

In obscience to your instructions, I have the honour to submit the following report of proceedings which have taken place under my superintendance relative to the cleaning of certain frictures in the National Gallery.

Jone circumstances connected with the regulations of the present confined establishment, and which affect the question to be considered, should be just noticed. The National gathery is closed for dex weeks in September and October. As there were large spare worms on the floor of the Gullery itself, and as the moving of the pictures to alower floor, where the light is not so good, would be inconvenient and not unattended with risque, it has been the practice to clean judices in the chief apartments, and consequently ouring the vacation only. I had adverted to this circumstance in a printed letter ardreped to the Right Hon. Six Robert Peel, Bart, as first Lord of the Treasury, in May 1845, observing that if the building had been provided with spacious and well-lighted private rooms on the same floor with the Gallery, the operation of cleaning pictures could be carried on when required, and the vacation night then be shortened considerably"; with a view only to repairs or general cleaning of the builting I so as to keep the ballery open almost throughout the year."

the only period when the cleaning of hickness can conveniently

place, the operation has been unavoidably limited to a small number at a time, and hence pictures that are cleaned must present a temporary contrast in their appearance to the mass of the collection.

In the autumn of 1844. being duly authorized, I called in the abustance of Mr. Bowden Drown, an experience picture deaner, M. Jequier having been on former occasions alone employed. I have every reason to be satisfied with the skill and care ovinced by both those gentlemen, and interiord, in the autumn of 1845, again to make the affectance of ill Brown. I should have requested him to unortake the cleaning of the pricture by Rubers called the Allegory of Leave, and loven stated to the Frist Lord of the Breasury, that I wished to employ M. Brown on that work. On attentively examining the picture, however, I found it extremely difficult, in consequence of the thick coats of varkened warnesh with which it was covered, to day whether it might have been repaired or not cet a former period. Accordingly, the only picture in the national collection which was cleaned in 1845 was the quito referred to in these letters. We Drown attended merely for the purpose of variations some pictures which he had deaned in 1844.

I now come to the opperations of 18416.

At a meeting of the Dustees, on Monday the 24th of hugust last, I stated that several pictures in the Vational Gallery appeared to me to require cleaning; where whom it was resolved, That Mr. Eastlake is empowered by the Trustees to use his Discretion in coursing such fuctures as appear to be in want of this treatment, to be cleaned and otherwise restored by comprehent persons, whom he shall select for the purpose, as fare as practicable, during the approaching vacation." The pictures which appeared to me more especially to require attention, were, the newly purchases Velasoner, the Allegony of Peace" by Rubens, The Sanoscape" by Cury's, and the Backers & Anaone by Sitian . I considered that one picture cleaner would be sufficient for the work proposed. I requested Mc de quier to examine these profuses and give me his opinion as to the expediency of deaning them, and the population of doing what expreased to be necessary with safety. I may here observe, that I have known more than one instance when M. Sequies has declined to unvertake the cleaning of pictures not because they die not require cleaning, but because he considered that the operation would have been hazardous.

Those openions, forwarded upon minute investigation, and requiring technical experience to compreheno them need not be detailed here. I wish however to state, that Mr seguire ded not recommend cleaning the Titian so much as the other pictures dome of the Trustees, as well as Mr seguer and myself, had remarked an inequality in the upper and left corner of this fricture, arising from the common having become harbially detached from the lining. Mr seguers stated that it was not profeshed to get rid of this inequality entirely without relining the fricture; but that operation is did not consider requisite. The picture was accordingly cleaned only to the extent proposed by Mr seguier, and the defect in the carries was remedied as far as it could be.

The latter operation was the only one coming wider the lead of restoration, which was considered necessary in the late cleaning.

The Velorsques and the Cuyn were freed from the darkened varnish which abscured them. In cleaning the latter it was hoped that two light sports in the sky, produced by restorations, which had been made before the picture was in the present builting, would cease to be apparent. The result has been quite satisfactory. The Velasques speaks for itself.

The Rubens may be said to have been long buries under repeated courts of yellower and soited varnish. It was found that these could be removed with perfect safety, as the surface of the picture had that extreme haveness which the works of this master, above all others,

often profess. The doubt which I had expressed, whether the presence might have been restored at a former period, would to have been unformation. Mr. Jeguier distinctly states that it is extremely care to find a large work of the age of this specimen in so have a state of preservation.

Having now explained what how been actually done to the four pictures before named, and by whom the work was performed, I be gleave to repeat my entire satisfaction at the result, and to exprep my acknowledgements to M. Jeguier for the care with which he executed the task undertaken by him. I consider it unnecessary to say any thing further on the subject of the virtual, the Cuyte, or the Velasquez. I submit a few observations on the Rubers.

I have abready remarked, that if some pictures one cleaned while others hanging beside them are in a dirtier state. The cleaned pictures may for a time present a considerable contrast to the restrikes difference is more likely to be apparent when a Dubens so placed is fixed from the accumulated effects of a Sondon atmosphere. I work by so flored a painter in his brightest manner, as suited to a cheerful subject, such as an Ollegory of Peace, might under almost any circumstances be expected to present a contrast to pictures originally executed in a much lower tone; and this contrast must be greatly increased after such a fricture has been cleaned. I beg leave to observe that an experienced picture cleaner is not likely to be occurred on such points. In experienced factors cleaner knows, from long habit, the general nature of the materials cure by the great painters, and can distinguish between such meterials and the modern varnishes which may be spread over factored from time to time, to preserve or to venorate them, and which sooner or late, according to local evenements and conditions, become discoloured. With regard to the brilliant and extremely light state in which Rubens left his factores, two letters by the great cirist himself, which are

In the picture now under consideration, the central prortion, which has the most unequivocal indications of the masters hand, is painted, either altogether or to a great extent, on a dark ground contrary to the usual habit of Stations: The figures to the left, again, appear to be painted on a light ground. Those

who are conversant in the practical details of painting, are awars that these different conditions generally involve an original difference of treatment. The canvas on which the picture is painted, is joined in many places, a circumstance not unusual in large pictures of the period; but in this case some of the additions may have been subsequent to the commencement of the central portion.

to relate to the question of the cleaning. I proceed to offer some remarks on the arrangement of the works of which the charitanal gallery is correposed

In the letter to which I have before referred, published in May 18 15, I remarked that it is not desirable to cover .

every blank shall, at any height, needly for the sake of clothing the walls, and without reference to the size and quality of the picture. Every specimen of artina national collection should be assumed to be fet to challenge inspection, and to be worthy of being well displayed. In whatever mode the pictures may be arronged in the present builting, which is manifestly too small for its contents, some must unavoid:

"ably be placed too high to be properly seen. Mere dimensions are not always a criterion; since fine works of Cert of enhanced size should be placed where they can be appreciate. The question which pictures should be near the eye and which should be sacrificed (since some must be sacrificed), is a

point

point on which amateurs would certainly differ. It has been usual to place newly purchased or newly presented pictures in conspicuous situations at least for a time. This adds not a little to the difficulties of the air angement. It would be desirable if the building were sufficiently spacious, to exhibit such newly acquired pictures where they might undergo the ordeal of examination without disarranging the gallery till a permanent distraction, suited to their claims, could be assigned them.

The original arrangement of the principal pictures of the National Gallery I need hardly absorne was not under my sufficient and Jone improvements, I think, might be made, and an occasional change, merely as such might be desirable; but that every good picture in the collection can be duly exhibited to view is, under existing circumstances, impossible.

In the full and entire approbation of what has been cone, it is Difficult to particularize. The glorious Setion, however, is a subject in which my feelings are particularly interested. The cleaning in this case is not only entirely satisfactory in its immediate result, but still more from the promise of perma-- nence and devalitity which the success of the experiment implies, Nothing can exceed the beauty which the Coup and the Velusaucz present as the effect of the picture cleaners skill; but the Titian and Rubers are more interesting from their much greater compeurative importance. The Rubens is indeed reproduced in what may be imagined it's original perfection. I have known the prefere very many years, but never knew it's value till now. It always appeared to be covered with a solid maje of diet, filther, and justiches from which I have furned away with disappointment & disarist.
