For The present I beg leave to give an abstract of that Report for the information of the Trustees and in order to addist them in deciding on some questions to be at once laid before Them Referring to the list of pretures with estimates which I submitted to the trustees in august last, I have to state that I have not thought it expedient to make any offer for the so-called Leonardo da Vince, at Paris, representing It Sebastian; nor for the very fine small Judine also altributed to Leonardo m. The Litta fallery at Milan : The first named being, m my opinion, decidedly not by deonardo, and the detta picture, though of almost unquestioned reputation, being also as I am now persuaded not they the hand of the master.

On arriving in Venice about the middle of October last, I found that a well known Tormerly in the churchfricture by Taul Veronese, formerly in the church of San Silvestro, had become private property, and that with the consent of the government, it was about to be exported. I heard at the same time that the person who had the disposal of it, intended to take it & Paris and offer it first & Baron James Rothschild . Under mach arcumstances I considered that the preture would in all probability become the property of so opalent a collector. Junderstood that the ficture was generally in good condition but that in some uninportant parts it required restoration. On applying for The Jurpose of Deening A, at the " Accademia delle Belle Arti, " where I heard it way, I found to my disappointment, that it was already packed

packed up to be dent to Paris. I left Venuce a very few days afterwards. Soon after my arrival in London, I received letters , dated the 27 th and 29 th of last month , from Mr Mündler, whom I had left in Venice, giving a high character of the picture from competent authorities whom he had seen, transmitting a note from Signor Della Lovere, a friend of the proprietor, certifying that there was no pledge whatever to Baron Rothschild, and finally informing me that, by the advice of persons desirous of seeing the Justure well The case to Paris, recommending him not to stop in Paris at all, but to take the Apicture on to London; promising that the additional cost of carriage would be defraged by me. This work of Yaul Veronese represents the adoration of the Magi, and is about eleven feet six inches high, by about ten feet his inches wide . It was formerly in the church of Jan Silvestro in Venice, and is noticed in the highest terms in all the early guide books for Venice which I have consulted . A very good gudge

of the master described it as equal in quality to the celebrated Sisani fracture. 



To complete the information before submitted I beg to state that among various documents furmithed to me by the vendor, liquor angels Toffoli, is, a marratiae drawn up by him, and subsequently conformed by the Parroco, or vicar of San Silvestro, by which it appears that in consequence of the necessity for extensive repairs in the church of Jan Silvestro, all the pretures were removed from it's walls in 1837; that in the course of the repairs and the alterations the internal design of the church had been so much changed, that when the time arrived for replacing the works of ask, not one of the larger fuctures could be fitted to the new altars and spaces; and that therefore, after considerable delay, a Papal decree, as well as an order of the local authorities, had been oblamed for the sale of anch fuctures. Another document farmished by Signor Toppoli is a declaration signed by Angelo Cerchievi, the Parroco above mentioned, certifying that, from The 1st of September 1855, Signer Voffoto became The legal profinetor of certain frictures,

including the Saul Veronese above described, which had been formerly in the church of San Silvestro . a Murd document consists in a statement addrepsed to me by signor Toffoli to the effect that he was under no pledge whatever to offer The picture in the first ustance to any other persons. After the protuve had been sent to London he received from the continent a much higher offer for it than that which had been accepted, together with an undertaking to repay all expenses of carriage; and it appeared that the person making such offer had before en= deavoured to come to an arrangement for The purchase . As regards such proposals also , Signor Toffoli, in the communication referred to, states that he was under no promise, and that he expressly reserved to himself, an entire independence with regard to the sale. 

If therefore, the preture can be easily taken off from the board, which we have no reason to doubt, we should, without histation, recommend that it should be leved as a means of preventing the cracks from increasing and of rendering the surface compact. The Director stated that the Report which he had before submitted to the Tomoteos had been transmitted to the treasury . a description of the preture last purchased, The Servigino, had been weluded in such Report, but as he had not yet received in = tellegence of the decision of the Austrian Government on the subject, and as a des = cription of the ments of the preture, of published, might interfore with the altimate acquisition, he had proposed that all mention of the fucture should be for the present omitted. Copies of the correspondence on the subject of the Exportation of the Instarce between the Torreign Office and his Hamilton Segmour, Hor Majesty's Minister at Vienna, were hubmitted. The picture having been placed under

the custody of the authorities of the Academy in Milan, pending the decision, was as safe as any property in mele circumstances could be . The Travelling agent having waited in and near Milan a month, would therefore now return , after giving all needful directions to the agents of Mefors Mc Cracken m Milan. The Director called the attention of the Trustees to the approaching sale of The Logers puctures, and recommended that endeavours should be made to secure some specimens, which he particularized for the National Gallery. He submitted That application should be made to the Treasury for authority to expend a certain hun for the purchase of such fictures in The collection as The Invotees and The Director might think desirable.
