

Dall-Mall, g. Dec? 1847.

In conformity with the wishes of the Trustees of the Trustees of the National Gattery we met on this day at M. Vernon's Stoute for the purpose of forming an opinion as to the Dictures which it might be desirable to select for the Royal

National

Gallery.

The accompanying Paper contains the hist of such Pictures. The Insteed will observe that it differs in scarcely any particular from the List which Mr. Vernon himself had the goodness to suggest to the Irestees. Lord Colborne was not enabled to meet us.





Some minute portions of the solid frigment have chipped of from the cloth near the right edge of the picture, and here and there in other more central parts. These defects are so minute that they would hardly be noticed if the picture were varnished; but, with a view to the preservation of the surface of the picture, it is accommended that such minute hollows especially where the cloth is exposed should be stopped.

the picture is varnished, the glazing be restored on the Madonna's face, so as to bring it into harmony with the surrounding portions.

The Monk, by Zurbaran, exhibits some inconsiderable restorations in parts of the drops and a minute slopping or mending (where the colour appears to have formerly chipped off) in one of the fingers. the large work by Hillon of Edith teeking the dead body of Starold on the field of Battle besides being cracked all over, seems to be in a state of decomposition. The Material used is running down and encroaching on the outline of the figures, so as to destroy the drowing, and injure the effect on the most unleased eye.

Three small pictures by Etty- Christ appearing to ellary ellagdalen - the Dust and the Dangerous play-fellow, are all visibly failing and the mischief goes on increasing

agree that these pictures may all remain for the present untouched - and to this effects they have put their names to the accompanying memorandum.

Sollowing the instructions of the Meeting as confirmed by the letter from the Treasury dated 15. Etugust 1854, I put the San Severino into M. Bentleys hand, as well as the picture from Minden by the Meister Von Liesborn which was blistered in the gold ground - These injuries of Mr. Bentley has judiciously repaired, and they
