



Glossary

(Whatever that means)

1/4 lemon juice;

powdered sugar.

White Lily

ALL that is needed for this experiment is a white lily for the chest!

1/3 part Cointreau; 1/3 part McCarty; 1/3 part Gordon water; dash of absinthe.

1/2 vanilla ice cream;
1/2 Gordon water;

The Royal Smile

Which, after two or three, brings a royal flush!

1/3 part Gordon water; 1/3 parts Applejack; juice of one lime; 2 dashes of grenadine.

The Nose Dive

CONTRIBUTED by "Billy" from Wheeler field, Hawaii. This is the aviator's favorite—let's go!

Take a jigger of Gordon water, place in it an olive, then deposit the glass carefully in the bottom of an ordinary tumbler. Fill the said tumbler with water, ginger ale, or what have you, until almost to the top of the small glass, then down the whole thing quickly, that is, everything but the small glass.

The Grape Vine

This little recipe speaks for it-

1/4 grape juice; 1/4 lemon juice; 1/2 Gordon water; dash of grenadine.

1927 MODEL

Gentleman (inviting lady to dance)—What do you say, Miss Mince—shall we shake up another cocktail?

Mint Fizz

I DON'T like to talk about myself, but this is good and I don't mean pre-war!

Put some nice fresh mint in a bowl, also some powdered sugar and crush the mint thoroughly. Take the juice of a lime, the mint, and a hooker of Gordon water and pour into a tall glass filled with ice. Fill up the rest with White Rock.

1 jigger of benedictine;

1 jigger of Scotch;

This drink, I discovered later, was invented by someone else, but it's good just the same!

Silver Stallion

No, James Branch Cabell didn't invent this one but he should have!

½ vanilla ice cream; ½ Gordon water; fill with Silver King Fizz.

The Los Angeles

After trying this you will understand why they talk about the climate out there!

juice of a lemon; 4 hookers of Scotch; 4 teaspoonfuls of sugar; 1 egg; dash of Italian vermouth. This is enough for four people.

HOT TIP: You can tell a college boy by the brand on his hip.

Polo Cocktail

INVENTED by Yours truly after a polo match—in the living room!

½ grape juice; ½ Gordon water; add a dash of white or green mint.

"Barrels of it, dear."

The Aevada

Can't vouch for this beverage as I Nevada one!

1 hooker of McCarty; juice of half a grape fruit; juice of a lime; powdered sugar; dash of bitters.

NOTE: Country people used to have old-fashioned boiled dinners; now it's the diners that get boiled.

The Cornell Special

LITTLE, of Cornell, claims that this beverage is as smooth as the hair on a silkworm:

14 part of benedictine; 14 part of Gordon water; 14 part lemon; 14 part lithia water.

TOAST: Here's to a red nose; it indicates a horn of plenty these days!

Philadelphia Scotchman

WE can't understand why this drink is called thusly unless it's because it gets you tight!

1 hooker of Applejack;
1 hooker of port;
juice of an orange;
add ginger ale.

The French "75"

This drink is really what won the War for the Allies:

2 jiggers Gordon water;
1 part lemon juice;
a spoonful of powdered sugar;
cracked ice.
Fill up the rest of a tall glass with
champagne!
[If you use club soda instead of
champagne, you have a Tom Collins.]

TOAST: Here's to present day culture—which doesn't care about your English if your Scotch is all right!

The Cubano

CONTRIBUTED by Owen Hutchinson and it explains why Cuba is a free country!

½ Gordon water;
½ vermouth;
4 drops of Kummel;
4 drops of Charbreux;
2 drops of pineapple syrup.

JOKE: Cain—Why did the insurance people turn down Felix?

Abel—Too much of a risk—he wears a celluloid collar and drinks bootleg liquor.

De Riguer

HARK, ye lads! Here's the very latest drink! Three of these will knock you for a row of aspirins:

1/2 scotch;
1/4 grapefruit juice;
1/4 honey;
cracked ice.

TOAST: You don't have to look at a clothes line these days to see what the women are wearing!

Alexander's Sister

Like the Alexander, this little drink will give you the ambition to conquer more worlds.

1/3 Gordon water;

1/3 cream;

1/3 crème de menthe.

TOAST: Here's to Prohibition! It isn't so bad if it just doesn't get any worse.

Bacardi Punch

This drink was graciously contributed by Mr. Cadman, to whom we give thanks:

1 jigger of McCarty; 1 glass of hot milk; 1 tablespoonful of sugar; a pinch of grated nutmeg; the yolk of an egg. Serve in a highball glass.

TOAST: Here's looking at you—double!

Bacardi Cocktail

This recipe is printed in response to 9,865 people who asked how to make it:

2 parts McCarty; juice of a lime; a dash of grenadine; cracked ice.

TOAST: Here's to the tightwad who hides a pair of socks in the pocket of his pajamas in order to cut down his laundry bill!

The Wop

After a few of these you go "wop!"—hence the title.

3/3 Italian vermouth;1/3 sherry;dash of orange bitters.

Brandy, Gump

CONTRIBUTED by E. L. A. of Yale collich. No wonder they can "hold 'em!"

1 hooker of brandy; juice of a lemon; 2 dashes of grenadine.

TOAST:

Here's to the flapper, good and kind; Let's drink her health in toddy. She's nothing much upon her mind And less upon her body.

The Hurricane

This concoction is all that the name implies and should be mixed in a cyclone cellar:

½ pint of Johnny Walker;
½ pint of Gordon water;
½ pint of crème de menthe;
the juice of two lemons.

Toast: Here's to "Block & Tackle" whiskey—take a drink, walk a block and tackle anything!

The Earthquake

THE title of this libation certainly explains itself!

1/3 Gordon water;

1/3 Scotch;
1/3 absinthe.

CHRISTENING

The mother assisted at the baby's christening by breaking a bottle of Scotch over its father's head.

The Frankenjack

Invented by the two proprietors of a very, very well-known Speakeasy in New York City.

1/3 Gordon water;

1/3 French vermouth;

1/6 apricot brandy;

1/6 Cointreau.

NOTE: In these days of bootleg liquor a night cap is apt to put a fellow to sleep for good.

The Swiss Itch

Invented by one James Norton of Princeton and guaranteed to go down with the ease of an elevator:

Place a pinch of salt on the back of the right hand and with the same north paw hold half a lemon between thumb and forefinger. Hold a small glass of Gordon water in the left hand and follow this sequence: lick the salt, drink the Gordon water and suck the lemon!

TOAST: Here's to the pedestrian; every year is leap year with him!

Old Reliables

For the benefit of our young readers who never drank before Prohibition we will give a list of the cocktails of the good old days:

DRY MARTINI:

½ part Gordon water; ½ part Italian vermouth; cracked ice; dash of orange bitters.

MANHATTAN:

½ part rye; ½ part Italian vermouth; a dash of Peychaud bitters; cracked ice.

Old Reliables

CLOVER CLUB:

1 jigger of Gordon water; the white of an egg; the juice of a lemon; a dash of grenadine.

BRONX:

½ part Gordon water; ½ part orange juice; 1 part French vermouth; cracked ice.

To Ast: Here's to our wives; they are like cider—the longer you leave them standing around, the more of a kick you get!

The Crow

This drink is guaranteed to make you fly; like the crow, if you fly too far you will get shot!

2/3 Scotch;1/3 lemon juice;a dash of grenadine.

TOAST: Here's to woman—a flood of loveliness—dam her!

Louisiana Fi33

Here's another drink that comes out of the South and makes you believe in Evolution:

1 cup of white of an egg; 1 cup of powdered sugar; 1 cup of lemon juice; 2 cups of Gordon water; 1 teaspoonful of cream; cracked ice.

TOAST: Here's to Chicago—have a shot!

Champagne Cocktail

This was originated at the Ritz in Paris, and is supposed to be very high hat:

Saturate a lump of sugar in bitters (Boker's preferred), add a piece of lemon peel and fill the cocktail glass with champagne.

TOAST: Here's to prohibition drink her down!

The Lion

So called because it will make you climb a tree!

1/3 rye; 1/3 port; white of an egg; juice of a lemon; teaspoonful of sugar; add slice of pineapple.

NOTE: It isn't only the bootlegger who is cashing in on Prohibition, but a lot of his customers as well.

Whiskey Sour

This is really very mid-Victorian, but it ought to be included:

1 jigger of rye; the juice of half a lemon; a piece of lemon peel; a dash of sweet syrup.

Toast: Here's to our bootlegger—he's never low in spirits!

A Hot Toddy

This is included for Grandma and Grandpa:

1 jigger of rye, brandy or rum; the juice of half a lemon; 1 lump of sugar; fill up the highball glass with hot water.

TOAST: Here's to the modern grandmother; may she never pass out.

The Cowboy

After two of these you won't even need a horse. Ride 'em, cowboy!

2 parts scotch; 1 part cream; cracked ice.

TOAST: Here's to the liquor that makes a man see double and feel single!

An Egg Nog

This is only to be imbibed on holiday occasions:

Thoroughly beat an egg with onehalf of a teaspoonful of sugar; add 1 jigger of brandy or whiskey; shake in a shaker and add milk to taste; pour into a glass and twist a lemon

pour into a glass and twist a lemon peel over it.

TOAST: Here's to the optimist who takes his crank off the Ford!

The Pacqueri Cocktail

This is a famous drink and has been reprinted for auld time's sake.

% McCarty;
% grenadine;
juice of a lime.

THE MORNING AFTER

"Who was that lady I seen you with last night?"

"That's what's been puzzling me too!"

Jack Rose Cocktail

This is another old timer which has stood up under the years.

¼ Applejack;
⅙ Gordon water;
½ French vermouth;
½ Italian vermouth;
⅙ orange juice;
⅙ lime juice;
dash of grenadine.

NOTE: The bootlegger who boasts that he is a self-made man is not giving due credit to the Anti-Saloon League.

Attaboy Cocktail

This recipe has had several names but this one seems to be the most popular.

1/3 Gordon water;

1/3 Bacardi;

1/6 Cointreau;

1/6 lemon juice.

STATISTICS: If all the college students in this country were laid end to end, it would take a lot of hooch.


The Mint Julep


This drink proves conclusively that the South isn't so solid!




Toast: Here's to our bills—and may we some day meet 'em.
