PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Physicians will have an enhanced understanding of the latest techniques and current research specifically related to adult cardiovascular surgery and general thoracic surgery. Physicians will be able to utilize the results presented to select appropriate surgical procedures for their own patients and integrate state-of-the-art knowledge into their practice.
