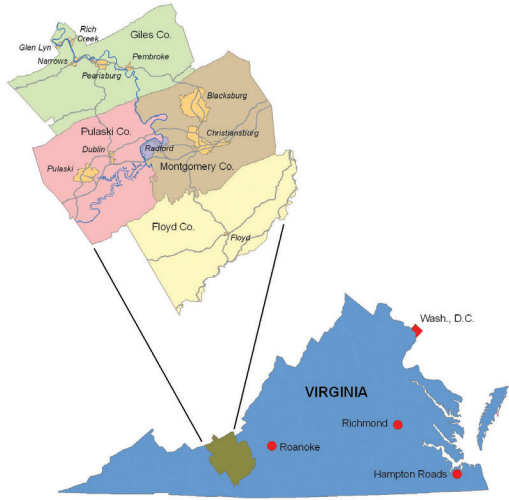

Recently, Blacksburg was named the number one place to retire by Where to Retire Magazine.

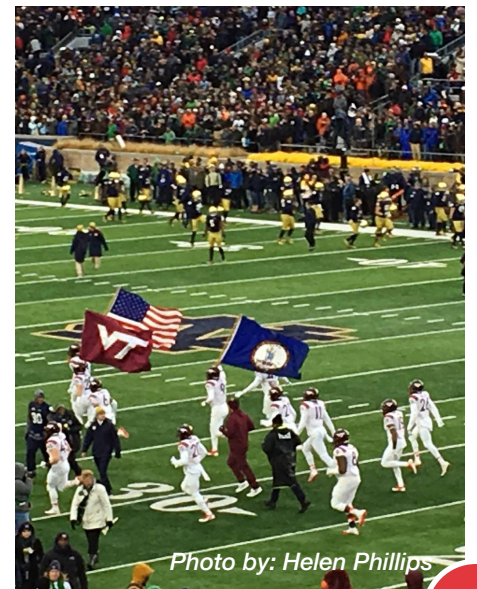

Incorporated in 1792, Christiansburg is the fourth largest town in the Commonwealth, home to approximately 21,000 residents and serves as the county seat. The Blue Ridge Mountains provides a scenic backdrop for our corner of Southwest Virginia.

Christiansburg is ideally situated just off I-81 with quick access to Virginia Tech, Radford University and New River Community College. This central location makes it easy to explore all the New River Valley has to offer, right in our backyard!

Christiansburg is considered the retail hub of the New River Valley, with shopping and dining for all tastes. Visit the New River Valley Mall or Spradlin Shopping Center to find brand name products, but don't forget to venture

off the beaten path to our historic Downtown and Cambria districts for one-of-a-kind finds and local eats. The Wilderness Trail, now present day US Route 11, also runs through the heart of our downtown.

Recreation is a large part of Christiansburg's identity. 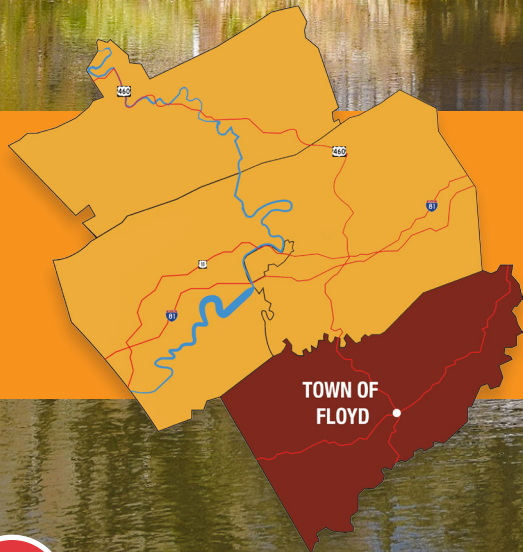

Floyd County, Virginia

Floyd County has a land area of 383 square miles and is located in the Blue Ridge province of the southwest part of Virginia. The county seat, the town of Floyd, is 40 miles southwest of Roanoke on US 221. Buffalo Mountain, at 3,971 feet, is the highest point in the county.

Situated atop a high plateau of the Blue Ridge Mountains, which divides the eastward flowing from the westward flowing waters. It is said that no water flows into Floyd County. The county is drained primarily by Little River and its tributaries, which flow into the New River below the Claytor Lake Dam and, in turn, by way of the Kanawha, the Ohio and the Mississippi, into the Gulf of Mexico.

Throughout the 19th and 20th centuries, the local economy was

dominated by agriculture. Textile manufacturing rose and fell during this time. The construction of the Blue Ridge Parkway during the Great Depression brought some needed work to the County, and more importantly created a linear park and access way to introduce travelers to the arts, crafts and music of Floyd County.

Mabry Mill, located in Floyd County, is one of the most visited and photographed sites along the 469-mile length of the Blue Ridge Parkway. The Rocky Knob recreation area along the Parkway also features hiking, camping and panoramic views.

By the 1970's, Floyd County was "discovered" by the back-to-the-landers seeking rural refuge. Many of the new residents were artists or artisans. In Floyd County, they found a land of natural beauty, a unique

geography with all waters flowing out, rich hand-craft and music traditions, and open opportunities for creative, rural living. These same assets and the culture of creativity now attract many travelers to Floyd, which has seen a dramatic increase in tourism.

Thanks in part to the natural, cultural and technological amenities, the population of Floyd County in 2000 was up 16% over 1990, to 13,872 people. Floyd County is served by an advanced and scalable (underground) 200 Gbps open-access fiber network giving amazing and affordable access to the world.

From the 1700's to now, as Americans still seek their own piece of ground, a better way of life, and a safe place to be, they continue to re-discover Floyd County.

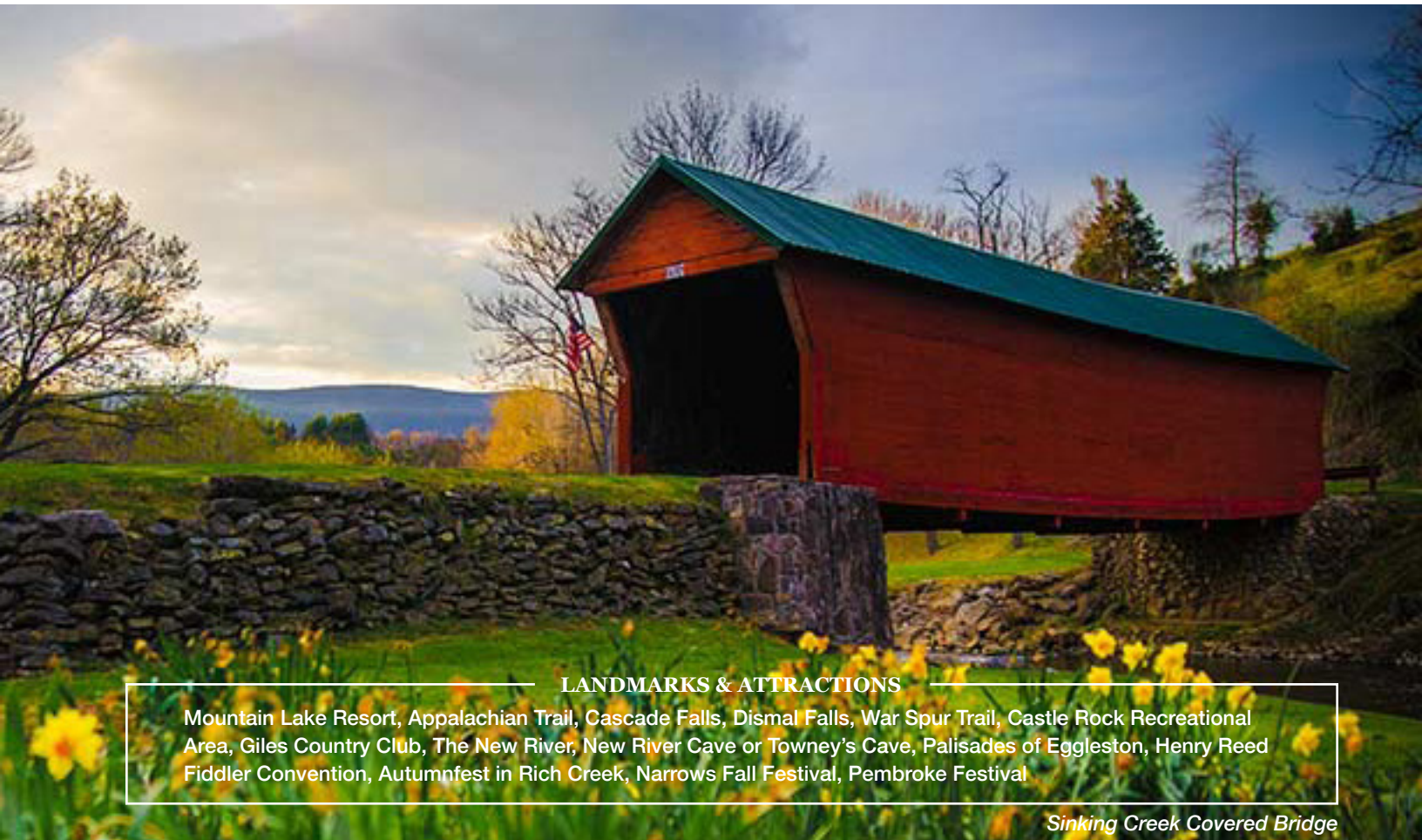

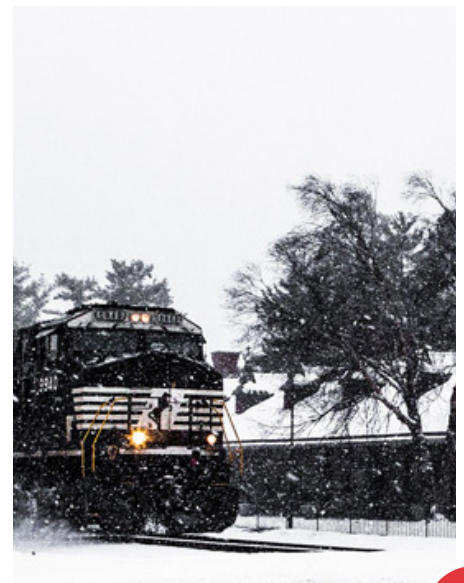
Vision, Pride and Excellence – These three words are the centerpiece of the Pulaski County seal. They also define the past, present and future of this community. Pulaski County has much to be proud of today, most notably is its geographic location west of the eastern continental divide and nestled on top of the plateau through which the New River flows on its way north to the New River Gorge in West Virginia.

Pulaski County is home to a number of regional facilities and several outstanding attractions. The essence of this community can be captured by highlighting a few hidden gems where common things are being done uncommonly well. A defining feature of Pulaski County, Claytor Lake was created by Appalachian

Power Company in 1939, after the construction of Claytor Dam. Its 100 miles of shoreline include gentle pastures, dramatic cliffs and many hidden coves ideal for summertime boat picnics and “jump-overboard” swimming. The shores of Claytor Lake host two of Virginia’s most visited state parks. Claytor Lake State Park provides camping, hiking, boat rentals, rental cabins and conference room space, while the New River Trail State Park provides outstanding opportunities for horseback riding, hiking and bicycling. Located to the south of Claytor Lake is the 16,000 acre Boy Scout reservation (the largest east of the Mississippi). Second nationwide in size only to the Philmont reservation in New Mexico.

In addition to these recreational amenities, excellence can also be

applied to support for business locations in Pulaski County. With three of Virginia’s Enterprise Zones, federal designation as a HUB Zone, and an activated Foreign Trade Zone, business incentives are readily available.

is located 30 miles southwest of Roanoke in southwestern Virginia. Nestled in the heart of the Blue Ridge Mountains, Radford, Virginia, affords residents and visitors an abundance of outdoor recreation such as hiking, mountain biking, canoeing, golfing, and fishing. Radford is known for both Radford University and its proximity to the ancient New River. Radford, Virginia, is one part of a tricity that includes Blacksburg, home of Virginia Tech, and Christiansburg. A mix of tranquil rural settings and university-style amenities, many Radford neighborhoods offer views of both the New River and Blue Ridge Mountains. The town is accessible by Interstate-81 in the south and Virginia Route 11 in the north. Radford Transit offers \$1 fares to the general public and free transport to seniors, children

12 and under, and Radford University students and staff.

A Magnet for Outdoor Enthusiasts

Radford, VA, is situated on all sides by mountains and rivers, meaning numerous opportunities for hiking, kayaking, canoeing, cycling, and camping exist. Within approximately 20 miles, hikers and cyclists from all fitness levels can access multiple trails, including trailheads leading to the Appalachian Trail and the Jefferson National Forest.

Radford, Virginia, is home to 14 beautiful parks, including the popular Bisset Park. This park offers over 100 acres of green spaces, including playgrounds, soccer and football fields, tennis courts, and picnic accommodations. Additionally, visitors to the park have access to

the Riverway Trail, a 3.5-mile paved trail designed and reserved for walkers and joggers. Those living in Radford without their own outdoor equipment can take advantage of locally owned outfitters, where canoes, kayaks, and inner tubes are rented for a day of fun on the gentle currents of the New River.
