

Section UK is to host several key international events.

Delegates at the 2015 IPA World Congress were in agreement that Section UK should host the annual International Youth Gathering in 2018, the bi-annual World Seminar for Young Officers in 2019 and the IPA's World Congress in 2025 - which will be the Association's 75th Anniversary.

Section UK's National Executive Committee will be discussing the logistical and financial arrangements of the events' organisation over the coming months.



Section UK owns a magnificent HQ building in West Bridgford, Nottingham. Part of my portfolio as National Treasurer is to ensure this flagship building is maintained to a high standard.

A number of repairs had to take place during 2015. It had been decided to replace the windows in the building at a total cost of approximately £10,000. Unfortunately, during the year a leak developed in the roof and repairs to it took precedence over the windows.

The work on the roof was completed in July at a cost of approximately £7,500, including a 10 year warranty.

Work on the windows will take place in stages. I can report that two windows in the office of the International Administration Centre were replaced during October at a cost of £2,200.

Stephen Crockard and Steve Connor were awarded a Silver Medal from the IEB.

Stephen Crockard said: "I feel pleased and honoured to receive this award and I shall continue to do my best for the Association and my fellow members."



A Gold Standard Award has been made to Section UK for its Website for a third year in a row.

Gold Awards also went to Australia, Austria, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Ireland, New Zealand, Russia, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland and the USA.

Speaking at 2015 IPA World Congress, where the Awards were announced, International Executive Board member Stephen Crockard said, 'I take the view that this is not a competition but an assessment of competence'.



IPA World Congress XXI Cyprus

his year's World Congress was hosted in Limassol by Section Cyprus and was followed by an optional Friendship Week.

The Congress was attended by our President Mick Luke and two observers, Vice President Ronnie Dukes and Treasurer Fred Boyd. Also in attendance from Section UK was Stephen Crockard who was standing for election in a new role as Head of Administration.

During this Congress the positions on the International Executive Board (IEB) (replacing the Permanent Executive Board (PEB)) were to be contested and elected for a four year period.

There were several items of the Agenda that our Section had proposed, including hosting future events.

On the first day, delegates, observers and friends, many in uniform, attended the opening ceremony. This included several welcoming speeches and musical entertainment. It was an opportunity to meet everyone, renew acquaintances and be introduced to new IPA friends. The obligatory group photo was taken from a rooftop to try and get everyone in it. That afternoon the business of the Congress commenced.

All Sections with the exception of Mozambique were in attendance.

Pierre-Martin Moulin, International President opened the Congress. This was followed by attendees standing for a minute's silence to reflect on those members who are no longer with us. In his introduction he reflected on the past and commented on a vision for the future. This would involve rethinking of the structures of the IPA and the IEB; new check list with strategic plans; documents being tidied up and improvement in communication; a development plan for new Sections wanting to join; membership rules; the relevance of social media; Chairs of Commissions to produce strategic plans, determine projects and select participants

He reminded Sections that if they needed support, not to hesitate to ask the IEB or other Sections for it.

He also raised concerns about unproductive internal disputes: friction; and power struggles, advising that these should be avoided and resolved as soon as possible.

Pierre-Martin was impressed with the current programme and activities at Gimborn and encouraged more use by Sections.

Report of International Secretary General (ISG)

The ISG commented on the IPA information guide which is updated electronically monthly and circulated to Sections. He reminded everyone

that there should be no unauthorised disclosure of names and addresses.

Report of Assistant International Secretary General (AISG) - Stephen Crockard

Stephen gave a review of the previous 3 years. He commented on staff changes at the International Administration Centre (IAC) in Nottingham. Although their old email address is still active he advised of the new email address: iac@ieb-ipa.org

He complimented archivists Phillip and Vivienne Powell on the work that they had done at the IAC.

He introduced the International website webmaster Andrea Quattrini (Switzerland) who gave an informative presentation about the website, links and social media. He referred to the use of Facebook, Twitter, Linked In, Google+, You Tube, Flickr, Instagram and Pinterest and recommended linking Twitter with Facebook. The Report of External Relations Commission (ERC) was presented and accepted. Mick Luke collected an award on behalf of Section UK member Steve Connor for his contribution to the ERC.

The Report of International Cultural

Commission (ICC) was presented and accepted.

13 Sections were awarded the 'Gold Standard' for their websites, including United Kingdom. It was emphasised that these awards were for an assessment of competence and not a competition.


The Report of International Professional

Commission (IPC) was presented and accepted.

Our Section was congratulated for the contribution to the successful International Association of Women Police (IAWP) conference that was held in Cardiff. Vice President Sean Hannigan and members of Region Number 4 were amongst those who had been present and had an IPA presence at the conference. The next IAWP is being held between 2nd and 6th October 2016 in Barcelona.

Arthur Troop Scholarship: The maximum value of scholarships is 2,500 Euros. There were 28 applications and 12 awarded for 2016 including Robert Stenhouse.

More information on Robert's Scholarship will appear at a later date.



Reference was made about an initiative by Section France – they have a project about a documentary of worldwide police patrols. More details available by email: cnp@ipafrance.org

The Report of International Social Commission (ISC) was presented and accepted.

We were advised that the Emergency Aid rule was amended, but will have to be amended again. In the past 3 years more than 1 million Euros donated. Sections attending the Cyprus Congress donated 13,000 Euros to a charity for Children with Special Needs.

New electronic form for International Travel is being created.

Consideration is being given to IPA Games in 2017 in conjunction with World Congress being held in Bulgaria.

Youth Exchange Programme: Spain to UK is the most frequent request. No longer supported by

IEB, however Sections can be involved if they want to. Rationale: concerns for child safety. It is likely that the program will be cancelled.

The report by the International Treasury was presented and accepted.

Whilst it was recognised that the budget will be affected by the 2016 World Congress being held in New Zealand, that in general terms the Association was in a healthy position.

Another point that could have a financial impact is if future membership cards have an option with or without photos.

Additional presentations

Vice President Ronnie Dukes gave a presentation to delegates on the successful event that Section UK organised in December 2014 to mark the birth centenary of our founder Arthur Troop BEM.

Presentations were also made to Congress by invited guests and included information about an International Master's Degree in Criminal Justice, Governance & Police Science from Ruhr Universitat Bochum –

8,000 Euro grant to be awarded: 4,000 to Section Germany and 4,000 to another Section. It is an online 2 year course in 8 modules with no attendance required at Bochum.

www.macrimgov.eu Information leaflets were distributed. Vice President Sean Hannigan is aware of this and may be able to offer advice if you are considering submitting an application.

Michael Odysseos former International President along with a guest speaker gave a presentation on 'Police and Public Image' and 'Police Behaviour towards the Public'.

Between 6th and 15th April 2016 Section Macau are organising an Anti Terrorism Forum and Friendship Event – they extended an invitation to 2 delegates per Section, who have anti-terrorism knowledge, to attend. Section Macau will cover the costs of delegates. The closing date for applications is 6th January 2016.

Our President gave an update on the House Managers Meeting taking place in Scotland between 3rd and 6th March 2016.



The 12th National Police Memorial Day service was held at the Edinburgh International Conference Centre on Sunday 27 September 2015. It was attended by members of the National Executive Committee and other members and friends of International Police Association from throughout the United Kingdom.

y invitation of Section UK, Sebastian Provost, President French Delegation of IPA Bordeaux, Section France also attended the service.

The service commenced with a procession by The Pipes and Drums of Police Scotland. This was followed by a word of welcome from Rt Hon Nicola Sturgeon MSP, First Minister of Scotland.

A wreath was laid in remembrance of those killed in the Clutha Helicopter tragedy. The service continued with hymns, prayers and readings by a variety of clergy and police representatives, including a bible reading from Rt Hon Theresa May MP, Home Secretary. Music was provided by The National Police Memorial Day Orchestra. There was also a choral item by the Edinburgh Royal Choral Union.

The Act of Remembrance was led by The Reverend Canon David Wilbraham, National Police Chaplain, Force Chaplain Thames Valley Police.



During the service, four candles were lit, one from each of the four nations of the United Kingdom, to remind everyone of the undying flame of devotion and commitment, exemplified by those who were being remembered that day, including Constable Russ Wylie, Humberside Police, Constable Kevin Stoodley, Avon and Somerset Constabulary, Constable David Arthur, Metropolitan Police and Constable Jonathan Relph, Metropolitan Police.

After each of the candles were lit there was silence, during which petals of remembrance, representing all of those who have lost their lives, descended from the gallery. The orchestra played 'Abide with me' and the Last Post sounded.

After a moment of silence Reveille was sounded. Whilst the whole service evoked emotions, at this point there was an air of poignancy, reverence and respect for those who are no longer with us by those who remember them.

At the conclusion of the service there was a retiring collection in aid of National Police Memorial Day. Refreshments were served to guests, courtesy of the Police Dependants' Trust. Sebastien Provost, our French guest also had the opportunity to meet with Sergeant Joe Holness and The Reverend Canon David Wilbraham.

3rd IPA world seminar for young police officers 2015

officers from 42 countries attended the 2015 World Seminar for Young Police Officers, hosted by Poland at the Police Training Centre in Legionowo, Warsaw.

The event combined seminars on interesting international policing topics, practical exercises and three official events.

The First Deputy Chief Commander of the Polish Police and the President of IPA Poland welcomed us to the Official Opening. The rest of the day then comprised of lectures on:

"Polish LEA – Brief history, present time and future directions" learning that the population of Poland is 38.5 million with 95,392 police officers, of which 13,857 are female, giving a ratio of one officer per 403 citizens.

"Securing the EU External Borders, a Common Enterprise" was delivered on behalf of FRONTEX European Union Agency and was particularly relevant given the current refugee crisis across Europe.

"Border Guard tasks in combating transborder crimes" – Border Guard HQ, and "Drug trafficking, illegal production and distribution"

 Central Bureau of Investigation of the Police and Central Forensic Laboratory of the Police.

The evening finished with a dinner in a nearby restaurant where IPA Poland hosted team building exercises, bringing the first enjoyable night to a close.

On Tuesday the Police Training Centre celebrated its 25th Anniversary and all the IPA participants wore their Ceremonial uniforms and participated in the parade and awards. It was certainly very interesting to see the dress differences between all 42 countries.

The afternoon comprised lectures and workshops, including "Selection and intake for Peacekeeping Missions"; "Gender, Diversity and Human Rights for Police Officers in a Global context" and "Common Worldwide trends and Drug Interdiction".

Wednesday was spent at the shooting range where we spent time at three different stations with different situations at each one ranging from "Counter Ambush Drills", "TCCC (Tactical Combat Casualty Care)" and "Alone officer in the darkness - how to operate a flashlight in conjunction with a firearm". This was a great day enjoyed by all, even if the other participants

did find it extraordinary that I have never carried a firearm and were intrigued to find out how we dealt with armed situations. I have to thank the instructors for being extremely patient with methere is a reason I work on the CID!

On Thursday we attended the Polish Parliament in Warsaw and were privileged to be guests at the International Conference acknowledging and Celebrating 90 years of Women in the Polish Police Force, under the patronage of the Prime Minister - Ms. Ewa Kopacz.

The topics covered included "Equality and Diversity - Role of Women in a Masculinised Profession", "The Female Factor – Women in the Police Force from an International Perspective" and "Women and Diversity in the Police". Two of our IPA colleagues Ms. Jay Tam Man Kei of Hong Kong and Ms. Monica Marti Fontanals of Spain also spoke at this conference, sharing personal experiences of policing in their respective countries. Following the formalities we visited the Old Town in Warsaw where Section Poland had arranged a tour of the city for us all.

On Friday we attended lectures and workshops on "Community policing and radicalisation awareness", "Campaign against drinking and driving and underage drinking" and "Cyber Crime and Fraud".

We also enjoyed a display by the K9 unit showing the capabilities of the dogs in different scenarios before taking part in some practical exercises with the Traffic Department including a simulated crash scene where evidence gathering and procedures were practiced. A SWAT unit then demonstrated how they would stop a vehicle with a suspected armed and dangerous person in it.

Saturday was our last official engagement when we attended the National Polish Police Memorial Day in Warsaw. We were honoured to be invited to join hundreds of Polish Police Officers as they marched through the city to welcoming and appreciative crowds who lined the route to the main square. This large and well celebrated annual event was attended by the Polish Prime Minister and many other dignitaries at which Officers receive promotions and other achievement awards.

IPA Section Poland hosted a truly memorable week - valuable knowledge and experiences were shared and new lifelong friendships have been forged. Trips to visit each other since leaving Poland have already been made and many more are planned. I am sure that the next seminar which is due to be held in 2017 in Wisconsin, United States of America will be every bit as enjoyable and successful.

Just the evidence please!

Evidence based policing at Gimborn by Rob Heaton

In October 2015, I tasted the uniquely immersive educational experience of a Gimborn seminar.

he twenty delegates came from a variety of European countries, together with Arthur Troop Scholarship winners from South Africa and Australia.

The seminar was led by May-Britt Rinaldo, head of Gothenburg police, supported by academic speakers from across Europe.

Monday laid the foundations for the week. Alex Murray of West Midlands Police and the Society of Evidence Based policing, explained the need for scientific rigour in policing experiments. The Maryland Scale of Scientific Methods was described, in which traditional 'before and after' measurements were shown to be a poor indicator of cause and effect, whilst randomised control trials were at the top of the scale.

Moreover, an 'unsuccessful' experiment is just as valid as a 'successful' one, if it tells us what action to avoid taking in future.

The remainder of the week saw speakers present practical examples of evidence based policing experiments. These included major crime investigations, the factors in burglaries which contribute towards solvability and the difference which various types of uniform officer – such as police, PCSO and security guards – have upon people's fear of crime.

We were expected to take an active part in proceedings, as some speakers initiated further thought about their subjects by means of discussion of group tasks.


Friday morning saw the presentation of the results of 'week long' group work, ranging from the benefits and pitfalls of police-academic collaboration, to the use of evidence based policing to tackle local crime problems. To add local experience, we were sometimes taken away from the castle. One evening we visited the nearest village, with its pub and wooden bowling alley.

On Wednesday, we visited the University at Bochum, where the chief prosecutor gave a presentation about football match-fixing in connection with betting. This was followed by some rare free time in the town and dinner in a traditional German restaurant.

The facilities at Gimborn were great in their own unique way. Mornings saw delegates emerge from their turret bedrooms, to clomp along the castle corridors and past the old portraits to the schlosshotel for breakfast, then to the modern classroom suite.

But of course, one Gimborn highlight which always rates a mention, is the turmbar (tower bar). Every evening, police of a dozen nationalities exchange information and socialise at this honesty bar, watched over by suits of armour and lethal-looking instruments of war. There's something reassuring about hearing a Swedish rural officer bemoaning that the nearest support is thirty miles away. It really is the same everywhere, isn't it? On Thursday night, each nationality presented a short entertainment for the benefit of the others, such as a national song, dance or sketch. Of varying length and quality, but with huge enthusiasm and hugely enjoyed.

Overall the week was a huge success. I was surprised that there were so few UK delegates at this English language seminar on an important topic. Gimborn reports invariably praise the high quality of seminars, but it's difficult to understand what that means unless you have experienced it. For serving officers in particular, this is a professional development opportunity well worth taking. And everyone speaks English!


Boarding the Empire Builder train we wondered if our return to Chicago would keep to time. No, - only five hours getting in – 2000 instead of 1500!



and his Bull's Blood Wine

Szekszárd is a small city and capital of the Hungarian County of Tolna. Every year in September they hold a wine harvest festival as the city is at the heart of an important wine producing area. John Bull visited the 2015 event and met up with IPA friends from Hungary and Germany.

ur IPA friends, Endre and Gabi
Brassnyo, invited us to attend the 2015
event so, together with Thames Valley
member Charlie Green, his wife Valerie, daughter
Katherine and her partner lan, we gathered at
Budapest Airport where we were met by Endre
and a case full of Polinka (Hungarian Schnapps)
and beer.

Having met up later with long standing IPA friends, Karl-Ludwig & Doris Ruckelshauss, and five others from Grunberg in Germany, we all made our way to the main King Bela Square which was covered in food and wine stalls together with a stage on which local musicians and dancers were performing. This continued over the next four days from 12 noon into the small hours.

We enjoyed music by a Hungarian/Danubian string orchestra with a cimbalom player. A big band jazz style group from the local music school played as well a brass band, a rock group and various small groups of folk singers.

Away from the festival, we visited the local crime investigation office where we were welcomed by the head of the area CID, who, after presentation of gifts, took us to a wine farmer's house where we experienced our first goulash.

From a wooden lookout tower we had a wonderful view across the plains through which the Danube flows. Another hilltop gave views overlooking the town and a stainless steel sculpture in the form of grapes on the vine. We also visited a small shrine over a natural spring which was a welcome cool refuge in the 36 degree heat.

We were taken to Gabi's mother's house in a small village where we had a typical country lunch. There was a huge cauldron of river fish soup in which the whole fish goes in. I was fairly selective as regards the solid bits but the soup was delicious. Once again it was very hot and we sat out in the garden to eat, with walnuts falling from the trees.

Back in Szekszárd the afternoon procession involving villagers and wine farmers from the area was led by hunters on horseback, hunting horns and men cracking bull whips. Each village appeared to have a different colourful costume and it was great to see young people of all ages dressed for the occasion. The whole spectacle lasted for over an hour and ended in the square where there was a 'prettiest dancing couple competition' with entries from Hungary, Moldova, Croatia and Romania, all in local costumes. Interspersed with the couples were dancing groups whose dancing got more frantic as it went on.

We were given a tour of a wine farm by the owner who had constructed the most fantastic wine cellar which he used as a banqueting and wedding hall seating 180 and had a small wedding chapel included. We had a wine tasting, including the famous 'Bulls Blood' wine. The local wine has a long history back to Roman times and most wines are a blend of up to 5 grape varieties. The wine was excellent - the reds very dry but refreshing and the rosé was equally good.

Following 'Goodbyes' to the Germans, Endre and Imre drove us back to Budapest. We went to Section Hungary's museum where we met Section Vice President Ferenc Juhasz and member Gyorgy Tomka and exchanged gifts. Ferenc had arranged for Anitra and I to stay for four nights at the International

Crime Investigation Academy in Budapest, whilst Endre returned the Green family to the airport.

Anitra and I continued with our sightseeing holiday in the beautiful city of Budapest covering the usual sights and sampling the local food and wine.


I must say a big 'thank you' to Endre and Gabi as well as the head of CID and our translator, another Gabi, who works in the CID office.

New Zealand, situated in the deep Pacific, hosts many IPA members and families from throughout the world who visit to enjoy the clean green landscape, terrific scenery and friendly people.

ection UK member Stephen Hilditch, enjoyed much more when he visited in 2015 – family, former colleagues, IPA members – as well as sharks and an advancing warrior!

I retired in 2007 from the Royal Ulster Constabulary/ Police Service of Northern Ireland and two years ago our two boys emigrated to New Zealand. During the 2015 summer (New Zealand winter) year my wife Frances and I travelled out to visit them and explore the beautiful country.

I have been a member of the IPA since 1980, however I have never really made use of its many benefits or of the opportunities for travel and meeting new people. So, I decided to fill out the travel forms - and so began an amazing experience.

Unfortunately, I had left the process a little late to organize any of the New Zealand Police Houses. IPA Section New Zealand arranged car hire for my whole stay and I was contacted by several ex RUC officers who I arranged to meet later in the tour.

Whilst visiting our two sons in Auckland we visited several of the 'must go to' places including the

Kelly Tarlton Sealife Centre and Auckland Tower. Mark our youngest son (a zoologist) was working at the Sealife Centre and he arranged for Frances to do a free dive in the main tanks. After a short training session and accompanied by several other victims (I mean paying customers) she entered the tanks where she got up close and personal with sand tiger sharks, stingrays and a myriad of other sea life. I was watching from the safety of the glass tunnel along with the rest of the family.

In the afternoon it was my turn to pump the adrenaline when we visited the Auckland Tower. After a safety briefing we walked around the tower on the 1m wide open mesh walkway. Having survived that, I went one stage further and threw myself off the tower. Standing on the edge, trying not to look down, you lean forward into a point of no return. Then, 700 feet and 11seconds later you are on the ground. We travelled to the City of Napier, world famous for having many examples of Art Deco inspired architecture. For wine lovers the area of Hawkes Bay is a world famous wine producing area. The town and heritage is still celebrated to this day by the naming of their very best wine known as "Coleraine wine".

Wellington is a small and attractive city that, in 2015, celebrated its 150 year as the official capital of New Zealand. We were greeted and royally treated by two ex RUC officers: Mike Norden is Chair of No 4 Region IPA NZ and Phil King – they both emigrated in the 70's and 80's – were joined by Phil Jones and Christina Jones. We had a memorable night out at a local hostelry. Flying Visit Jnder

Last year, Avon and Somerset Branch member Mick Clyne and his wife Sandra set off on a nineteen day holiday to visit Singapore, Australia (Sydney, Ayres Rock & Cairns) and Hong Kong. At the last minute they decided to inquire about the possibility of IPA contact in the countries being visited. Here's how they got on.

The main reason for pursuing contact was to assist me in my work as a Lecturer working with Police Foundation Degree students at The City of Oxford College and Oxford Brookes University.

I soon discovered that Singapore does not have an IPA Section but I managed to make contact with Australia and Hong Kong.

Australia - My first police contact came during our trip to Avres Rock Resort, which was when I called into the local Police Station and met a couple of officers and exchanged my IPA, Thames Valley Police, UK patches for a Northern Territory Police shoulder patch. I established very quickly that this was a sleepy, rural station where the main jobs addressed by local officers were domestic scenarios between the resort staff (who reside and work at the resort, as do the Police, Ambulance and Fire personnel) and the occasional theft from the local supermarket.

My general opinion of Australia as a country, is that they seem very relaxed with most things in life, very passionate about their sports but somewhat confused with the role/responsibility towards the indigenous people, I shall give you a small example. Whilst at The Ayres Rock Resort, we visited a lovely modern museum dedicated to the local Aboriginal Tribe. It displayed many lovely arts and gave lots of historical facts about the area. One display explained the history and spiritual meaning of Uluru (Ayres Rock) and what it means to the Aboriginal Tribe and how it offends them when tourists climb it and saddens their spirits when climbers fall and die. Whilst reading this, I imagined the outrage of turning up in Rome to see abseiling and climbing on and around The Vatican, and therefore totally sympathised with this disrespectful attitude. However I then moved to the next display, to

find a survivor's guide to climbing Ayers Rock. In my opinion and in this day and age, surely the survivors guide should not be on display and the climbing should be stopped. Especially when a few miles away from Uluru there a rock, just as impressive called Mount Conner which has, according to our guide little or no significance to the Aboriginal people.

Hong Kong - Jack Tam, Secretary General of Section Hong proved to be a fantastic host, taking us us to a local restaurant. We ate the traditional meal known as 'Hot Pot', whereby a cooking pot was placed on an electric hob built into our table, stock was poured in and heated and then cold food was served on plates and then heated in the pot. At 11:30pm we were out walking in what was still hot and humid weather and Jack took us on a tour of Kowloon Harbour.

Whilst on our tour we called into Tsim Sha Tsui Police Station. On speaking to Jack it was obvious that whilst the Hong Kong Police do not have The Police and Criminal Evidence Act to work with, their policies & procedures for dealing with victims, witnesses and suspects are very similar to ours here in the UK. Jack then gave us a practical guide to travelling on the Hong Kong subway and we ended up back at our hotel having a nice cold beer in the bar



where I was able to thank Jack for his time during his very busy schedule and hand over IPA, Thames Valley Police, UK patches, before retiring

Overall, our 19 days travelling proved somewhat exhausting to say the least but it was a fantastic opportunity to make contact with fellow officers and enjoy one of the many benefits of the IPA.





Superb Response

IPA member Ronald F Ratcliffe shares his experience of an 'eventful' cruise and puts on record his grateful thanks to Section Spain.

My grateful and whole hearted sincere gratitude, on behalf of my wife and I to the International Police Association, and in particular to express that gratitude and say 'THANK YOU' to two Spanish Police Officers Andoni Artesero and his colleague Peter, both IPA members.

My wife and I were enjoying a 14 day cruise. Medical facilities aboard the ship were excellent and on about the 10th day I sought the medical team's advice for a sore throat I had suddenly developed. Antibiotics cured it overnight, however as the ship docked at Bilbao on our return section of the cruise, I reported to the medical team that I had now developed a problem in my urinary tract.

Following the doctor's advice I walked ashore with my wife (she packed a couple of bags quickly) and we were transported by ambulance to the Bilbao University Hospital St. Cru. Barakalda. I spent the next seven days flat on my back experiencing some very unpleasant symptoms and procedures. The medical staff were very efficient and the team of doctors so professional I named them the 'Dream Team' which they thought was amusing and enjoyed the humour.

My wife Rita, bless her, was facing up to being alone in Northern Spain with her mobile telephone running low. She coped magnificently but on about the third day of my treatment (travel insurance response is another story!) I knew she needed some moral support so I suggested she contact IPA, which she did.

Two Spanish IPA colleagues responded at once. The two officers came to the hospital, introduced themselves to Rita and I and their presence and kindness towards me as a professional colleague and IPA member was truly first class. They gave support to Rita, made further visits to us and even brought their wives to the hotel when I was discharged from hospital. Truly "SERVO PER AMIKECO" in every sense. Finally when we had booked our flight they took us to Bilbao International Airport and stayed with us right through to the departure gate.

During my worldwide previous professional HM Armed Forces Service and in my thirty years professional service in the Metropolitan Police and New Scotland Yard I have been injured similar to many other serving UK police officers, but had not experienced circumstances whereby I was flat on my back and somewhat helpless. The purpose of this correspondence is to thank IPA and the two superb Spanish police officer - colleagues I have named. Thank you, and well done the late 'Arthur Troop' for having the vision and foresight in founding IPA.



We then enjoyed lunch in the police canteen and a tour of their Police and Crime Museum. The Curator, Maria, a serving Sergeant, enthralled us with the history of the Maltese Police. We then enjoyed a Cruise into the 5 Creeks that make up the Grand Harbour. In fantastic weather we viewed it all from the open deck, while enjoying chilled refreshments.

That evening we went to Limestone, a redundant quarry, where we enjoyed a traditional Folklore Evening, local buffet and entertainment.

Saturday's full agenda started with a visit to Upper Barraka Gardens, which overlook the Grand Harbour. Followed by a visit to the Cathedral of St John. This was a very interesting audio tour through the opulent Cathedral.

We then left Valletta and were driven to the walled City of Mdina where we enjoyed free time to admire the architecture, narrow streets and fabulous views of the surrounding countryside.

We then had a short walk to the nearby city of Rabat, full of ancient Maltese buildings.

Our enjoyable day was rounded off with a beautiful meal in a Maltese restaurant.

On Sunday we toured the south of the Island. At Hagar Qim we were fortunate to get a private tour with Johnny whose wealth of knowledge came from long association with this ancient wonder.

Donning our life jackets, we made our way down to the Blue Grotto and boarded one of the brightly painted boats for a journey to the caves, where the sun changed the water to different shades of green and blue.

Our bus then took us to Marsaxlokk, a small fishing village with a busy Sunday Market spread around a bay full of brightly coloured fishing boats. Virtually anything you wanted was on sale at this Market be it fish, fruit, household goods or clothing.

On Monday we took a ferry to the neighbouring island Gozo, where we visited Ta Pinu, a 16th Century Cathedral where Miracles happen. The walls are adorned with stories and photographs of people who were cured of their ailments.

We also saw the Inland Sea and the Azure Window, a rock formation on the coast before arriving in Victoria, the capital of Gozo.

A 20 minute ferry back to Malta and Romeo fitted in a stop at Mosta Church, perhaps the most famous building in Malta, where during the World War II the Church was almost destroyed



by a 200kg bomb falling through the dome and bounced without exploding.

Wednesday was a 3 Cities tour for an insight into authentic life in Malta. In Senglea we climbed steep steps to a watch tower, where a carved eye and ear watch over the Grand Harbour.

At the Inquisitor's Palace, a 16th Century Court House where the Catholic Church handed out punishments, we visited their Torture Chamber.

A meander along the busy Marina in Vittoriosa took us to one of the many tunnels where slaves were brought in by boats. They were taken through the tunnels to be chained to the walls until sold.

IPA Malta is very fortunate to have a great Ambassador in Romeo Micallef who welcomed, chaperoned and cared for us impeccably. He went above and beyond our expectations and helped make our visit to Malta a very memorable experience.



Photograph Submission

Guidelines

Photographs play a powerful role in Police World. Each photo must be technically excellent and convey an important message about IPA membership, or the wider policing family.

For magazine publication, quality is important. A photograph which looks ok on a phone, or tablet, may look very poor in print.

Here are a few guidelines to help you become a published photographer.

Submitting Photographs

Format: We accept high-resolution images on CDs, DVDs, or by e-mail in JPEG format.

If sending by e-mail, be careful of how your e-mail system sends photographs. Some programs reduce the resolution (file size / quality) before sending.

Beware of Facebook and similar sites. Loading a photograph to one of these sites will always reduce the quality. We need the original JPEG

Credit: The photographer is credited and retains copyright for each photo published. By submitting photos, photographers assign the right to use the photos in current and subsequent printings of the publication in which they appear, whether in print or digital format.

Tips for Non-Professionals



- Use a 10 megapixel digital camera or better and use the highest quality setting when you shoot.
- Use natural light where possible. Raise blinds or open curtains as necessary. Try to be unobtrusive and allow your subjects to forget that you are there. Catch your subjects in action, not posing. Focus on the people in the foreground. Take many photos but expect only a few to be just right.
- Do turn off time/date function as they difficult to remove from the image.



- Camera phones should be a last resort. Despite the claimed megapixel size, mobile phones and cheaper compact cameras have poor quality sensors (the bit that does the job film used to do).
- Don't send hundreds of images choose the best.

Horizontal vs. Vertical

A magazine is a much different canvas for your work than a typical print. When you print your photo, you can frame it and hang it any way you please. It can be 8x10 or 10x8. With magazines it's different. Most magazines are designed for vertical pictures. Otherwise, you'd have to really crop a picture down.

Inside a magazine, horizontals will be found, but many of photos are verticals because they allow for better text wrapping and layout design. And 9 times out of 10, the cover shot will be a vertical.

Remember this when you're shooting. Or, do like many professionals and take a photo both horizontally and vertically, to cover all your bases if you are not sure how the photo will be used

Pin Sharp Pictures Matter

Magazines are one of the few media where non-sharp photos will be very obvious.

We want photos that will pop off the page and draw reader's interest, for this reason they need pin sharp photos (the highest level of sharp photos a photographer can shoot).

When shooting pictures, make sure your hand is steady so that your photos are crisp.

If you are shooting something like an interior photo or a landscape, consider using a tripod and a shutter release remote to help improve the camera's stability and steadiness.
