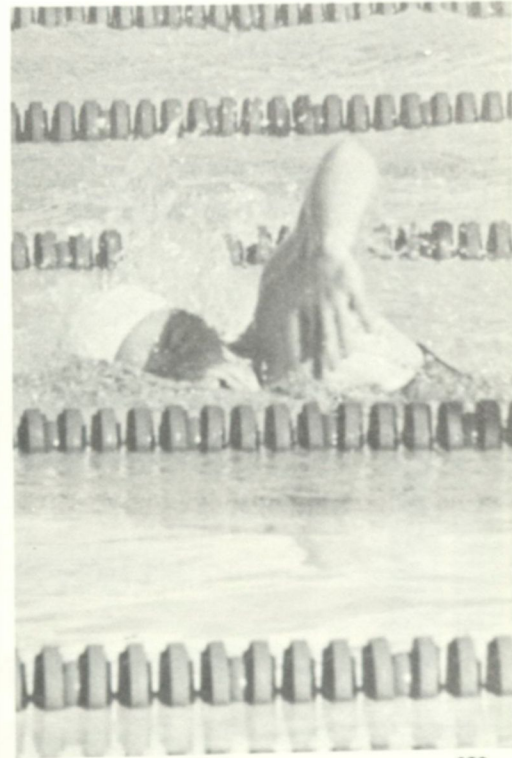
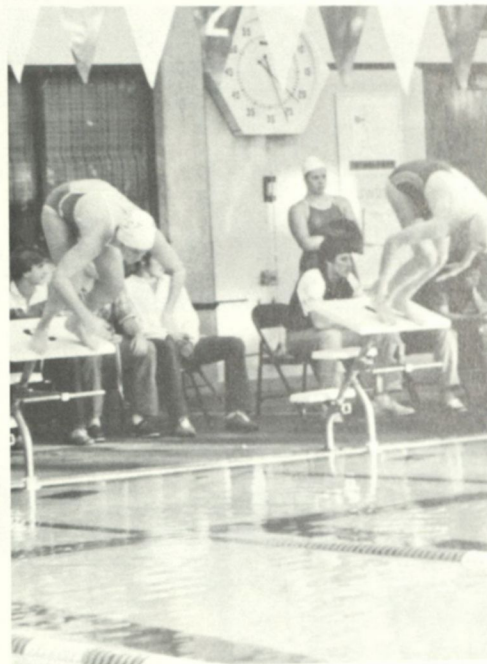
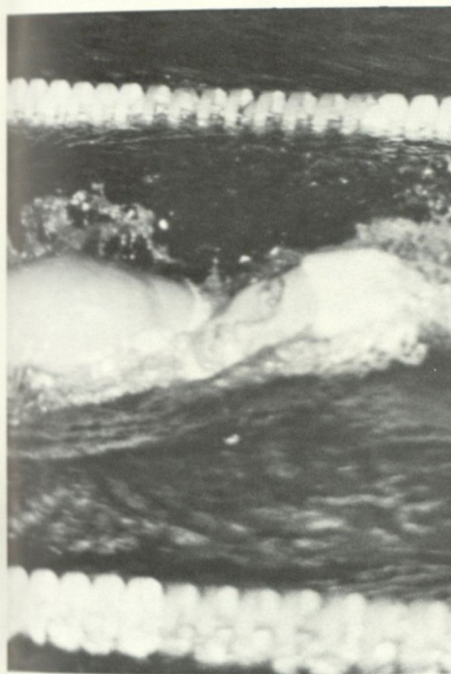
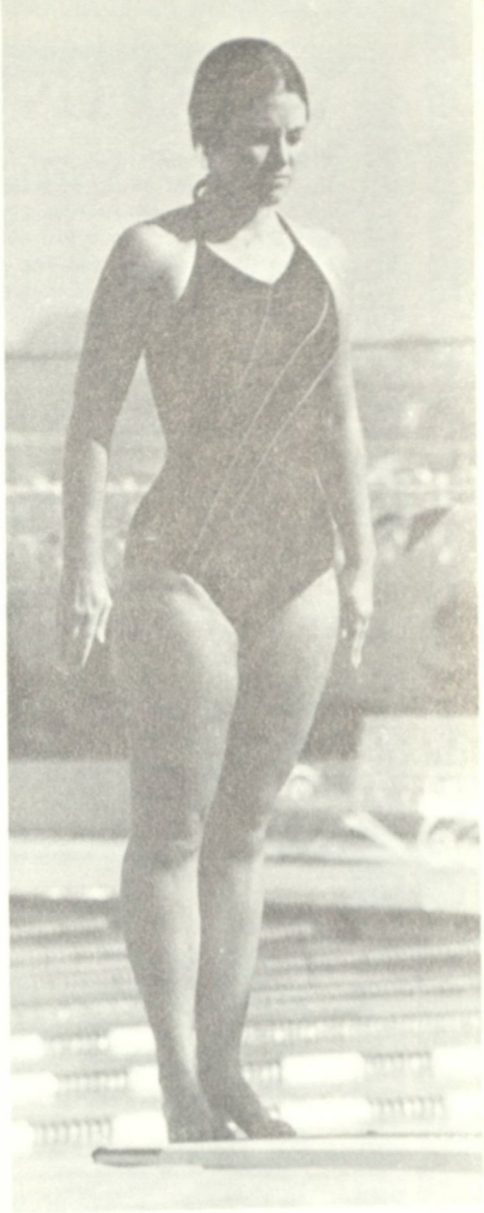
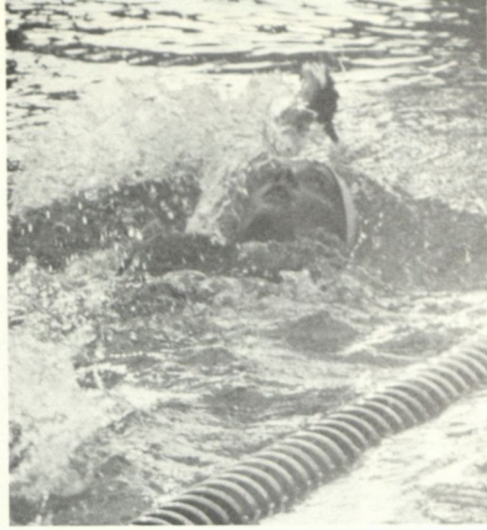
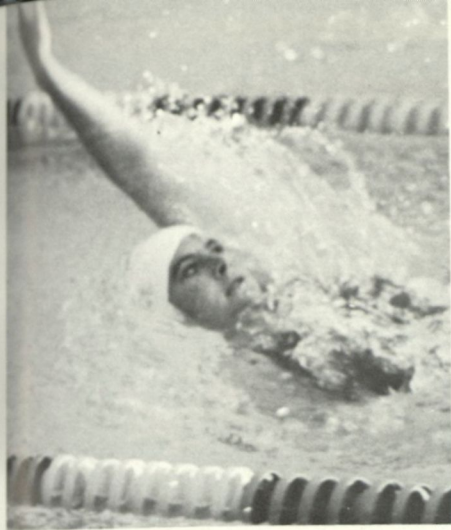






Reaching For Nationals
